

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

PROCLAIM GOD'S WORD

Like an angel in the Gospels, whose first words are invariably, "do not be afraid," Isaiah begins this passage with the simple words



"Fear not!" to all" whose hearts are frightened? (Isaiah 35:4). These are not just idle words. Though this chapter of Isaiah may have been written later than the passages around it, it was placed here in the midst of Israel's fall and Judah's capitulation to Assyria. The people of Judah sorely needed words of hope. Often so do we. Amidst the tumult of current events, it is comforting to hear that the Lord's first

message is, "Be strong, fear not!" How much sweeter the words of God's saving power sound once we've been brought back from the edge.

It is human nature to make judgments about others, though we normally call it keen perception or common sense. It can happen in many ways, a person with "gold rings and fine clothes" (James 2:2)

could just as easily be labeled as haughty or selfish. Whether, it's the rich, well-dressed stranger or the poor, shabby one, we may shun both, preferring to keep to our own kind. But once we start down the road of discriminating between acceptable and unacceptable people, it's a short distance to



judging people by their background, class, ethnicity, or just their perceived distance from "people like us." Jesus accepted all people and set a model for His disciples, then and now.

It is noteworthy that the first words the man in the Gospel hears, presumably in his entire life, were the words of Jesus. His ears have been opened to hear God's word and his tongue has been loosened to proclaim God's grace. The Ephphetha rite in the sacrament of baptism recalls this event. By virtue of our baptism we are all this man, touched by God's grace, made ready to speak God's word to the world.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

Am I open to hearing God's word, even from unexpected sources? How do I live out my baptismal call to proclaim God's word?

THE HOURS FOR THE PARISH OFFICE ARE AS FOLLOWS:


Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 AM to 2 PM. The Parish Office will be closed on Tuesday and Thursday.

The Rite of Christian Initiation (popularly known as RCIA) is the



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS Choosing Deafness

If you're a parent, you know that hearing evaluations are usually done at a child's annual physical exam starting around age four. The little person gets hoisted up onto the exam table, fitted with a pair of special headphones, and then they need raise their hand when they hear a sound.

I bet all of us parents who have sat through one of these tests with a preschooler — especially a particularly strong-willed one have experienced a moment where we ask ourselves: I wonder if there's something wrong with his/her hearing. Is that why he/she doesn't listen to me? 'Come here, put on your shoes, pick up your toys, finish your carrots, don't touch that' — he/she isn't being naughty, he/she just can't hear it!

And then that moment, for those of us whose kids passed the hearing test with flying colors, comes crashing down into a realization that, yep, they can hear just fine. They're just choosing deafness.

But how can we really get mad when we remember that we do the same thing to God day in and day out? I often wonder if God, sitting in His Heaven, tires of calling to us in the same way young parents tire of calling out unheeded directions to their small children. Help that person. Hear My voice. Open your heart. Give of yourself here. Talk to Me.

The Story of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary- September 8th

The Church has celebrated Mary's birth since at least the sixth century. A September birth was chosen because the Eastern Church begins its Church year with September. The September 8 date helped determine the date for the feast of the Immaculate Conception on December 8.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's birth. However, the apocryphal *Protoevangelium of James* fills in the gap. This work has no historical value, but it does reflect the development of Christian piety. According to this account, Anna and Joachim are infertile but pray for a child. They receive the promise of a child who will advance God's plan of salvation for the world. Such a story, like many biblical counterparts, stresses the special presence of God in Mary's life from the beginning.
