I. Welcome and Moment of Silence

Felix Ruiz, Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:05am. He welcomed everyone and there was a moment of silence.

II. <u>Public Comment</u>

There were no comments at this time.

III. Approval of May 13, 2020 Minutes

In the interest of time, the minutes were tabled to allow enough time for PSRA presentation and vote.

IV. <u>Administrative Update</u>

Working on grant closeout. The FY 21-22 grant application is due October 7, 2020. The COVID-19 data report (CDR) detailing how funds are being spent is due on July 31, 2020.

V. <u>Committee Reports</u>

The PSRA PowerPoint included the work done at the SAP committee level and the Administrative Update included agenda items from the Executive Committee. Co-Chairs of the CIC and CQM committees summarized the remaining reports.

VI. <u>Priority Setting and Resource Allocation (PSRA process for Fiscal Year 2021-2022)</u>

The goal of this presentation is to review the components of the PSRA process and recommended rankings of priorities, discuss methodology for allocating resources, including recommended grant ask amount by priority and percentages.

The rankings have remained fairly constant from the previous year:

- Mental Health ranking increased to 7 (up from 8 of the previous year), anticipating the increased need for these services in light of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Oral Health Care Services was ranked 8 (as compared to 7 of the previous year) as there is now an Oral Health Care provider in Nassau County and this need is being addressed.

Other considerations include:

- The SAP Committee voted to apply for a Core Services Waiver. The waiver can be submitted before or after the FY21 grant year. The region is still required to submit a 75:25 table with the grant application.
- The HRSA expectation is that EMAs and TGAs use the percentages that are voted on to address funding cuts or increases.
- However, the SAP Committee requests that the PSRA process and recommendations may have to be revisited prior to the start of FY21 to address the potential impact of COVID-19 on services and access to care and to ensure that transportation is appropriately funded.
- Overage funds that were added to certain core services to achieve the 75:25 mandate for the purposes of the grant application will be prioritized for supportive services should the region receive the core services waiver

Six charts were reviewed, beginning with People with HIV/AIDS and Funding; Spending & Utilization; other Public Funding; Estimating Clients; Resource Allocation by Priority and ending with Proposed Allocations for FY 21-22 for Vote.

Conflict of Interest forms were completed and Council members vote on the FY21-22 PSRA as follows:
