- 2. Always keep your doors locked. **Especially** the back door and all garage doors (*warm weather attracts criminals who look for unlocked doors*).
- 3. Ask The Calumet Park Police Department for a vacation watch (*notify the Police Department prior to your vacation*)
- 4. Stop mail and/or newspaper delivery for the duration of your trip.
- 5. Set lighting timers in your home while away.
- 6. Don't post your vacation plans on social media and don't post any photos until you're back.

A MESSAGE FROM CALCOMM 9-1-1 DISPATCH CENTER



Did You Know?

- That nationwide, over 240 million 9-1-1 calls are made annually?
 - That the very first 9-1-1 call was made on February 16, 1968?
 - That you can text your emergency situation silently to 9-1-1?

9-1-1 began as an easy number to dial and remember in the event of an emergency. By the end of 1976, (our nations bi-centennial year) only 17% of the population had 9-1-1 Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) services. In fact, it wasn't until 1987 that 50% of the U.S. population had the number 9-1-1 to contact police, fire and emergency medical services for urgent help. Today over 98% of locations in the United States and Canada have 9-1-1 Emergency Communication Centers.

Through the years, 9-1-1 has improved its capabilities from just a three-digit number to dial, to enhancement of automatic number and location information provided to the 9-1-1 Telecommunicator. With the development and incorporation of Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) data is automatically generated into a call for service screen and allows the 9-1-1 personnel to refer to any premise alerts, review previous call history, obtain specific location instructions or information, provide names and vehicles associated with the address, as well as particular cautions for the safety and wellbeing of first responders.

Today's Next Generation technologies allow cellular callers to be tracked on an enhanced mapping system, allow for 9-1-1 to text "silent" calling, and in the very near future, the ability to send photos and video captures to the 9-1-1 Center. These features are also available to businesses which use Voice-Over-IP phone systems. In addition, 9-1-1 calls can be conferenced in with valuable services such as language interpreters, poison control centers, County, State and Federal agencies as well as being transferred to other 9-1-1 jurisdictions and emergency communications centers.

Village Beautification Should Begin on Your Block

Fall is here! With Fall comes leaves and dead trees.

Residents are reminded to place yard waste in approved disposable bags by your garbage receptacles for refuse pick up. Please remember that it is against Village ordinance #02-804 to place leaves and other yard waste (including branches and bushes) by curbs, blown or raked into the streets, which can result in tickets/fines. Each year we are getting more severe rain and storms, by following the above referenced ordinance this will help to avoid flooding caused by blocked sewer covers. Residents can help protect their property by removing debris from sewer covers while they perform maintenance on their lawns.

Also, please keep in mind that it is the home/property owner's responsibility to cut and maintain ALL areas of their property. This includes along fence lines, parkways AND behind the property/Alley areas. Along with the above mentioned ordinance, the following ordinances will also be closely monitored:

- Ordinance # 94-629 (high grass and weeds/garbage in the alley)
 - Ordinance #82-389 (accumulation of waste or rubbish)

As mentioned, it is against Village ordinance to place your branches and bushes in the alley. In order for these items to be picked up by the GARBAGE Company, branches must be cut in lengths of less than four (4) feet and must be bundled and tied together weighing less than 45 pounds.

Contact Republic Services at (708) 385-8252 for all large item disposals. You can call them to set up "special pickup" of large items such as couches, dressers, furniture, etc.
