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PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE:

Frost Advisory

I get a kick out of it whenever I see my mother in me. She was a great one for turning normal situations into life lessons – especially gardening. Very early in life, I realized that the best way to get time with her was to work with her in the garden – there was very little competition for her attention there! And always she would chat, "You see these vines that are wrapping around this plant? We have to pull them off before it kills it. The same is true of people – they need to watch their entanglements and pay attention to the things that are wrapping around their souls. A person's spirit can get strangled by things that twist around: bad relationships, resentment, fear... always pull off the vines." Or "you know, the Bible says it's the little foxes that destroy the vine. Too many people are watching for big temptations, big enemies, but it's the little ones that ruin everything." Or so my mother said.

So, today, seeing a weather advisory predicting a freeze, and feeling irritated and lazy about going outside to cover my plants, I found my mother inside me. I heard her voice whispering in my soul, "be sure to protect the love inside you – there is a lot in our environment that would like to freeze it cold and instead fill you with indifference, resentment and apathy. Be aware of what life is doing to you. Take care of your soul."

Sounds like Momma. And, its pretty good advice. I don't have to watch the news for more than 5 minutes, before I have identified a reason to become jaded, resentful or apathetic. Partly its because I see so much wrong in the world, and partly its because I realize that I am only one person with limitless power to change anything. I feel helpless and upset every time an animal rescue commercial shows a suffering puppy – you can imagine how I feel when it is thousands and thousands of people, including little children,

who are shown suffering and dying. There's a temptation that comes whenever the cold of world angst comes upon us: we are called to help accepting that we are not enough to fix the problem, or we are tempted to turn away and tell ourselves that others deserve it, or there's nothing we can do. I can hear my Mom telling me – protect your heart – let nothing freeze it. Your ability to love, to care, is your superpower. Protect it. Stay caring. Do what you can. Love is the greatest power

God has given us. Protect your ability to love. Keep caring, keep working, keep genuine, and trust God to work where your abilities fall short. A quote from the Talmud may be familiar to some of you, but I think it says it all:

"Do not be daunted by the enormity of the world's grief. Do justly, now. Love mercy, now. Walk humbly, now. You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to abandon it."



FROM MANSION TO MOTEL: A BRIEF HISTORY OF 122 E THAYER

Bismarck bids farewell to the old Fleck House Motel!

Developers have purchased the property and, unable to salvage the structure, will razed it and make way for a mixed-use apartment complex. Change, for better or worse, is inevitable. Some still remember that when the motel was first built in the early 1960s, one of Bismarck's first and most magnificent mansions was demolished.



The Thompson House was a Queen Anne style mansion at the northwest corner of Thayer Ave and 2nd Street. It was built in 1884 by Charles W. Thompson, son of lowa Congressman William Thompson who had served with Col. Custer in Texas, became captain in the 7th Cavalry in 1866,

and retired in 1875 at Fort Abraham Lincoln just months before the Battle of Little Big Horn.

C.W. Thompson was a West Point graduate and civil engineer. Settling in Bismarck with his father, he opened a mine near Sims in 1879, supplying coal to the Northern Pacific Railroad. As the Railroad began building the bridge across the Missouri River, C.W. supplied riprap.


He also received the contract for construction of the state's original capital building. C.W. and his wife, Hepziah Lambert, eventually moved to Tacoma, Washington. In their absence, the stately house on Thayer became a boarding house under the management of Emery S. Beardsley, partner in the Beardsley & Finney drugstore.

Under Beardsley, the property took on a unique feature discovered in the Sanborn Fire Insurance maps. Note on the map: The C.W. Thompson house appears as a 2.5-story brick "boarding house." The "Deer Park" is fenced in to the west.

At 604 Thayer Ave, where the alley adjacent to Bread Poets Bakery is today, there was, briefly, a fenced-in parcel known as the "Deer Park" where Beardsley kept a small herd of deer as pets for his daughter Emma. The Bismarck Tribune reported on June 17, 1898, "Two young fawns arrived to increase the band at the Beardsley house Sunday afternoon and are the admiration of the neighborhood."

In 1904, C.W. Thompson died tragically in the "Clallam Disaster"—a shipwreck in the Strait of Juan de Fuca that claimed the lives of 56 people. By this time, the Beardsleys had moved on; T.J. Woodmansee and his family were running the boarding house on Thayer Ave. Woodmansee and his wife Sarah had relocated from Steele with their daughter, Nan, following several crop failures and a fire that burned

his livery barn to the ground. The Woodmansees are better remembered, perhaps, for having established a new livery stable here in Bismarck at 7th Street and Broadway.

Subsequent owners of the Thompson house, Alford and Addie Welch, made numerous improvements to the property and renamed it the "Hotel Roanoke." They earned a reputation for the hotel and café as being the "finest of its kind in the state."

In 1910, the Bismarck Diocese purchased the Roanoke for the first bishop, Father Vincent Wehrle. Plans called for eventual construction of a Cathedral on the same block. However, this plan never materialized. Instead, the Cathedral of the Holy Spirit was built in the 1940s northwest of this location, on Raymond Street and Avenue B.

In 1941, the Thompson house was taken over by the Sacred Heart Benedictine Convent and Academy of Minot for use as a nursing home and named for the apostle of charity, St. Vincent. Though the house had been remodeled, including installation of an electric elevator, it was soon cramped and inadequate. By 1956, plans were underway for a new St. Vincent's Home and the following year, the historic house stood empty for the first time.

The mansion was finally demolished when Marcus Fleck built the Fleck House Motel in 1961. In its heyday, it had a reputation similar to that of the Roanoke. Billed as the first of its kind in North Dakota, it boasted 40 lodging units downtown and was designed so that another story could be added later. The Motel was also to feature a 24 x 36-foot swimming pool which was a unique feature of the time.

In 1973, Bernie Fleland purchased the property from the Flecks and operated it as a Best Western. Soon after buying the motel, the Flelands expanded the Fleck House to include 20 efficiency apartments beside the motel. In 2000, the motel was sold again and became the Budget Inn Express. The rest is soon to be history...
