Now there was at Joppa a certain disciple named Tabitha, which when translated, means Dorcas. This woman was full of good works and acts of mercy which she did.¹

John was clothed with camel's hair and a leather belt around his waist. He ate locusts and wild honey.² Passing through the street near her corner, he went the way to her house.³

She has sent out her maidens. She cries from the highest places of the city:⁴ "The voice of my beloved! Behold, he comes, leaping on the mountains, skipping on the hills.⁵

"Please let us make a little room on the roof. Let us set for him there a bed, a table, a chair, and a lamp stand. When he comes to us, he can stay there."⁶

He looked around to see her who had done this thing.⁷ So she caught him, and kissed him. With an impudent face she said to him:⁸ "Come, eat some of my bread, drink some of the wine which I have mixed!⁹

"I have perfumed my bed with myrrh, aloes, and cinnamon.¹⁰ Come away, my beloved! Be like a gazelle or a young stag on the mountains of spices!"¹¹

When the days of his service were fulfilled, he departed to his house.¹² When she saw that he had left his garment in her hand, and had run outside,¹³ she was in bitterness of soul, and prayed to Yahweh, weeping bitterly.¹⁴

"Hurry to help me, Lord, my salvation.¹⁵ I rose up to open for my beloved. My hands dripped with myrrh, my fingers with liquid myrrh, on the handles of the lock.¹⁶ I opened to my beloved; but my beloved left; and had gone away. My heart went out when he spoke. I looked for him, but I didn't find him. I called him, but he didn't answer.¹⁷

"Now my soul is poured out within me. Days of affliction have taken hold on me.¹⁸ God, don't be far from me. My God, hurry to help me."¹⁹

God is within her. She shall not be moved. God will help her at dawn.²⁰
