27th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 21:33-43



Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people: "Hear another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a hedge around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a tower. Then he leased it to tenants and went on a journey. When vintage time drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants to obtain his produce. But the tenants seized the servants and one they beat, another they killed, and a third they stoned. Again he sent other servants, more numerous than the first ones, but they treated them in the same way. Finally, he sent his son to them, thinking, 'They will respect my son.' But when the tenants saw the son, they said to one another, 'This is the heir. Come, let us kill him and acquire his inheritance.' They seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. What will the owner of the vineyard do to those tenants when he comes?" They answered him, "He will put those wretched men to a wretched death and lease his vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the proper times." Jesus said to them, "Did you never read in the Scriptures: The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; by the Lord has this been done, and it is wonderful in our eyes? Therefore, I say to you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that will produce its fruit."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

27th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A

Matthew 21:33-43

"You talking to me!" Today's reading says Jesus targeted the 'Chief Priests and Elders' with this vineyard parable. They didn't respond to him verbally, but the episode ends with them walking away planning "how to arrest him, though they feared the crowds" (Mt 21:46). They got the point. Yet unfortunately, they will persist in their sinful wrongheadedness. We wish that the Chief priests and Elders would have changed their tune, like King David did in the Old Testament story of his subtle confrontation by Nathan. The Prophet Nathan conducted an 'intervention' on the sinning King David, using a wisely targeted parable that would lead David to realize his error, seeing it first clearly in another person. In 2 Samuel 12: 1-7, we hear about Nathan suggesting a parable scenario to David about a corrupt and powerful man who steals and kills. David's response is just and fair, as he demands that the wrongdoer be punished. And Nathan quickly points out to David, "That man is you" (2 Sam 12:7). Of course, David admits his guilt (2 Sam 12:13), and enters a period of repentance and conversion again to God. However, in today's gospel Jesus does not get a similar penitential response from the Chief Priests and Elders. Their vindictive response to the tale of the criminal vineyard tenants, implies that something does strike their heart (the 'Truth hurts' reaction), but they stubbornly fail to admit any responsibility for 'hijacking' religion for their own selfish gain. Jesus is trying patiently to reach them, but they seem intransigent in their perversion of justice as they add to their sin of bullying people with religious laws by treating Jesus cruelly and eventually killing Him (just like the vineyard owner's Son is killed).

Most often, Jesus taught universally a message to everyone in the crowds without any distinction about who He may be specifically addressing, such as when he often says, **"Let those with ears, hear!"** (Matt 11:15, 13:9,43, Mark 4:9,23, Luke 8:8, 14:35). But at other times (like today He calls out the 'Chief Priests and Elders') he singles out a specific group for a special address. Luke's gospel seems to do this more than the other gospels. A couple examples in Luke include, 7:39-43 when Jesus targets Simon the Pharisee's hypocrisy, after Simon judgmentally condemned a repentant woman who had washed Jesus' feet. Again, in Luke 18:10-14 Jesus aimed a parable about two men going to Temple (one justified and one not) at people who arrogantly proclaimed their own 'self-righteousness'. And again, in Luke 15:1-32, Jesus targeted the 'Scribes and Pharisees' who jealously complained about the conversion of tax collectors with a volley of three parables (Lost sheep, coin and son). I think Luke is helping us as readers to understand the specific context and occasion that led to certain of Jesus' teaching (as the most historian-like of the gospel writers --Lk 1:3--Luke is detailing the context and characters that occasion Jesus' specific teaching-who the audience was and what event provoked Jesus' response). But regardless of who Jesus is specifically addressing, we all gain by listening to His lessons. Everything Jesus says, teaches -- He is always enlightening anyone who will listen. We are well-advised to apply everything that He says, as if He is specifically addressing us with every word! **He is talking to Us!**

In Matthew 21:42, Jesus quotes Psalm 118:22--23 about the 'stone rejected by the builders has become the cornerstone'. He is gently reminding us to keep our eyes open and be slow to write off or reject what may be God's will/choice for us. Sometimes God places right under our nose what we are seeking most, but we do not see or recognize it. Also, we can be quick to throw away or ignore what we need most! That is a good 'wake-up' lesson. Yet, also, I think Jesus is drawing attention to the Book of Psalms in general as a call for more prayer for all of us. What was the last Psalm you prayed? Or what is your favorite Psalm? The Book of Psalms is the Old Testament book Jesus quoted most often from (His second most favorite book was Deuteronomy, with Isaiah and Exodus coming in at third and fourth!) The Book of Psalms was the Hebrew Hymnal, song book of sung prayers, so it is easy to understand why their lyrics rolled right off the tongue of our Lord so much (like a catchy church song that echoes in your head long after mass is over). So, yes, Psalms are hymns, yet they are also prayers (so, reciting Psalms is praying!) In the early church, the Psalms became the foundation of prayer and grew into what we call today the Universal Prayer of the Church, the Liturgy of the Hours (the Divine Office). As Psalm 119:164 reminds us, **"Seven times a day I praise you"**, so the Liturgy of Hours has seven times of prayer (major prayer times of *morning, evening and nighttime, along with shorter prayers in between them called Prime, Terce, Sext and one session of instructions called the Office of Readings*). The original version of the Hours prayed all 150 Psalms in a week's time, yet now they are spread out over a four-week period to more prayerfully spend reflection upon the words prayed. Our prayer is so organized, so that we can structure our days with frequent contact with God, and so all of our 'hours' of the day are consecrate to God. The Psalms help to regulate our relationship to God. But, the Psalms also help us identify with all of the various experiences and emotions that are so characteristic of begin human. Sometimes certain psalms speak more to us than others, based on our situation in life, but even when they do not resonate so well, we have much to gain from them by trying to put ourselves into the 'prayer shoes' of the psalmists expressing their heart's concerns to God. A wonderful practice is to try and pray at least one psalm a day. Not just our favorites, but pray any of them, and eventually pray all of them as if the words are our own. This can make us more well-rounded, compassionate and understanding toward others. Such prayer allows us to hold in our hearts, the full spectrum of feelings that arises from our human condition with all of its spiritual issues. Something to pray about, Fr Brian
