ZONTA CELEBRATES AMEILA EARHART

Every January, Zonta celebrates the life of Zontian and famed aviator Amelia Earhart. While we promote the program for the whole month, we have selected the 11th of January as Amelia Earhart Day in recognition of the day Amelia began her trip from Honolulu, Hawaii, to Oakland, California, United Sates, which made her the first person to fly solo across any part of the Pacific Ocean.

We know many of your clubs already organize club events throughout the month of January to honor the life of Amelia and promote the Amelia Earhart Fellowship Fund. 2. Social media engagement:

ADVOCATE OR NOT - EDUCATE YOURSELF

What is the Women's March on Washington all about? The mission statement is quoted below. Of interest are the words highlighted in red—intersecting identities. Two of the Guiding Principles of the March further emphasize this:

• Women's rights are human rights, regardless of a woman's race, ethnicity, religion, immigration status, sexual identity, gender expression, economic status, age or disability.

• We practice empathy with the intent to learn about the intersecting identities of each other. We will suspend our first judgement and do our best to lead without ego.

The March is a grassroots effort. To date, there are 129 groups that are partners with the March. This includes groups that represent various races, religions, genders, sexual orientation, civil, equal, and human rights. The National Organization for Women (NOW) is one of the groups—so is the American Association of University Women, National Women's History Project, Human Rights Watch and even the Sierra Club. The organizers note, the March is Pro Women, not Anti Trump. "It is a display of solidarity affirming our shared humanity and fundamental human rights." Negative press about the March focuses on calling it Anti Trump or Pro Abortion. Yes, several of the groups are Pro-Choice. Additionally, on December 27, Gloria Steinem (Women's Rights), Harry Belafonte (Civil Rights) and Planned Parenthood (Women's Health) joined as featured partners. While the National Organizing committee hasn't published any additional mission statements (Jan. 4), it is noted that in addition to environmental, LGBT, women's and racial rights, that the March will also demonstrate that people are willing to stand up for, "reproductive health care, abortion services, and access to Planned Parenthood as they intersect with the rights of young people, people of color, immigrants, and people of all faiths, backgrounds and incomes." Again, the word intersect--looking for common ground. So maybe you don't believe in Pro Choice, do you believe in maternity leave rights, deductions for child care expenses, non-gender segregated education, the Equal Rights Amendment and equal training opportunities for women? These are some of the issues groups such as NOW have fought for since the 1960s. Currently NOW is also fighting to help states adopt the Freedom of Choice Act (FOCA) to protect women's right to choose what works best for them given their individual circumstances: age, race, employment, education, living conditions, economic status, health, and circumstance of pregnancy. So far, California, Connecticut, Hawaii, Maryland, Nevada, Wisconsin, Maine, and Washington have enacted the FOCA as state law. Likewise, Planned Parenthood is Pro Choice. However, in addition to abortion services, it also offers women affordable health care and education on birth control, sexually transmitted diseases, breast health care, parenting skills and adoption. Find any common ground?

Since our December 14th vote on the March; Ashland, Astoria, Bend, Eugene, Newport, and Salem are now offering "Sister" Marches to the National March and Oregon's Portland March. The National and Oregon Organizing Committee members are a blend of colors, religions, and education. Cumulatively they cover low income, racial, gender, health care, equal rights, violence prevention, civil rights, equality, prevention of gun violence, religious rights, plus volunteer for food banks, park boards, and CASA. Do any of us agree with every aspect of every group involved with the March—unlikely. However, instead of focusing on the differences of 129+ groups they seek common ground among the groups to send the basic message that "women's rights are human rights."
