### WE ARE CALLED TO BREAK DOWN BARRIERS

Last week we heard that all of Capernaum was gathered at the



door, asking Jesus to heal their ill and possessed. Nevertheless, we cannot imagine a leper being in that crush of people. A person covered with the sores of leprosy would not be allowed around even one other person. Any who approached would have been driven away

immediately, as indicated in the first reading. But this leper found the courage to approach Jesus, not with the words "Unclean, unclean!" but with "If you wish, you can make me clean" (Leviticus 13:45, Mark 1:40). Already excluded from society, he risked being excluded from this miracle worker.

But he was not. Jesus, moved with pity (splagchna, a physical,

visceral manifestation of sympathy), not only did not drive him away, He reached out and touched him. Even before the leprosy left him, just that touch changed him. Jesus broke physical, religious, and social boundaries, consciously and deliberately. He restored him to the community, making both him and the community whole once again. If we are to be Christ for each other, this is the challenge we are given—



not to initiate contact with someone highly contagious (leprosy in scripture could refer to any of many varieties of skin diseases, many not particularly contagious or life-threatening), but to break down ordinary barriers that keep us from each other. We can reach out in love to our sisters and brothers who have been excluded. We have the power to heal the strained bonds that bind humanity.

By his words and by his actions, Saint Paul did whatever he could to heal humanity's bonds. He counseled the Corinthians to act as he did, to resist offending others and to do what they could for the benefit of all. In doing so, we can all imitate Christ.

### Lenten Almsgiving Religious Ed Project

Imagine your child at the age of 10 being orphaned because of 20 years of war in your country. He is now scavenging



through scraps that people throw away to find food and living in the Homelessness among children is a particularly acute cation problem in South Sudan, with many children living in the streets, cemeteries, markets, etc. They are

often subject to violence and exploitation.

Why am I telling you this? For the past 15 or so years, each Lent we sponsor a Lenten almsgiving project that benefits various missions run by the Missionary Society of St Paul, commonly known as MSP, which is the order in which the priests of our parish belong. During Lent the money we save from what we give up is meant to be used to help the poor. This year we plan to help children in war torn South Sudan at an MSP mission.

In a small way, the MSP Fathers try to help these street children at their South Sudan Mission. They presently have rescued 25 young boys between the ages of 10 and 15 from the streets. The 25 boys rescued from the streets will receive an education at the MSP Fathers school program which is considered the best school in the state. They will have food to eat, a shelter where they can lay their heads at night and health care in a country where children die from diseases easily cured. Last year through our Lenten almsgiving we were able to provide the MSP Fathers will donations to care for five children for the year. It presently cost approximately \$450 per year for each child.

I am asking every family in our parish to consider joining us this year by either picking up an almsgiving container in the back of the church on Ash Wednesday or making your own at home from an empty can, plastic container, or zip lock bag. Each day place the change you saved by what you and your family give up for Lent in the container. At the end of Lent, right after Easter, return the container to us. If we each do our small part, collectively we can make the world a better place one child at a time.

We entrust ourselves to you, Health of the Sick.


At the foot of the Cross you participated in Jesus' pain,
