

Otto A. Busch, 1614 Washington Avenue, Baxter Springs, KS, son of Bertha Maeding and Otto P. Busch, was born at West Columbia, TX, on December 28, 1915. He departed this life on July 1, 1993.

O. A. accepted Christ as his Lord and Saviour at six years of age and felt God calling him to the ministry as a young teenager. He preached his first sermon at the age of 15, and conducted weekend church services from that time until the early 1940's when he went into full-time ministry. He conducted tent revivals and held evangelistic crusades in southern and midwestern states for many years. He pastored churches at the following locations: Alief, TX; Meridian, MS; Snell, MS; Cordele, TX; Crossville, TN; Granby, MO; Perryton, TX; Katy, TX, Liberal, KS; Prosperity, MO; Union Chapel, MO; and Joplin, MO. He enjoyed farming and ranching in addition to ministering the gospel.

He was united in marriage to Naomi Mahan on October 23, 1948, who survives at the home. Three children were born into this union and survive. Testimony of O. A. Busch

This was found in his desk after his death.

As far back as I can remember I have felt that the Lord has a special work for me to do. I came to the knowledge of sin forgiven soon after I reached the age of accountability, which came at the age of six for me since I was raised in a Christian home.

I was not a talented child and feeling my inadequacies I struggled for inward peace. I came to the altar several times not being fully satisfied till I came into the "Standing Grace" experience of Sanctification in 1930. The words of a song best express what I was experiencing. "I tried to be, but couldn't be a christian in my heart. I struggled night and day my moral debt to pay." But when I made Jesus my Lord and Master, I found this grace wherein we stand. Then things began to open up for me.

At the East Bernard Campmeeting in 1931, the Lord graciously filled me with His precious Holy Spirit. What a glorious experience. Soon after that I began to help in revivals doing whatever was needed to be done. My first sermon was in a nursing home in Galveston, Texas at the age of 15. From that start I started having week-end services in different churches where they didn't have a pastor or a minister would need a fill-in when he had to be gone. I felt at this time that ministering on Sundays and working at a job 6 days a week was sufficient. But God had different plans for me.

Campmeeting became a yearly must after that first one in 1931. It was at a Campmeeting in Cave Springs, Arkansas in 1940 that my future took on a whole new meaning. I had heard the ministers preach about Consecration in sentiment and consecration in reality and had wondered about it. But at this time I had to consecrate in reality for the full time ministry. I came home from campmeeting and gave my resignation at work to be effective October 1. They didn't take me seriously but told me that the "fizz of religion would soon wear off'. But after 47 years, I still say Lord, I'll go where you want me to go and be what you want me to be. I still haven't lost the fizz!! (Note: This was written by Bro. Busch 6 years ago. At the time of his death he had been in full time ministry for 53 years and had preached for 62 years).

I started in Alief, Texas with a borrowed tent and announced the revival for a week, but after several weeks a storm blew the tent down and we had to close. I stayed at Alief and saw a church built. Since that time I have worn out three tents, and have had many meetings in school buildings, courthouses, brush arbors and in rural churches as well as in established churches of different denomi-

nations along with those in our own Apostolic Faith churches.

Paul writes to the Romans "I am a debtor". And I certainly am too. I am in debt to a praying Mother and Father and to my brothers and sisters. In 1948 God gave me a help mate, who has shared the same burden I have, and never complained as we moved from place to place. We, mostly she, have raised 3 children on the front pew of whatever church we pastored. She and the children were with me in the revivals whenever the children weren't in school. God arranged our marriage and we have been a team together for Him.

I am in debt to every church that called me to be their pastor. In checking over the list, I find there were a total of 12 churches. I haven't kept an accurate list of the revivals I've been privileged to hold, but I counted up thirty some places off the beaten track. God has met our needs for body, soul and spirit. We haven't had to beg or hint in the pulpit or by mail.

My accomplishments are none -- just a vessel sent of God and filled with the Holy Spirit.

MEN OUGHT ALWAYS TO PRAY

There is a parable in Lk. 18: 1-8, that teaches a wonderful lesson about prayer. We call it the parable of the Unjust Judge. In this account the Lord shows us a marvelous truth.

In the opening of the parable Jesus admonished those who followed him that men ought always to pray, and not faint. It is a simple statement that we should be able to accomplish without

difficulty. But what does it actually mean?

As with many scriptures in the Bible, there is more here than what first meets the eye. The word "faint" in the scripture means to fail in heart: to turn cowardly and run away. To let your weakness overcome you. So Jesus is telling us that we should not turn cowardly when it comes to the ministry of prayer. And, prayer is a ministry.

It implies that prayer is not always easy or pleasant. It suggests that there will be obstacles to our good intentions to pray. It is safe to say that Satan would rather have us doing almost anything

other than praying.

In the parable Jesus introduces two people. The first one is a judge. A judge who had a great deal of power over people's lives. A man with the authority to help or hinder the future of other citizens. This judge did not fear God. The scripture says that he had no reverence for God whatsoever. In addition he did not regard or respect man.

The other character in the parable was an entirely different kind of person. She was a widow woman. She had no husband, and apparently no other close relatives. She had no one to speak for her. She had no wealth or substance, no influence, and she possessed nothing to impress this judge

who had no respect for anyone.

In short, this woman was a nobody. In spite of that she came to the unjust judge and made her petition to him. She said, avenge me of my adversary. It was the judge's place to take some action in regards to her request. That was his job. But this judge did not fear God or respect man, and certainly would have no time for this unimportant widow woman.

So he told her that he would not act in her behalf. She went away. But the next time court convened she was back. She asked him again to avenge her. He refused. She went away, but later

she returned to renew her petition.

The Bible does not tell us how many times the widow came before the unjust judge, but we know she must have come again and again. Perhaps he became angry. He might have ridiculed her, and it is certain he became more forceful with his refusals---but she kept coming. He turned her

away---but she kept coming. He rejected her pleas-

--but she kept coming.

She was persistent. She would not be put off. Finally she irritated the judge to the point that he began talking to himself. The scripture tells us, "He said within himself, though I fear not God, nor regard Man, I will avenge her." All because of the determination of one poor, unimportant widow who would not be denied.

The unjust judge said I do not care anything for this widow woman. I don't care if she gets justice or not. But because she is going to wear me out and weary me to death, I will grant her request.

Then Jesus said, "Hear what the unjust judge is saying." The unjust judge is saying that though he had no thought for the woman, he would

help her because she was bothering him.

And then Jesus makes a comparison. First of all the judge was unjust. God, on the other hand is a just God. Once we understand that God is just, then we can understand the rest of the message. And the rest of the message is given in the words of Jesus.

"Shall not God avenge his own elect, which cry day and night onto him." He goes on to say he will not defer their pleas or delay help onto them. Then he declares, "I tell you he will avenge them speedily. He will not make us wait when we petition him. And the reason is clear. He is not the unjust judge, he is the righteous God.

So he tells us that even the hateful, unjust judge will grant the pleas of the widow, but only because she is troubling him, and not because he cares. But that God, wanting to bless us more than we want to be blessed, will outshine all the reluc-

tant givers of this world.

So we ought always to pray and not turn cowardly and run away from the beauty of prayer. There are many reasons why we should pray, but the greatest of these is because God has told us to do so, and that when we do he will answer us quickly.

There is a tremendous ministry in prayer waiting for every one of us, and the best way to learn what we are missing when we neglect our prayer life is to renew that discipline and see for ourselves how an intensified prayer relationship

will change every aspect of our lives.

Just think, you need no special talents to pray. Just the will to do so. You are never hindered by someone upstaging you or taking your place in prayer, and you need not worry about anyone deciding how good you are at the job. It will be between you and God. It is a wide-open, oft neglected ministry.

We hear much talk of programs and regimens to cure the ills of the church. They are only

appropriate after we have sanctified them with vision-clearing prayer. We must see before we act, and it is true that the tear-washed view is always sharper than the parched visions reflected from eyes that do not know the cleansing flow of prayer-induced tear.

The simple message of the parable of the Unjust Judge tells us that in this world justice is

hard to come by, but in God, the just one, relief is always available, and that speedily.

The problems that most of us face in church or movement, or in our personal lives, will never be overcome until we learn the meaning of the words of Jesus, when said, "Man ought always to pray, and not to faint."

Pray without ceasing I Thessolonians 5:17

SERMON IN A CEMETERY

We don't know whether Elwood T. George was a minister or not, but we know he preached at least one sermon.

His sermon is engraved in marble in a cemetery at Carmel, Indiana. On one side of his gravestone is the question, "IS YOUR SOUL SAVED?" On the other side are the words:

"Elwood T. George, Born Aug. 20, 1857. "Born from above' (John 3:3) Dec. 6 1877, Departed to be with Christ July 27, 1945. "To me to live is Christ, and to die is gain' (Phil.1:21)."

In case you don't remember what John 3:3 says,here it is: "Jesus answered and said unto him, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God."

Mr. George certainly chose an excellent text for his posthumous sermon. It is from the conver-




In this conversation our Lord uttered some of the most frequently quoted words in the entire Bible:


All our graduates in the fields send reports of their work and it is not the same way in every place. We were able to buy plots for church build-



A GREAT REVIVAL

Baxter Spring, Kans. December 16,1916

The great revival in Prosperity, Mo. begun by Sister May Hinckley and continued by Brother Parham, has broken out afresh since the Inter-State Convention. Brother Parham was called to Prosperity to preach the funeral of a man who was saved during the revival and who died shouting happy, and found the revival flame still burning. Meetings were announced for one week. This is the second week and still the alters are

full. Large crowds fill the hall and yards. The entire community is under conviction. Scores have been saved, many of them old church members, while Pentecost falls at nearly every service. Some very wonderful miracles are wrought in healings. Many are saved in their homes.

Later reports say that this meeting is exceeding all bounds; the oldest citizens have

never witnessed such scenes.

ANNIVERSARY AND HOMECOMING

The Apostolic Faith Church of Prosperity, Mo. will observe their anniversary and homecoming October 10, 1993.

The church began in 1903 when the gospel was brought to the community by S.E. Waterbury and other early ministers of the faith. Services in the early years were first held in a store building, then later a church building was constructed. The church originally had dirt floor covered with gravel.

Prosperity was a boom-town in the lead and zink mining fields at that time. In 1906, a twelve-year old boy by the name of Clarence Heckendorn was sent to Prosperity by Bro.

200 people were saved.



The present church was built in 1962 when Bro. Robert Cooper was pastor. Former pastors since the 1950's were C.O. Busch, Lyford Freeman, Tom Day, Frank Arnall, Ron Brening, and the present pastors Wayne and Kay Wheeler.

The services will begin with morning ser-



vices at 10:30, lunch will be served at 12:30 and afternoon service at 2:00.

Special music and preaching by former pastors will be featured. The group "Canaan Bound" with Bro. Frank Arnall will be featured.

We are happy to report the church has been growing and we are in the planning stages for an addition to the church. Two years ago we began to pray for an outreach and God has marvelously blessed us with an opportunity to reach young people. We recently had a VBS for children with an enrollment of 32 and a Youth Revival which was attended by about 25 teenagers. Several of our young people have recently received the Holy Spirit. LAUNCH OUT INTO THE DEEP..... by Ron Noble

Luke 5:1-4 "And it came to pass, that, as the people pressed upon him to hear the work of God, he stood by the lake of Gennesaret, 2- and saw two ships standing by the lake: but the fishermen were gone out of them, and were washing their nets. 3-And he entered into one of the ships, which was Simon's, and prayed him that he would thrust out a little from the land. And he sat down, and taught the people out of the ship. 4-Now when he had left speaking, he said unto Simon, Launch out into the deep, and let down your nets for a draught. 5-And Simon answering said unto him. Master, We have toiled all the night, and have taken nothing: nevertheless at thy word I will let down the net. 6-And when they had this done, they inclosed a great multitude of fishes: and their net brake. 7-And they beckoned unto their partners, which were in the other ship, that they should come and help them. And they came, and filled both the ships, so that they began to sink. 8-When Simon Peter saw

it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying. Depart from me; for I am a sinful man, O Lord. 9-For he was astonished, and all that were with him, at the draught of the fishes which they had taken: 10-and so was also James, and John, the sons of Zebedee, which were partners with Simon. Jesus said unto Simon, Fear not; from henceforth thou shalt catch men. 11-And when they had brought their ships to land, they forsook all, and followed him."

While many subjects could be given attention from these verses. I would like to focus on one thing--- the willingness to do, regardless. This had been a great challenge to this writer and I hope to be able to, not necessarily to reveal something new, but rather to bring ;freshness'.

Simon Peter, in verse 5 'we have toiled all the night (by our own efforts, we have had no result) nevertheless (in spite of that) at THY (Unexplainable, authoritative) WORD I will . . ' My Christian friend. Peter was willing to try again. even after having already tried and failed. Are we willing to do the same or would the attitude be to give excuses why it couldn't be done?

This entire episode wasn't about catching fish any more than this was the time (that was to come) in Matthew 14 when this same Simon Peter would step out of the ship to walk on the water (and fall short here also.)

This visual aid of what will happen if people are not only willing to do, but they will do that which they say they are willing to do. Peter and the other Apostles were so encouraged, so convinced by HIS WORD that for His sake, they forsook all and followed Him. All this because Peter

had dared to do . . . again!

This is why 95% of the people in life seem content to go their own way; to remain (if it were possible) at a shallow, unvictorious experience because it cost very little. But what of the other five percent? What is it that lights their fuse? Is it not grim determination and faithfulness to God that causes them to do; regardless of how the circumstances are?

Unfortunely, too many of us see the obstacles while the objective becomes dim. To lose sight of the End of our Hope is to be defeated. "If thou faint in the day of adversity, thy strength is small."

Christian life takes more than saying, "There must be more shooting and less shouting; fewer words and more real work. Words will not plow a field; will not build a house; will not develop a great nation nor a great humanity." Theodore Roosevelt.

There are risks in taking the Dare To Do: the same as there is the risk in not doing. "For many, the risk is not of shipwreck and failure on the way. but it is one of rust and decay." The devil will whisper to you "you won't be able to make it, you'll fail, etc." This is one time that we need to turn a 'deaf ear' and continue on. Launching a ship is a grand occasion (I've heard) but the contrary winds are the real test. To start with the Lord is joyous, but how we act and react will determine the outcome. I've read of the

covered wagons when they began heading west 'the coward never started; the weak died on the way; only the strong came through.'

Sometimes, it may seem foolish even to start. It was foolish (in man's eyes) for David to fight Goliath or Samson to defy the Philistines, BUT WHAT IF THEY HADN'T TRIED?

The unfathomable Power and Blessings of God that is available. Can you imagine Niagra Falls, with it's rushing, tumbling, almost irresistible force of water? Suppose you were to walk up to get some water and said 'Only a cupful please!' With God's Power and pouring out of Himself, isn't it pitiful when we say 'Only a cupful please.'

We need to do what Jesus said to do and that will always be the right thing to do!

LEST WE FORGET!

While visiting a "Remember Pearl Harbor" service, I saw many long years of war suffering, separation, loneliness they are embodied in that statement. One of the frailties of human nature is that of forgetting. It is easy to forget not necessarily of loss of memory, but the overcrowding of responsibilities and involvements of life tend to push things into the background and soon be forgotten.

Peter wrote in his letters to stir minds and call people to remembrance of former things. Mush of the Old Testament was written to remind Israel of their transgression and the cost their forefathers had to pay for their sins and neglect. "Be sure your sins will find you out." "Whatsoever a man soweth that shall He also reap. These are reminders and yet multitudes of Christians go on unmindful and unconcerned as to the devastating results of forget-

Lest We Forget we have been purged from our own sins. II Peter 1;9. Strange as it may seem this is what the Bible says concerning the overcrowding of the mind and heart with temporal things. This can push a person into the brink of permissiveness. Are we growing, thriving, serving Christians or have we forgotten the time Christ saved us from our sins. It is worth remembering is it not?

Lest We Forget the price of eternal redemption. Since God gave his only Son to die for us, shouldn't we in love give Him our time, service and dedication in service to Him? He reminds us "If you love me, you will keep my words." This is a reminder.

Lest We Forget the brevity of time. Our world is filled with head lines telling of the evil and unrest that is so rampant. The nations must be experiencing the time John wrote about in Revelations when He said "The nations are angry." Surely the coming of our Lord draweth nigh. If this has any meaning at all to the sincere heart of believers then it is time God's people should rise up and throw off the works of darkness and begin to serve Him with a pure heart. There is a great need to put all fear, anger, and jealously on the altar and serve the master of our lives.

Lest We Forget the requirements of Stewardship. The Bible says "It is required of a steward that he be found faithful." When Paul wrote to the Corinthian church, there was a young church that had been corrupted with selfishness, out right open sin, with covetousness and a break down of loyalty to Jesus Christ. Today news papers are filled with articles about the decline of church

attendance. Greedy ministers trying to change God's word to give way to the lusts of the world. All this and many other things are being taught and God says concerning His word, "My word is settled in Heaven," Every word of God is pure", "Heaven and earth shall pass away but by word will not pass away". It is a terrible crime against God to call Him a liar. When the creature sets himself against God to call Him a liar. When the creature sets himself against the Creator, he must be reminded that Judgement, the second death will be his portion.

Lest We Forget. We can't escape God's all seeing eye. He is concerned about what we do with our soul's conception of good and evil. Hebrews says "Not forsake the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is, but exhorting one another; and so much more as ye see the day approaching". Instead of exhorting we feel the pulling apart because of fleshly lusts in the church. A popular religious writer has put the matter in strong terms; "There has grown up among us a class of people whose religion consists for the most part in being open-minded about every thing and convinced about nothing. A generation that has tried to live within the framework of relativism is frightened of the idea that there may be absolute truths which can neither be dodged nor manipulated.'

Lest We Forget our heritage and our bethel where God gave us Mercy and Grace and spoke peace to our hearts. IT IS WORTH REMEMBER-ING!

Are we grateful for our forefathers who endured hardship to bring the Gospel to this generation? Proverbs 22;28 "Remove not the ancient landmark which thy Fathers have set." IT IS WORTH REMEMBERING.

ARTICLE VII
Doctrine

Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Creation and Formation.

Man is basically sinful and in need of Salvation. Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal

Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life. Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus

Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the

speaking in other languages.

Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Washing of Feet.

Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers

Do not condone divorce and remarriage, Matt. 19:8-9.

Destruction of the Wicked. Conditional Immortality.

Rapture of the Man Child Class.

Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly.

A ministry supported by tithes and offerings.

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teaching of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not in consistent with the above listed basic doctrines.
