<sup>30</sup> "Go to the village ahead of you, and as you enter it, you will find a colt tied there, which no one has ever ridden. ## Reflections from Rev. Amy

Well, here we are in the month of April. Who would have thought we would find ourselves in such a circumstance? I pray for each of you every day. Speaking for myself, I find in the midst of sheltering at home, that I am feeling a pervasive sense of vulnerability. Vulnerability is not a comfortable space for me, and how self-revealing is that? Of course, I am vulnerable! Of course, we all are vulnerable! I wonder why I think that if I do all the right things and live with a sense of purpose, calling and caregiving, that I won't fall prey to being vulnerable myself. When I reflect on this passage, it smacks me in the face: Jesus surely came face to face with his own vulnerability! Mostly we can't imagine that Jesus, the Savior, could possibly feel vulnerable. And yet, he makes the journey to Jerusalem with a good idea, I bet, of what is yet to come. How could he not feel humanly vulnerable? He was betrayed, left behind and executed. Feeling vulnerable is a reality of our life together in this world, especially now.

Being vulnerable brings us face to face with what is important to us in life. Unimportant things seem to fall off the radar. When we see what is important in life, suddenly there is a burst of endurance, a strength of character about what matters, and before we know it there is an urgent call to hope, new life, and love. Yes, we are in difficult times, yes for many of us this is unprecedented, and yes, please believe me, <u>God always shows up in our midst</u>. Jesus makes the painful and difficult journey to say that there is more to life than being afraid, there is the never-ending love of God. Jesus joins us on our journey to loudly proclaim, nothing ever will be able to separate us from the love of God. Jesus makes the journey to Jerusalem to assure us that sickness, fear, hate, selfishness, and death will never prevail. To show us that new life

wins, love wins, community wins, hope wins and <u>nothing will ever separate us</u> from the love of God. We live with hope, even in a pandemic.

"And even if we remain quiet, the stones themselves will start to sing." (Luke 19:40)

I *love* that part of the scripture... even if we as human beings weren't involved in this whole creation, God's love and embrace of the whole of creation is so all encompassing, the stones themselves would start to SING!

God isn't waiting for us to be good enough, strong enough, righteous enough.... We are good, and strong and faithful. God meets on the road every day, every hour, every moment with love and grace, no matter what!! (even if you are hoarding TP!) God gives us a spirit of perseverance and courage in the midst of fear and worry. And ponder for a moment, what actual act of courage can you think of that doesn't involve vulnerability??? God meets us no matter where we are, what we are doing and has poured love and life into our hearts.

God will journey with us. And this is our calling right now: <u>We will</u> engage one another in endless love. <u>We will</u> strive for what is right and just. <u>We will</u> be a presence of comfort and support. <u>We will</u> seek out the lost and lonely. <u>We will</u> see light in the darkness. <u>We will</u> be a spiritual presence of hope. <u>We will</u> stand up together and walk forward on the road ahead.

I know that many of us may feel worried, fatigued, maybe even a little fragile. And possibly you feel lost in a way you have never felt before. I guarantee you, that you will be found. That the God of heaven and earth will search endlessly and bring you home.

# Sowing kindness: Kelso school gifts pots of edible plants to families

KELSO, WA (KPTV) – Starting on Wednesday, families in Kelso can grow their own produce at home with help from a local school.

Catlin Elementary is offering up seeds and pots of edible plants. They were meant for kids to learn how to grow in class, but with no students actually in school, the next best thing is to send them home to families who would like to use them.

On Wednesday, there were 25 ten to fifteen-gallon pots ready to go to their new homes, filled mostly with radishes, kale and five other lettuces, and some with snap peas. Families had a chance to take a pot home with them during Wednesday's regularly scheduled lunch distribution.

"We have time and plants and soil and resources, so we're putting that together to hand these out and people have been really supportive," Ian Thompson with Lower Columbia School Gardens said.
