

NOVEMBER MEETING

On November 18, fourteen Broomfield Spellbinders gathered at Brunner Farmhouse for our monthly meeting. **Julie Toepper** welcomed all, and **Wynn Montgomery** presented Certificates of Training Completion to **Jim Mariner**, **Tiffany Painter**, and **Carla Randall** (in absentia; **Janis Lievens** will deliver it to her) Wynn also noted that **Marsha Coons** holds the distinction of the quickest turnaround from first attending a meeting to completing training. She attended our October 21st meeting as a guest and has already completed classroom training in Longmont and shadowing with Wynn.

Everyone then introduced themselves and shared the story of their worst cooking disaster. Those tales were too long to recap here, but they ranged from funny to potential disasters. **Janis** discussed the successful Halloween telling event at Anthem Ranch, which was described in last month's newsletter, and invited volunteers for a similar event on December 17. **Julie** announced that the Steering Committee has approved the purchase of new bookshelves for our library and a second printing Wynn's "Pop Tales" to be sold as a fundraiser for Broomfield Spellbinders. **Kathy Daniels** then told a Thanksgiving story about Wishbone Farms with Runt, the youngest turkey, as the hero.

After a break for socializing and snacks provided by **Kathy Daniels** and **Kay Landers**, Kathy suggested some Christmas books from the library. We then enjoyed a presentation by Shirley Stafford of the Denver LLSO on "Incorporating Music and Puppets into Stories." Shirley reviewed the history of puppets and discussed the four types of puppets: 1) Hand Puppets (the most common), 2) Finger Puppets, 3) Stick Puppets and 4) Marionettes (and Shadow Puppets). She incorporated stories and songs ("Three Fiddlin' Grasshoppers", "Star in the Apple", "There's a Spider on the Floor", and "Big Man Drum") in her session and closed by showing us how to make a simple puppet using construction paper.

Judy Kundert distributed flyers about the Society of Children Book Writers and Illustrators (SCBWI) Birthday Bash on November 19th and told us about her new book, *Abigail and Sego's Magical Train Ride*. **Denny Thompson** announced the December 11 performance of two "Old Time Radio Christmas Comedies" by the Advent Radio Players.
