In his 1969 book *Hosanna in the Whirlwind: Devotional Readings for Times of Change*, O.P. Kretzmann wrote an Easter devotion titled "It was Very Quiet that Morning in the Garden." He penned these thoughtful words:

The tomb tells us

What we need to remember about earth ...

The stone rolled away tells us

What we need to know about God ...

The angel ties them together ...

"He is risen! He is not here!"

Easter is a day that we most likely will not appreciate enough until we reside in heaven, which will be glorious. No more tears. No more sickness. No more death. No more wars. No more hatred. No more crimes. No more sin!

The apostle John gave a description of heaven in Revelation. Read chapter 21.

The tomb came about because of sin. Sin brought death. God had warned Adam and Eve not to eat or even touch the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden "lest you die." They ate and death was the result. God told Adam the words that we hear on Ash Wednesday:

"For you are dust, and to dust you shall return." **GENESIS 3:19**

Adam and Eve died and were buried. Jesus, God's Son, died on the cross and was buried in a tomb on Good Friday.

That first Easter, that quiet morning in the garden, Matthew wrote:

There was a great earthquake, for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. MATTHEW 28:2

The Lord had His messenger roll back the stone. The tomb that was closed was open. Jesus who had been in the tomb was alive. When the women looked inside that open tomb, Jesus was not there. The angel was able to tell the women why the tomb was open:

"He is not here, for he has risen." MATTHEW 28:6

The empty tomb certainly tells us what we need to know about God. He loved us enough to send His Son. He sent Him to die on the cross and then rise and conquer death by rising from the tomb that first Easter morning in the garden. Jesus said whoever believes in Him will not perish and have everlasting life. The stone could not stop Jesus.

Merrill native is new mission director

Upon careful evaluation of organizational needs, prayerful deliberation and the concurrence of the LCMS Board for International Mission (under Synod Bylaw 3.3.1.3[e]), Rev. Dr. Cory J. Rajek has been appointed and accepted the call by Rev. Dr. Matthew Harrison, LCMS president, to serve as the executive director of the LCMS Office of International Mission (OIM).

Rajek, who is from Merrill and has served two North Wisconsin District congregations, most recently served with excellence as OIM Eurasia region director, residing in Riga, Latvia. He had first joined the Eurasia team as a called missionary theological educator in 2021. He previously served as senior pastor of Faith, Pierre, S.D. (2017–21) and in sole pastorates at Mount Calvary, Janesville, (2009–17), Grace Evangelical, Augusta, (2004–09) and Trinity/Calvary, Millersburg/Deep River, Iow (2001–04). He also served as adjunct faculty for Viterbo University in La Crosse (2009–21).

Rajek earned a PhD in leadership for the advancement of learning and service from Cardinal Stritch University (Kellner College of Education) in 2014 after having completed an MDiv from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, in 2001 and an MA in servant leadership from Vit-



erbo University in 2010. He also holds a bachelor's degreee in pastoral ministry from Concordia University Wisconsin (1997). He and his wife, Jennifer, have two daughters, Emiley and Alexis.



CHURCH-WORK STUDENTS: APPLY FOR DISTRICT AID

The purpose of district student grants is to reduce the financial burden for men and women enrolled at an LCMS university or seminary preparing for professional church work — pastor, teacher, deaconess, DCE, music director or other vocation.

An application must be filed each year. Students simply

need to contact the school's financial aid office to get the district financial aid application and return it to their school before May 15. grant for professional church worker students. We also paid in full the requested amount of \$3,000 to Worker Wellness for Chaplain Families.



Need funds for your mission project?

The North Wisconsin District's Board of Directors has earmarked budgeted dollars for mission grants. These grants are a significant way to encourage and equip our district ministries to vigorously make known the love of Christ. The purpose is to encourage and support local outreach and evangelism and to help proclaim the Gospel to non-Christians.

This year there is nearly \$50,000 to distribute, with grants ranging from \$200 to \$10,000. Grant requests will be evaluated according to their outreach/evangelism potential. Examples include canvassing the community and giving away T-shirts; hiring a preschool teacher; developing a marketing video; sharing a youth worker with another congregation; expanding VBS to include intentional outreach goals; hosting a community youth event; developing radio commercials or Facebook advertisements; and hosting a community Christmas event.

Grant requests must be received by Aug. 15 and the grants will be awarded in September. The grant must be used by Dec. 31, 2025. Find the application at *nwdlcms.org* under the "Events and Info" tab.
