Live the Good Life

"There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and lived in luxury every day. At his gate was laid a beggar named Lazarus, covered with sores and longing to eat what fell from the rich man's table. Even the dogs came and licked his sores. "The time came when the beggar died and the angels carried him to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried. In Hades, where he was in torment, he looked up and saw Abraham far away, with Lazarus by his side. So he called to him, 'Father Abraham, have pity on me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, because I am in agony in this fire.' "But Abraham replied, 'Son, remember that in your lifetime you received your good things, while Lazarus received bad things, but now he is comforted here and you are in agony." Luke 16:19-25

A few years ago, a dog in China made headlines. His owner, the son of a Chinese billionaire, bought him eight brand-new, recently released cell phones. This means Coco's owner spent about \$9,500 to buy his dog cell phones she will never use.

Coco is the kind of dog the rich man we read about in Luke 16 may have had. He wasn't missing a whole lot of anything. He spared no expense and could get anything.

Lazarus, on the other hand, had a constantly empty stomach, was dirt poor, was covered in sores and his best friends were the dogs who came to lick his wounds.

Whose life would you rather have? You can only answer that question properly when you consider how each of their lives ended.

Despite his great wealth on earth, the rich man ended up in "Hades, where he was in torment" and "agony."

But Lazarus was "comforted" after he died because perfect comfort in heaven is exactly what Jesus promises all who believe in him.

During their lives on earth, it looked as though the rich man had everything and Lazarus had nothing. But, in reality, it was the other way around. Because Lazarus had a relationship with the true God, he had everything—including eternal life in heaven—while the rich man had nothing and spent his eternity separated from God and all of his blessings.

Whether you are rich or poor in this life, knowing and trusting in Jesus your Savior means you have everything, including eternal life in heaven. May this encourage you to stay close to him here until you are with him in the hereafter.

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Celebrating 150 Years at Salem-Lowell

Members of St. John's came together to worship on Sunday, October 13th, at the Salem-Lowell campus to celebrate Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church's 150th anniversary.

Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church in Lowell was formed back in 1869 when a group of Germans came together creating the

church as a part of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod.

Many of those first services were even preached in German.

Church members worshiped in the original building from 1869 to 1952. The current church building was built in 1951. Years later the congregation added a parsonage and in recent years a fellowship hall was built onto the building.

"It was a huge success," Ken Leistico, president of the Salem campus council, said. "It was great to see people joining together from both campuses to celebrate this monumental anniversary."

Rev. Bruce Wietzke, who served the Salem church for 14 years from 1984 to 1998, was the guest preacher for the celebration on Sunday giving the sermon at Lowell and at earlier services at the Juneau and Horicon campuses. Pastor David Brandt and Pastor Paul Schupmann presided over the service.

Leistico said the church was filled to capacity with 312 members and visitors in attendance.

"It has been a long time since we've had to set up extra chairs down the side isles of the pews," Leistico said. "It brought back many fond memories of years ago when we'd have to get to church 45 minutes ahead of time for a Christmas Eve service just to find a seat."

During the service the Sunday School children from the St. John's campus joined the Sunday School children from the Salem campus to sing, "As We Celebrate Today," with lyrics written by Salem's teacher and pianist Lauranna Kohlstedt and directed by Teresa Stowell.

"After the service I had a woman from a neighboring church tell me how wonderful it was to see all the young people in church and all of the youth participating in the Sunday School," Leistico said. "She said she could see St. John's Salem had a bright future."

The adult choir, with members from both campuses, sang several different songs and was led by Matthew Lober. The organist for the event was Dale Grulke, who was accompanied by the brass choir on several songs. The brass choir included Rick Leissring, Dennis Affeld, Hailey Brandt, Mason Braun, Randy Mohr, Matthew Lober and Rachel Tolkinen.

"The church was like, 'The Sound of Music,'" Leistico said. "It was super to have both choirs and the Sunday School provide the music."

A meal was held following the service for members and visitors and included pictures from years past. Leistico said about 200 people were served the meal Sunday following the service.

"I truly believe our forefathers would be pleased with our celebration sharing God's grace together and that God's word is still shared here in Lowell," Leistico said. "With the merger that will continue to happen for many years to come."

Offering Envelopes and Commitment Cards

Beginning, Thursday, November 7th, St. John's will have our 2020 offering envelopes available for pickup at all three campuses. Since our members frequently travel between campuses, we're trying to streamline the process. This year our members may pick up an envelope pack at any campus and we will record the Offering Number located on the envelopes at pickup. This way, all your future offerings will be attached to your personal number and you will receive a statement of your offerings after the year is over.

What if I want to give electronically? You are welcome to give electronically through the new St. John's App. We realize that many of our members no longer wish to have offering envelopes and prefer to always give electronically. The same offerings you give electronically will also be recorded to your personal account and you will receive a statement of your offerings after the year is over. If you are going to give electronically, we kindly ask that you sign the sheet that says you will do so. That way we don't purchase so many offering envelopes next year.

Also beginning November 7th, we are asking all our communicant members to complete a Commitment Card. This is meant to help you apply the Biblical principles of stewardship that we are focusing on in the month of November. You are encouraged to return your Commitment Card beginning Thanksgiving through the end of Advent. Again, we are asking that <u>all of our communicant members</u> fill out the card after the final stewardship Sunday, November 24 and present their giving plan to the Lord.

What is a Commitment Card? A Commitment Card is a pledge card stating how much you plan on giving in offering during the 2020 calendar year. The amount pledged is not a binding contract, but rather a useful tool to help us keep God's blessings in front of us and it allows us to prayerfully consider and plan what our gifts to our Lord will be. Your commitment to your Lord will be recorded by the church office and in April, the church office will print / email you your 2020 giving summary with your giving commitment, so that you may see how your plan is going.

Beginning January 2020, St. John's is changing from a fiscal year budget to a calendar year budget. At our October Voter's Meeting the budget that is approved will also be available for your pickup when you get your offering envelopes and commitment card.



You can prevent or delay type 2 diabetes if you*

- Lose 5 to 7 percent of the weight, if overweight—that's 10 to 14 pounds (4.5 to 6.3 kg) for a 200-pound (90.6 kg) person.
- Lose and maintain the weight loss by making healthy food choices by eating a variety of foods that are low in fat and reducing the number of calories eaten per day. -
- Get at least 30 minutes of moderate-intensity physical activity five days a week. This could be brisk walking, yard work, and actively playing with children, for example, riding bicycles or playing soccer.

Board of Education News

- Our school enrollment is at 105 students in Grades PK-8. We had one student in Kindergarten not continue with us.



Updates as of 10-19-19 on our current Beaver Dam Circuit Befriended Home Missions:

River of Life in Goodyear, Arizona/Pastor Lincoln Albrecht Risen Savior in Mansfield, Ohio/Pastor Brad Wright Illumine in Seattle, Washington/Pastor Kent Reeder

River of Life in Goodyear, Pastor Lincoln Albrecht

Currently River of Life is comprised of 75 souls and 61 communicant members. In July our average worship attendance was 63.5 and our Family Bible Hour average attendance was 21. We are encouraged to see the diversity in those attending worship as well. Last July (2018) we had 82 unique worshippers; this July (2019) we had 112. The time since Easter has been a season of in-reach more so than any other past period. We've had a number of physical illnesses, a few deaths, and some challenging counseling situations. Some of these situations have been resolved, others are in more of a stable holding pattern. Of the 75 souls ministered to, only 10 have not been in worship or served as a shut-in in the past 6 weeks. We thank and praise God for this undeserved blessing. As far as outreach work is concerned, we are seeing fruit from seeds sown a few years back. This is encouraging to the pastor and the Lord's people. Our canvassing efforts in our hyper-local community have generated awareness. People know who and where we are better than ever. Over the past summer we have transitioned to a new record keeping and bookkeeping system (Church 360* Suite from CPH) and have been very pleased with the product and its implementation for our purposes.

Over the next 8 months we plan on working our new movers' lists in earnest. For the next fiscal year, we will eschew blanket mail campaigns (like EDDM) for this more targeted strategy. We have subscribed to this list before (through outreach.com) and we have picked up this service again for a few months. It is our plan to transition to the lists generated by MissionInsite in the late fall. They seem to give us a greater level of targeting at a more reasonable rate. We've been in our new facility for a little more than two years—and our lease is up next spring. We have contacted a realtor to represent us in these new negotiations. She has expressed confidence in securing a property tax abatement for our next agreement. We are hoping to sign another contract of three to five years. The city of Goodyear is developing a keystone community park (30 acres), recreation center, and aquatic facility on the 86 acre campus across the street. It is expected to open by Spring of 2021. Another 46 acres will be developed in a second phase. We see our current location and this development as a tremendous boon for our ministry.

We are exploring adding a Jesus Cares program to our ministry offerings. We have been in contact with Rev. Gaertner and he has plans to lead a modified worship service at River of Life in the early fall. We are also in the process of developing a strategic plan for the next five years. I have been in contact with Mr. Gary Jeffers of Grace In Action Ministries and we are currently developing a plan for investing in our current group of leaders. We think this is an acute need for our congregation. Some of our leaders are totally new to "running a church" and our current chairman (who has served as such in this area for more than a decade) will be taking a much earned break from church leadership. We also think this is a better investment than trying to bring just a few of our leaders to Chicago in January to the WELS Leadership Conference.

Risen Savior, Mansfield, OH-Pastor Brad Wright

What a tremendous blessing from God, that he would entrust us with an opportunity to start a new mission in Mansfield Ohio. It all began in May as we began the process of packing up our belongings accumulated over 23 years in Fond du Lac, WI. Having purchased a condo in Mansfield, the process of downsizing and being willing to give up items you once believed you could not live without was an interesting ordeal. Late June we arrived and four days later all our belongings arrived on the semi. Arriving in a new town and a new state has been filled with excitement. Every time we drive somewhere we experience something new.

Risen Savior Church has already been blessed with a church building and a small but dedicated group of families. The joy of the gospel is evident in their lives as they are eager and willing to tackle the many challenges of beginning a new church. The process of getting the church updated and spruced up with some remodeling is ongoing. Risen Savior is praying that sometime in September they would be willing to apply for a loan and the big remodeling would begin. The church building was built in 1966 and the major things that need to be done are a new roof, new windows, air conditioning and some updates in the inside.

Social media has become a major avenue for getting our name out to the community. The process of designing a web page, Facebook page, and Instagram account are ongoing. The process of designing a brochure and business card is almost complete. This will allow us to personally put something into people's hands.

The congregation is looking forward to their first community event in October. The YMCA down the road from the church offers a trunk or treat and Risen Savior will be part of the event.

Having a condo in a community has become a great experience. Without fail, sitting on the front porch or walking the community, people will stop and talk. Almost everyone in the neighborhood knows that we are the ones starting the new church. People continually ask how the new church is coming. We pray that when we have our first open house that some of these community members will attend.

As a teacher in an Area Lutheran High School (Winnebago Lutheran Academy) the past 23 years, the month of August would have involved writing lesson plans, getting my classroom ready, preparing for coaching, and getting ready for the first day of school. Those were exciting times; but thinking of ways to proclaim the gospel in Mansfield has now become an exciting ministry.

Illumine Seattle WA: Pastor Kent Reeder arrived in May. Parsonage is updated and he and Alex are happily moved into their new home. Kent has already taken advantage of two Outreach teams. The Team from Middleton has finished and the Mission Journey's team working with Praise and Proclaim comes mid August. Pastor Reeder is seeking to discover what makes the people in the community tick. They sold their campus in Edmonds WA for \$3.4 million. We will finalize how those assets will be utilized best to self-fund this restart. An Architect has been hired to remodel existing space at the Illumine Campus (Grace). They are seeking to utilize this site in a multi-use Hub for the community. Existing space will be utilized for community gatherings. The new space will be a cafe and office space leased by Non-profit groups. Restarting worship Services are targeted to begin late 2019 or early 2020.

CENTRAL AFRICA MEDICAL MISSION LUTHERAN MOBILE MEDICAL CLINIC - MALAWI October 2019

Here in Lilongwe we do get to hear and see the news on television and the internet, as long as we have electricity. Power outages are common though, and being the dry season, we'll probably be experiencing longer stretches without power. It's just an inconvenience, really, and we are thankful to have solar batteries to power our vaccine fridge and a generator if needed for light and computer use which would be mainly at night. When we do get the world news, it seems that much of it involves political and social unrest in many countries, including of course the US, England, and recently, Malawi.

Malawi has had intermittent demonstrations in the larger cities like Lilongwe ever since the Presidential elections in May. People who support one of the candidates who lost to the incumbent president, want to march and voice their opposition to the electoral process which might not have been free and fair. The outcome remains to be seen after weeks of continued court hearings. In the meanwhile, roads can be impassable due to crowds, roadblocks and burning obstacles. Looting and vandalism has occurred as crowds become out of control, and the protests sometimes became violent, with police intervening with teargas. As I write, we have been told there will be a march and demonstration tomorrow. Organizers urge peaceful protest, but businesses and government offices will have to close as they have before, just for protection of their property and workers. This affects our clinic as it is harder for Gary to do necessary errands in town, and it might be difficult for our staff to travel to where we pick them up on the way to our villages. We may need to make a decision about whether it is safe to travel to clinic at all.

But God has been faithful over the past four months, and we haven't had to cancel a single day. We have been given thumbs up and allowed to drive around road blocks, we are greeted with chants and smiles, and I feel our ambulance is surrounded by guardian angels. We leave early enough that we are out in the village before the demonstrations get going, and they are often finished when we return. To see the lines of people needing our help when we arrive at clinic, and to know that we've saved lives by being there, is cause enough to step out in faith and carry on with the day's work. We know you are praying for us and see the Lord answering those prayers daily. I am reminded of Isaiah 41:10. "Do not fear, for I am with you: do not be dismayed for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you. I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

Now, please know that there's been no concerns about our safety. Gary and I had all four of our adult children come to visit us and travel in the country at two different times over the last 4 months and there were no problems. It was wonderful to experience Africa again through their eyes, and such a joy to see them eagerly helping out at clinic with registration or pill counting.

Please pray for a return of peace and a stable, effective government in Malawi. Thank God that we are still allowed to live and work here freely to continue this medical mission. And thank you so much for your donations which allow the physical care and love of Jesus to reach Malawians.

REPORT RECEIVED FROM PASTOR NITZ:

The whole LWMS convention was amazing for us. Having my mother there was especially nice.

That was the very beginning of our furlough. During the weeks that followed, we did more speaking at churches, visited family, saw doctors, and so on. One big bonus for us was having 5 of our 6 kids living with us in while we were back. Here in Malawi, we only have the last two, Joel (18 – Senior in HS) and Frances (she's 15 and a sophomore). Another huge highlight was meeting our 2 year old grandson. We had seen him for a couple days a year ago, but of course he wouldn't remember us. He warmed up nicely and was, to my delight, very teaseable.

Our One Africa Team has been been talking to our seven sister synods about how we can best help them reach our big passion – Christ for All, Good News for Africa. We are settling on having our mission work to develop the 125+ African pastors we have in our fellowship. We want to support them to grow in the Word and spirit to in their ministries. We are going to set up a Christian Lutheran Institute, a sort of WELS advanced school for pastors, to help with that. Though we are not planning on building anything, we'll need lots of travel money to make that happen. Since it's a new plan, we don't have that in our budget. Somewhat of a problem, as you can imagine.

In our outreach efforts to new places, the work is going well. We have good groups in Liberia to work with and a promising group in Rwanda. The group in Uganda appreciated our recent July visit, but there hasn't been too much communication since then. One of our challenges just lately is funding. Last year, it seemed we had all the funds we could want. Suddenly, this year, we're running out early in the budget year. We are scaling back our visits to new countries for now.

"Now this is what the Lord Almighty says:

'Give careful thought to your ways'" (Haggai 1:5).



At times, someone may ask us to stop and consider our actions. This was the case in Haggai's day. Haggai authored one of the final Old Testament books. He wrote the above words 15 years after the exiles returned from Babylon. Upon their return, Jerusalem and its Temple lay in ruins. Almost immediately, the people rebuilt the city walls and other structures. The Lord blessed their work. Within seven months, they set up the altar of burnt offering. Soon, the Temple's foundation would be laid.

Then, the work stopped. For 15 years, nothing more happened. This is when the Lord addressed the people through Haggai. The Lord took the people to task for reversing their priorities. Instead of first rebuilding his house, they feathered their own nests by building themselves fine homes. As a result, the work on the Temple was neglected.

Twice, the Lord states, "Give careful thought to your ways" (Haggai 1:5 and 1:7). This repetition is for emphasis. The Lord wanted his people to stop and carefully consider their actions. He had a reason for insisting that the Temple be immediately completed: "That I may take pleasure in it" (1:8). He wanted his house to be built now with the finest materials as a fitting place for him.

In the phrase "that I may take pleasure in it," the key word is pleasure. The Lord "take[s] no pleasure in the death of anyone" (Ezekiel 18:32) or even "in the death of the wicked" (Ezek. 33:11). Rather, he finds pleasure when sinners humble themselves before him. His desire is for everyone to "repent and live" (18:32). The Lord wanted his house completed with no further delay so that repentant sinners could come before him to "turn from their [evil] ways and live" (33:11).

The Lord still offers grace and mercy to repentant sinners in his house. After his law reveals our sin and hopelessness, he shares the gospel. Then, by faith, we may turn from our evil ways, trusting confidently in Christ's forgiveness.

The Lord redirected greed and laziness to become repentance and forgiveness. He did it with six simple words: "Give careful thought to your ways," that called a nation to repent. Eventually, it led his people to trust in his full forgiveness through Christ.


Lord, lead us to "give careful thought to your ways."

It wasn't anything pretty. Just a small suite in an office building on a busy road in Nampa, Idaho. A gathering space with an office in the back. But it was a place to get started. It was a place to meet. It was a place we could invite people to. It wasn't pretty when we got there, but surely the Lord was in that place.

Suite 120 in the Legend Building in Nampa is now the 24/7 ministry center for Cross of Christ's multisite congregation. After 25 years of God's rich blessings on our church in Boise, Cross of Christ is branching out to the west in North Nampa to reach more and more souls with the saving and freeing message of Jesus and the Bible.

Who would have thought such amazing things would happen in this little place? One man found out on Father's Day that his wife was leaving him. He came to our divorce support group where he reconnected with the gospel after not having attended church since middle school.

One couple tragically lost their son in a sudden death. They came to our grief support group where they heard about the resurrection and eternal life for all who believe in Jesus.

One lady stayed after class, apologizing for being so emotional (she didn't need to apologize). She said our Cross Connections (basic Christian instruction) course was giving her just what she needed at just the right time in her life. The Good News she was hearing was so great it was all just feeling a little overwhelming, in a good way.

All we did was get a little place and open the doors so people could hear the gospel. How is it that lives are changed and people are suddenly connected to God, their purpose, and a Christian community?

Surely the Lord is in this little place.

When he woke up from his angelic dream, Jacob said, "Surely the Lord is in this place, and I was not aware of it" (Genesis 28:16). If Jesus has promised to be with us always, we're going to try and be alert to all the ways God shows us that he is with us today.

Now we're gearing up for services to start in North Nampa, and we'll need a place a little bigger than our suite 120 ministry center. So we'll be renting a restaurant on Sunday mornings. The opening service will be November 24, the Sunday before Thanksgiving. Just a little restaurant on a busy road in Nampa, Idaho. Tables and chairs and salt and pepper shakers. But it's a place to meet. A place to worship. A place to invite more people to. It might not be a cathedral, but surely the Lord will be in that place too.

Because Jesus has given us his Word. And we will worship in the name of Jesus. And where two or three gather in his name, there he is also.

What sort of amazing things will happen in that little place?

I can't wait to find out!

The bigger the animal, the more special the feast

The bigger the animal, the more special the feast. Traditionally and culturally in the Hmong community, a cow is reserved for a special occasion. (when a baby boy is born, marriage, etc.) A cow signifies the happiness of the parents. A wedding feast with a cow for the meal is a feast for a family of wealth.

Faith Hmong Lutheran Church in Anchorage, Alaska, had a special meal like this in June. It was a meal to invite the community to, and a meal to share with the congregation for the three days of our annual camp. God's Word says, "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light." 1 Peter 2:9

"Out of darkness", is so true as we were held under the control of Satan and his lies. How wonderful it is to celebrate together with brothers and sisters under the cross and to share this experience with other redeemed children of God, young and old.

The question was brought up as to how we could gather and have a special meal - how special of a meal was the next question. Leaders in the congregation had to struggle with this question. Chickens, pig, goat, or even a cow? The price of livestock is not cheap in Alaska. To make it as special as possible, we would need to get a cow.

"Why not?" the leaders asked. \$1,500-\$2,000 is the asking price for a cow, but it would make this year's camp very special.

In November 2018, the leaders got the ball rolling as we ended that meeting. The idea was that leaders would start to donate to this meal - \$10 a week, \$20 a week, even \$50 a week, depending on what they were able to donate. Then, at the beginning of June, whatever else was needed, we would ask for a donation from the congregation to cover the cost.

What a blessing it was to see when brothers and sister unite and come together for a purpose. We were able to gather enough funds to cover the cost of the cow for this fellowship event.

June 20, 2019, the day before our camp was to start, a couple strong youth and myself drove to Palmer, Alaska, to butcher this cow for our feast. We butchered the cow at the farm and hauled pretty much all the parts that were necessary – all of the meat, including the stomach, heart, lungs, and intestine. The phrase "leave nothing behind" was true for us as we only left behind what was not edible.

What a blessing it was to have many hands to help with this process. We were able to bring all the meat back to camp and process it there. Many people are familiar with hanging the meat first, but not in the Hmong community. We process the meat into smaller portions to cook right away, and to make sure we have enough to cook for all our planned meals.

Four meals were planned – one for Friday evening, two for Saturday, and one more on Sunday. We thank a couple of our ladies for taking charge of the meal prep. They are great cooks who really know how to cook this traditional food!

On Saturday afternoon, we held our special meal. Members were encouraged to share personal invitations to the Hmong community to come and join us for this special meal. Though the drive was about 1.5 hours from Anchorage, we had three non-member families come and join us for this special meal. The meal's menu included Laarb (fine ground beef mixed with herbs), which can be made raw and cooked, boiled beef bone soup (a very time-consuming dish, where the sauce is made from the intestine), short ribs, lean meats, tripe (stomach), BBQ beef, rice, and pepper to go along these dishes.

We thank the Lord for an afternoon filled with laughter, conversation, fellowship, games, songs, and the sharing of God's Word through devotions.

Three days was not long enough. If only we could hold time still for a moment. To see brothers and sisters in Christ gather together and to have families who don't believe be able to join us and see the unity, fellowship, love, and care of Christians was a great blessing. It's not just the planning that made all this come together, but God's guidance and blessings. This was made possible by everyone involved. We had roughly 70 people throughout the three days, and nearly 100 people at Saturday's meal. We had enough meat left over to share with the 18 families at Faith Hmong. The fact that each family was able to go home with a portion to enjoy shows us the abundance of God blessings.

We are looking forward to next year already! Maybe it won't involve butchering a cow (as that's a lot of work), but maybe something smaller. Any time we get to spend working together, loving each other, and being led by the Lord will be time well spent. May the Lord continue to bless this ministry and lead us to do all things to glorify him alone.
