PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE: CO-AUTHORING CHURCH

For many of us, the "Sound of Music" is a classic favorite. Yet, there is one line in one song that is often negatively targeted. The charming and vulnerable Liesel dances around with her would-be boyfriend, Rolf, and they sing, "your life little girl is an empty page that men will want to write on!" Many women have bristled a little bit at that line, objecting to the idea that they are passive receivers of the narrative of men. We women know that we do not approach any decision or relationship "empty" ready to be filled by another.

And neither do men – no one does. The truth about our life stories is considerably more complicated, as we all bring our own agendas to life decisions, try to discern who would make a safe contributor to our narrative and trying to avoid those who are not safe. In reality, though, we do not have total control over the people and things that ultimately write our life stories. At best, we are co-authors with those who enter and exit our lives.

There are, though, some who believe that our lives in God are just as the song states: bare empty scripts waiting for God to write God's will upon them. Some folks think that the human being is like a typewriter, with God punching every key to write holy words. I am not one of those people. I believe we co-author (for good and for not-so-good) the stories of our lives in God and that every day, we are heavily involved it the task of holy meaning making – meanings in our souls where our desires and God's desires meet for conversation. That's why scripture emphasizes obedience so heavily – for a mere human to work on a meaningful project with an all -knowing God requires attention and trust. Scripturally, that is why the Apostles

stressed prayer as a means to access the Holy Spirit which God has given to all who believe. This is how we access God's side of the conversation, so that we can be faithful in our responses. We are important to the plan of God.

As we approach 2022, I believe that it is good to remember that we are co-authoring our individual story and our communal Church life story with God.

The only thing set in stone for us is the assurance that overall, in the big picture, God wins, and that when God wins, we win. But we have a role to play in the creation of our story, and we do it in uncertain times with no guaranteed picture of what steps we will be asked to take along the way. If we have learned anything from the last two years of pandemic, it should have been this: God requires a nimbly responsive peo-

ple, who are attentive to divine direction through prayer and obedient from the heart with love – no matter what challenges come their way.

I am looking ahead; committee plans are already formed for 2022, and are in the constant process of reforming . . . but as the old proverb goes, "In his heart a man plans his course, but the LORD determines his steps." I believe we will be fruitful this next year only if we keep our eyes on God, seek God's wisdom through prayer and determine to obey with joy in every circumstance. THAT is our highest way of making meaning and doing the will of God.

Ann attended Will Moore Elementary school, Bismarck Junior High and High School graduating in 1949. She enrolled at Jamestown College and received her two year standard teaching degree. While teaching, she received a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Mary in Bismarck, North Dakota. Ann taught kindergarten and elementary school for 41 years. Ann considered this her dream job and will always remember her students and families with whom she worked.




Ann's first job was looking up "kicks" at Will's Seed House. "Kicks" were complaints from the customers

who ordered from the store. Ann screened the orders and would report them to her boss. Ann also worked during the summer supervising activities at the 16th Street Playground in Bismarck. There was a wading pool there that required supervision as well.

Arley was born and raised in Bismarck, North Dakota. He had four sisters, one of which was his twin. His Dad worked for the city of Bismarck in the Street department. His mother stayed at home to raise the children.

He attended Richolt Elementary School, and also attended Bismarck Junior High and High School graduating in 1946. Arley's first job was pulling weeds out of onions at Will's Seed House. He attended Bismarck Junior College for two years. He worked as an operator and advanced to a shift foreman at the American Oil Refinery. He was employed there for 33 years.



When Arley was a junior he loved to roller skate at the local Bismarck rink. He spent many nights there. Ann also enjoyed roller skating and was especially thrilled to skate to music. Pastor Leanne thanked the office staff, musicians, CE Director, CCC staff, Elders, Deacons, Committees, HVAC project Chairs, Clerk of Session, and others who made the year a success. Special thanks to Lael Hoerauf for her volunteer work in the office.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Administrative and Personnel—Dale Hoerauf, Chair, announced the hiring of Maureen Chrest as Administrative Assistant beginning January 4, 2022.

Hospitality—New committee members will be Joe Satrom, Runick Fru along with incoming Elders Diann Johnson and Bill Jensen.

Proclamation-Christian Education—the committee is recruiting new members. **Worship and Music**—Jamestown University Choir will be performing at FPC on Tuesday, February 22.

Property and Equipment—The water fountains will be replaced and have a bottle refill function. New faucets have been placed in the bathrooms.

Resource Management—To date \$317,838 has been received as pledges for 2022. The HVAC project will be completed when another training session on the control system is finished. The engineering firm will update the feasibility study for Phase II and III of HVAC project.

Board of Deacons—Kent Ellis will serve as Moderator with other Deacons filling-in as needed when he is absent.

Child Care Center Board—The stabilization grant of about \$5,000 has been received. Some health issues of children and staff resulted in the center being closed for a few days around Christmas.

Nominating—Session approved the following officers: Treasurer—Ella Gutzke; Assistant Treasurer—John Bjornson; Trust Officers—Keith Magnusson and Jodi Bjornson. Session elected Alice Nix as Clerk.

NEW BUSINESS

Session approved the change for the US Bank Safe Deposit Box to show Carol Thompson as Finance Assistant rather than Vickie Haas.

Session approved the Pastor Compensation package with a 3% increase, totaling \$118,869.13. The congregation also votes to approve at the annual meeting January 23.

There will be an organizational meeting of the FPC 150th anniversary committee after worship January 16. The committee seeks volunteers from the congregation. Also, each of the standing committees will appoint someone to serve.
