Down in the Garden with Rosie

A Hydrangea that loves to grow in Utah

Do you long to grow some of those hydrangeas with the big puffy white flowers, but don't have any moist, shady areas in your garden? Well, the garden fairy is on your side- try planting the Oakleaf Hydrangea- it thrives in full sun to part shade, and is happy with moderate amounts of water.

Hydrangea quercifolia - Oakleaf Hydrangea

This is a multi stemmed deciduous shrub, 5-6 ft tall and wide, with a fabulous cinnamon, peeling bark, which gives good winter interest. The leaves are large, oakleaf shaped (hence the name!), and the flowers a large, pyramidal panicle, blooming from

mid Summer through the fall, starting out white, and fading to a pinkish beige. They dry well on the location to set up home. Owls never make their plant, so are great for dried flower arrangements. The real bonus though is in the leaves- they turn a structures to move into. Most owls seek hollow vibrant shade of dark red in fall- they really light up cavities in trees to nest, but some, like the screech the landscape!

Pruning- little pruning is needed, and only recommended after bloom is over- they bloom next year on old wood, so don't cut off all your chances for flowers next year!

This can be a specimen plant, a foundation planting, or used as a screen with a more open aspect. The cultivar 'Snow Queen' has a good, rounded shape, and if you need something smaller, there are dwarf cultivars too- 'PeeWee' and' Munchkin' are a couple of them.







Tips for attracting Owls to your Garden

Install nesting boxes to provide owls with a secure own nests, they take over existing nests or find owl, are attracted to manufactured boxes. Place boxes in trees 10-12 feet from the ground on property perimeter where leavings will not be a problem.

Don't prune large branches from trees. Horizontal perches give owls a prime location on which to perch.

Put outdoor flood lights on timers. A well-lit yard does not appeal to these night-stalkers. Once you've gone to bed, turn out the lights so these pest controllers can get to work.

Provide bird baths. Like other birds, owls may be attracted by a large bird bath from which to drink and bathe.

Mow the lawn less often to give owls a more appealing hunting ground. Mice and other small rodents are likelier to traffic spans of grass left a little longer.

Snapper with Fennel, Onion and Tomato

Yield: Makes 4 servings

Ingredients

- Four 4-ounce fish snapper fillets (or other mild white fish)
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 small yellow onions, sliced with the grain
- 1 bulb fennel, cored and cut into very thin wedges
- · 2 tomatoes, cut into small wedges
- 1 teaspoon herbes de Provence
- 1/2 cup white wine
- 1/2 cup chicken stock
- 1 lemon, juiced
- 4 small pats butter
- · Lemon wedges, for squeezing

Preparation

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.

Pat the fish dry and sprinkle with salt and pepper. In a large oven-safe saute pan, heat the olive oil over medium heat and cook the onions and fennel until tender and golden, 8 to 10 minutes. Add the tomatoes and herbes de Provence and cook until the tomatoes begin to soften, another 5 minutes. Increase the heat to high and deglaze the pan with the wine, chicken stock and lemon juice and let bubble for 1 minute.

Nestle the fish fillets into the pan, sprinkle with salt and pepper and top each with a pat of butter. Place into the oven and cook until the fish is cooked through, 8 to 10 minutes.

Broil just until a bit crusty, about 1 more minute. Squeeze lemon juice on the fish and serve.

Pairs well with a crisp Pinot Grigio and your favorite significant other. Tastes best when eaten by your favorite pond.
