THIS DATE IN HISTORY

April 15, 1962 The first U.S. Marine Corps air unit lands in South Vietnam aboard the aircraft carrier

Princeton. The 3625 Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron (HMM-362) with 450 marines and 15 Sikorsky UH-34D Sea Horse helicopters will be based near Soc Trang, 100 miles southwest of Saigon. The unit dubbed Task Force Shoofly reinforces the three U.S. Army helicopter companies already in Vietnam. The unit's mission will be to

carry supplies and troops in support of the South Vietnamese army.

April 24, 1965 President Johnson issues an executive order designating Vietnam a "combat area" and

authorizes "hostile fire" pay, retroactive to January 1, 1964.

April 1966 U.S. Navy TF116 (River Patrol Force) begins Operation Game Warden, the interdiction

of enemy traffic in South Vietnamese inland waterways.

April 4, 1968 The Martin Luther King, Jr., is assassinated in Memphis.

April 8-Nov 11 The U.S. 198th Infantry Brigade and other elements of the Americal Division conduct

Operation Burlington Trail, a combat sweep in Quang Tin Province along the Quang

Nam Province border in 1 Corps.

Vietnam Helicopter Pilot & Crewmember Monument will be Dedicated



The Vietnam Helicopter Pilots Association spearheaded the effort, working with Arlington National Cemetery and Congress to get the monument approved. Since this war was known as the "helicopter war", it is fitting to have this monument. The dedication is April 18, 2018 at 4pm Eastern time and is open to anyone who wants to attend. The monument will be placed in Section 35 along Memorial Drive, not far from the Tomb of the Unknowns. It honors the nearly 5,000 helicopter pilots and crew members who were killed in Vietnam.

TRIVIA TIME

The **P-38**, developed in 1942, is a small can opener that was issued in the canned field rations of the United States Armed Forces from World War II to the 1980s. Originally designed for and distributed in the K-ration, it was later included in the C-ration. As of 2017, it is still in production and sold on a worldwide market. The P-38 is known as a "John Wayne" by the United States Marine Corps, either because of its toughness and dependability or because of an unsubstantiated story that the actor had been shown in an as-yet-unidentified training film opening a can of K-Rations. A larger version called the P-51 is somewhat easier to operate. The P-51 is not an official Army can opener although it is often marketed as such. Official military designations for the P-38 include "US ARMY POCKET CAN OPENER" and "OPENER, CAN, HAND, FOLDING, TYPE I". As with some other military terms, e.g., "jeep", the origin of the term is not known with certainty; the *P-38* opener coincidentally shares a designation with the Lockheed P-38 Lightning fighter plane, which could allude to its fast performance, additionally the P-51 can opener also has an aircraft namesake in the North American P-51 Mustang. P-38s are no longer used for individual rations by the United States Armed Forces, as canned C-rations were replaced by MRE rations in the 1980s, packed in plastic pouches. The larger **P-51s** are included with United States military "Tray Rations" (canned bulk meals). They are also still seen in disaster recovery efforts and have been handed out alongside canned food by rescue organizations, both in America and abroad in Afghanistan.

News from our Service Officer

Liver flukes are parasitic worms that spend part of their life cycle in freshwater snails that inhabit rivers throughout parts of the Far East, including Southeast Asia, China and the Korean peninsula. The snails release larvae that burrow into the flesh of fish and can infest the bile ducts of humans who eat the fish. They can reside symptomless in a victim's body for decades. The adult worm is believed to release an irritant during its quarter century life span—an irritant that can lead to cancerous lesions in the bile duct decades after the parasitic infestation has died out. In some south Asian villages where raw fish consumption is part of the culture, more than one in two people harbor liver fluke infestations. Since 2013, the VA has received 240 disability claims related to bile duct cancers associated with liver fluke. It has rejected more than 76 % of those claims.

Nearly one in four Vietnam War combat veterans who participated in a small study at the Northport (NY) VA to detect past infestations of the cancer causing liver fluke parasite tested positive. The pilot study, titled "Screening US Vietnam Veterans for Liver Fluke Exposure 5 Decades After the End of the War," is in the current edition of the periodical Infectious Diseases in Clinical Practice.. Exams for the study had to be conducted at Seoul National University College of Medicine in South Korea because no facility in the U.S. is equipped to do the exam. Sen Chuck Schumer (D-NY) and Rep Tom Suozzi (D-Glen Cove) are calling for a broader study to determine whether wartime exposure to liver fluke should be considered service related.

Liver flutes (parasites) have been detected in an alarming rate in Vietnam Vets. By the time it makes its appearance, it is fatal liver cancer. A test named ELISA can detect it early enough to treat you before it is cancerous. At this time, the test is only available in Korea. ELISA can't be used in USA because the FDA has not approved it. Vets are dying. We don't need another Agent Orange. Contact Congress, White House, anyone who will listen


