Is it time for a spiritual check-up? with Pastor Eric

Many of you have probably noticed that I pull out a pair of "cheaters" (otherwise known as low strength reading glasses) every once and a while. Actually, I am using these glasses more often than I would care to admit. I must write that I am more than aware that I am currently the only one in my immediate family both as a son and as a father who does not wear glasses. My beloved wife, Teri, confronted me the other night at the dinner table with the request to go and have my eyes checked. I have been refusing profusely for months with the same claim -"I can see just fine!" My family responds the same way, "You will not know for sure until you get them checked properly." Their argument is that I am used to seeing a certain way and may not even realize what I am truly missing of the world around me.

I believe that we tend to treat our spiritual life just like I approach my vision issues. We get into routines and embrace traditions without reflecting on "what we are doing?" or "why we are doing it?" Maybe there is fear over what we might discover? Or what it may cost us? The forty days of Lent is a great time to explore our routines and their meaning because we can do it together as a community in Christ. We might even decide to stir things up a bit and try something different which does not mean add another thing to our schedule but the opposite - simply remove something that we have always done. We can ask some tough questions of ourselves and take in the moment like a deep breath. Lent is giving us permission to do a spiritual check-up, or inventory in the midst of our daily life. Deep down you and I both know that we are missing out, or there has to be more, or maybe we just need a break! Let us not use "cheaters" but take Lent seriously and make the time to pray, worship, read, and try something different to help someone over the next few weeks. I cannot guarantee that you might not discover something challenging, or a bit unsettling; however, God promises that it will lead to something healthy and growth producing.

God is with you regardless of where you are or what you are doing and maybe it is time to get reacquainted as you engage life. You might learn

something new about yourself, your family, or your faith? You might even become reinvigorated in those traditions and rituals that you love.

Let us pray. Heavenly Father, walk with us in Lent, open our lives to all that we are missing for our good and the good of the world, so that we might respond in thanksgiving and love in word and deed and bear witness to your glory, in Jesus's name we pray. Amen.

Beginning Ash Wednesday, we will gather soaps for personal hygiene and cleaning laundry and linens. We will also gather toothbrushes and



EASTER PRAYER VIGIL "THE SILENT TOMB" (March 31 from 2:00 pm to 5:00 pm)








Carl and Kelsey Grulke share a love for the Word of God and for helping it come alive in the hearts of those who hear the Good News.





PALESTINE WOMEN OF ELCA Bible study March 5, 2 p.m.

In the March Gather magazine we continue the Winter 2018 Bible study: Multiple meanings: Learning from other interpretations by Mark Allan Powell

January/February:

Session one – Washing hands with distant hearts (Mark 7:1-12)

Session two – Prepare the Way of the Lord (Luke 3:3-17)
March: Session three – The Good Samaritan
(Luke 10:30-37)

April: Session four – The Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-20)

Session three: The Good Samaritan (Luke 10:30-37)

This month's study takes the theme of "multiple meanings" to a new level. We have previously considered how individuals understand Bible stories differently. Now we have an example of how nations or societies do this as well. Session three explores how one of the best known stories in the Bible (the parable of the Good Samaritan) has impacted culture, cultures different from our own. The study's author hopes that our studies have prepared us to realize the Bible is "a living word." It often means different things to different people not because people misunderstand it (though of course that does happen) but because God speaks through Scripture to people in ways that they need to hear. My guess is that Americans have heard what God wanted to say to us, and the Tanzanians have heard what God wanted to say to them. But since we are all part of one global body of Christ, it is nice to compare notes.

The March 2018 edition focuses on the fact that "living word" of scripture speaks to us all in unique, profound and meaningful ways – and that is a good thing. The cover of the March *Gather* allows us to visually reflect on our study. "As we examine how people around the world encounter Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan, the overlapping colors, patterns and textures of artist Jing Jing Tsong's illustration help us to consider what it means to have and be neighbors."

So this year, let's strive to remember, as our Bible study author, the Rev. Mark Allan Powell writes: "The word of God is both law and gospel – and sometimes it is both at once. ...Bible stories often mean different things to different people." That teaches us a lot about life.
