Thick-billed Parrots

Thick-billed Parrot Background Information

The thick-billed parrot (TBP) once ranged into the US, and resided in the mountains of SE Arizona. TBP's were eventually extirpated from their US range, in part due to hunting pressure in the late 1800's. TBP's are now usually found only in Mexico, ranging nearly the length of the Sierra Madre. Occidental in important timber producing areas; the birds nest in dispersed distributions in cavities of tree snags. TBP's can be found in one Mexican nesting colony, within a few hundred miles of El Paso.

The American Zoo & Aquarium Association's TBP Species Survival Plan members (including the El Paso Zoo) has helped to provide aid and funding to augment the great work being done by Mexican biologists and conservationists, especially in the Tutuaca Forest Reserve.


UTEP offers free walking tours twice each month and also holds monthly community workdays at Rio Bosque We could not fulfill our educational mission without our dedicated volunteers.
