Pastor's Word: Green Lake Reflections

Last week I was one of ten FBC folks who went to Green Lake, Wisconsin for the music conference sponsored by the Fellowship of American Baptist Musicians. At this gathering, I always feel like a little bit like a pastor infiltrating a group of church musicians. But it is a great group and I have always enjoyed singing in the conference choir and taking in some of the workshops on worship. It is also a time to reconnect with old friends and enjoy all that Green Lake has to offer.

This year, for the first time, I got my courage up and brought my saxophone. I signed up to play in the conference orchestra.

I played alto sax in grade school. I could not fit band into my schedule in high school but did play in the jazz band my senior year. I sold my saxophone while in seminary – I wasn't playing it and I could use the money. Years later, after we started our music camp, I decided to get a saxophone and bought one off eBay. I recently looked up the serial number on it and it was manufactured in 1974 – it's 50 years old!

For a good number of years now, we have had a Yuletide Orchestra that plays carols in worship during advent, and we may play a couple more times during the year. But that is about it, and we are playing very simple hymn arrangements. I knew that the orchestra at Green Lake would be a lot more challenging.

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I practiced a few times before we left for Green Lake to try to get my mouth in shape. I wasn't sure I could play through an hour rehearsal. As it turned out, the problem was not my mouth.

We played the first piece and I got lost. Several times. In the choir, you can look for the words to find your place. In an orchestra, you don't get words or other parts to look at. I thought about quitting. But I did better on the next piece and decided to stick with it.

I improved on the second day, going from terrible to bad. My goal was to become mediocre by the end of the week. And I was well on my way. The orchestra presented a concert on the last day. I was doing well – hardly getting lost at all and mostly hitting the right notes, though I did miss a D sharp or two. I was feeling pretty good about it.

Then we came to the last piece. It was the toughest piece, and it was four pages. The four sheets did not fit on the stand, so I would have to do some page management. I got through the first page and was proud of myself – I was acing it. But suddenly, everything changed. I was lost, and I could not figure out where we were.

Finally I discovered the problem. With all of the page logistics, somehow page 2 was hiding behind page 3. I had gone from page 1 to 3. I eventually figured it out and apparently nobody noticed. All in all, for my first orchestra concert since 1975 at Oak Hill School, it wasn't too bad.



I appreciated the support of others through the week. Two French horns sat behind me - a seventh grader and an adult beginner. We were pretty well in the same boat. And the conductor was so encouraging. I wound up feeling like I had taken on a challenge and while I was far (far, far) from perfect, I had persevered, learned, and made my contribution.

Which, come to think of it, is a lot like church. Maybe you sing in the choir or play an instrument. Maybe you serve on a committee or teach a class or work with children. Maybe you serve as a worship leader or help provide meals or maintain the facilities. Or maybe you are involved in the community in various ways, coaching sports or leading Scouts or serving on boards or volunteering your time, or helping out your neighbors. The goal is not perfection. We are simply asked to share what we have, give it our best, and support one another as we do so, working for the good of all.

The benediction after every morning worship service, offered by Rev. Sara Clarke Turpin, was this:

May you sing!

May you have the wisdom to sing the song God has written for you.

May you have the courage to sing even if your voice cracks and you're a little out of tune today.

May you have the faith to sing Christ's new song in this world.

May you sing praises to God! Because believe me when I say: God is singing for you!
