mongst the most beloved of children's book is Shel Silverstein's **The Giving Tree**. A tale of a giver and a taker, the giving tree is happy to give whatever it can to its beloved boy, while he has gone on to a life of consumption and futility. Happiness is, for the boy/man, ever fleeting, whereas the tree stays rooted to its spot, ever-ready to sacrifice toward

the goal of a happy boy. On February 10-11, Friday night and Shabbos, we will again mark Tu BiShevat, the so-called Jewish Arbor Day and our New Years for Trees. The Jewish legal basis for this New Years is unromantic. In order to properly tithe tree-grown produce,

farmers needed to know which year in the tithing cycle the trees in his orchard had blossomed. Thus, if the tree blossomed before Tu BiShevat, for the purpose of tithing the fruit belongs to the previous year; if after Tu BiShevat, the fruit is counted toward the next year. (Please join us for our Shabbat meal and Tu BiShevat Seder on Friday night!)

We could leave the matter at its simplest except for the great symbolic role of the tree in our Torah The Tree of Knowledge and the Tree of Life in the Garden of Eden; *"etz chaim hee* - It is a Tree of Life for those who grasp for it", the halachot of war found in the book of Deuteronomy that protect fruit trees from

destruction; and the verse there: "For is the tree like a person to fall before you in siege?" - the Torah compares trees to people. For us a tree is not just a tree.

The special trees from the Garden of Eden had the power to give, either sophistication or eternal life. When Adam and Eve choose to "know good and evil", they forfeit the possibility

> of receiving eternal life through the Tree of Knowledge. Yet through the Torah - "a tree of Life for those who grasp it" - a life of Eternal value and a beautiful existence beyond this one are given to us again (my thanks to Harvey Golubock for insight into the connection

between the Tree of Life and the Torah).

Real trees are giving things, and in ways that earlier generations could not understand. Driven by a lust for "development" our world has stripped the forests to unprecedented levels of depletion, threatening our biosphere and blighting countless beautiful forests. All the while our trees give us our oxygen, root our soil and feed us, and ask for nothing more than life in return.

As we enter a new year for trees let us reflect on the beauty and bounty of G-d's trees, care and give back to them, and reaffirm our deep connection with our Torah, the true Giving Tree.

## THE ALEPH BETS OF HEBREW by Bill Bradin

Hebrew is not such a difficult egg to crack. Each month, I plan to try and define Hebrew words and expressions that we commonly use in our daily vernacular.

This month let's examine the word **Bracha**, which is pronounced **b'racha**. **Bracha** is one of the most commonly used words in its many forms in our services and in our daily life. The word **Bracha** simply means "blessing". The root of the word (**bet-resh-chaf**). **Bracha** is from the infinitive **L'varech** and means "to bless". There are those who say a **bracha** (singular) and/or **brachot** (plural) for everything they do on a daily basis. We recite the **Birchat HaMazon** after the meals.

In our three daily services, we recite multiple **brachot**. We start off these services when there is a Minyan with the imperative form of **bracha** which is **Barchu**. This same form of the word is used when are called up for an Aliya to the Torah. The central prayer of the daily services is called the **Amidah** (because we stand) or synonymously the **Sh'monah Esreh** (which means 18) because it contains 18 requests and **brachot** that we direct to HaShem.

When greeting and welcoming one another in Hebrew, we say **Baruch HaBa** (singular) and **Bruchim HaBa'im** (plural). When wishing one another Shabbat Shalom, the response is Shabbat Shalom **u'Mivurach**. May you have a "blessed and complete Shabbat".

We ask for a **misheberach** when one is ill or in need of additional attention. To understand this we should break this down to **mi she'berach** (he that blessed......) and typically is followed by our forefathers, refers to HaShem bestowing upon us or others that additional blessing for extra protection.

The word is **Bracha** is a very common Hebrew name for women. Its male counterpart is **Baruch**.

Another interesting point about the logic of the Hebrew language is the word for knee. In Hebrew, knee is **berech** (**be-rech**). This word has the same root as **bracha**. It is very interesting because we are supposed to bend at the knee before bowing when we say the **Barchu** as well as other parts of the service that require bending over.

Going forward, may we all be blessed with many **brachot** now and always.

#### JUDAISM 101

#### The following was taken from a post on Facebook by Michael J Nadel from Toronto ON Canada dated November 8, 2015

n Crown Heights, there was a Jew, Yankel, who owned a bakery. He survived the camps. He once said, "You know why it is that I'm alive today? I was a kid, just a teenager at the time. We were on the train, in a boxcar, being taken to Auschwitz. Night came and it was freezing, deathly cold, in that boxcar. The Germans would leave the cars on the side of the tracks overnight, sometimes for days on end without any food, and of course, no blankets to keep us warm," he said. "Sitting next to me was an older Jew - this beloved elderly Jew from my hometown I recognized, but I had never seen him like this. He was shivering from head to toe, and looked terrible. So I wrapped my arms around him and began rubbing him, to warm him up. I rubbed his arms, his legs, his face, his neck. I begged him to hang on. All night long; I kept the man warm this way. I was tired, I was freezing cold

myself, my fingers were numb, but I didn't stop rubbing the heat on to this man's body. Hours and hours went by this way. Finally, night passed, morning came, and the sun began to shine. There was some warmth in the cabin, and then I looked around the car to see some of the other Jews in the car. To my horror, all I could see were frozen bodies, and all I could hear was a deathly silence.

Nobody else in that cabin made it through the night – they died from the frost. Only two people survived: the old man and me... The old man survived because somebody kept him warm; I survived because I was warming somebody else..."

Let me tell you the secret of Judaism. When you warm other people's hearts, you remain warm yourself. When you seek to support, encourage and inspire others; then you discover support, encouragement and inspiration in your own life as well. That, my friends, is "**Judaism 101**".

#### BLUE AND WHITE AND RED AND GREEN OR "SEEING THE FOREST FOR THE TREES" by Eileen Pollack

"Mrs. Pollack, do ya' think Jewish people would make such a big deal over Chanukah if it fell out in July?".....

Art Linkletter (remember him – '60's TV show host) was absolutely correct. After interviewing young children from all over the United States, he concluded that "Kids say the darndest things."

So there I was, some thirty years ago, explaining to my fifth grade Hebrew School class the how to's of properly lighting the menorah, when I was forced to pause, gather my thoughts and respond:

"Yes, many Jewish people would observe the holiday whenever it would take place," I replied. "Those of us who celebrate being Jewish every day of the calendar - we feel close to G-d and we know that He is always near to us. We are proud that G-d gave us the Torah – His special gift to the Jewish people."

"But some Jewish people, who don't really think about being Jewish, need others to remind them of how wonderful it is to celebrate holidays and to feel connected to G-d. They do this in the month of December when the rest of the world shakes them by the shoulders and wakes them up. That's when these Jewish people remember they have a holiday too - Chanukah."

My reaction to the question seemed to satisfy my students, and we continued with the usual festivities throughout the month. Children are so bright and insightful, as well as absolutely adorable. And each year since, as I prepare the menorahs and the dreidls etc., I re-visit that question and my response. Especially this year...

Recently, as I was unwinding from a particularly long and busy day, I decided to watch one of the late night TV shows.... After all, who wants to fall asleep to the crisis and tragedy in the world being broadcast on the Eleven O'Clock News? One of Hollywood's most

popular actresses, starring in a current movie, was being interviewed and asked how she planned to spend the December holidays. She was thrilled to share the news that for the first time in thirty five years she was planning to have "A Tree"..... Now, that probably wouldn't have brought much response from the audience and the host himself, except that this actress is Jewish – born in Jerusalem and grew up on Long Island. "You know, she said, it's kind of every Iew's secret wish to have a Xmas Tree."

Although much of the Jewish world reacted with horror to her statement, I can't say that I was shocked – although it was an exaggeration. I'm a Jew, and I can't say that I ever had the desire for "a Tree". Having grown up in an almost entirely Christian neighborhood in Brooklyn, December was truly a magical month for me. Although my mother, of blessed memory, always made sure that we meticulously observed our holiday - she even created her own Chanukah decorations cutting and pasting for weeks while wrapping gifts and planning a beautiful Chanukah party for extended family and friends - still the lights, the wreaths and yes, the trees, made our little menorahs seem to pale by comparison. I loved admiring each of my neighbors' magnificent lawns and homes – filled with lights and Santa and reindeer, but I was never envious. All of this belonged to other people. I had my own holiday.

To be totally honest, though, if someone interviewed me and asked me if I would secretly wish to try tasting non-Kosher food, I probably would answer "Absolutely......But, since, the Torah forbids us from eating these foods, I cannot. They are for others to enjoy." That would be my answer. Bottom line: we are all only human – wanting to partake and experience everything this world has to offer. But sometimes we have to hold back. G-d comes first.

Come to think of it... it wasn't just the memories of the December trees that remained with me through the years. Each summer our family would head up to "the mountains" – the Catskills, of course. It wasn't the altitude that took my breath away. Rather, seeing all of the green and lush trees that surrounded us through the drive – I was mesmerized.

Every July, I'd ask my mother the very same question as we approached Monticello, our place of destination.

"Who planted all of these trees?" Her one word answer said it all: "G-d".

As we celebrate Tu B'Shevat – the New Year of the Trees - Jews and non-Jews can all pay tribute to and honor the trees – they belong to everyone. They nurture and protect us. They provide us with shade, with oxygen we so desperately need, with sweet fruit and lumber. The holidays and decorations may long be over, but the everlasting value of the trees remains. Do we measure a person by the clothing he wears or the jewelry that adorns him sometimes? Of course not. What draws us to a human being is his outstanding character and his loving soul. It is the G-dliness within him.

So it is with the trees.... Or, as Joyce Kilmer, the American poet who lived in Mahwah, New Jersey, said it so well..... "Poems are made by fools like me. But only G-d can make a tree."


