It's political rally time and this ad from the Montello Express in 1917 advertises a patriotic rally that took place in Westfield. Who were the speakers that day? A little research tells us more about these men. The Honorable M. K. Reilly was from Fond du Lac and a member of Congress. He was also to become an expert on the League of Nations.

Attorney D. W. McNamara of Montello was appointed Post Master in Montello in August of 1916. He held numerous appointed positions including a committee membership to organize aid to China in 1920 and spoke around the state with Walter Ellis in support of a deep channel project from the Great Lakes to Portage in 1925. In 1915 D.W. McNamara argued a case before the Supreme Court of the United States. In 1920 he made the newspapers around the state for using an airplane to get to a meeting in Milwaukee.



Walter March Ellis shown in the photo above was the son of Joseph Loran Ellis and Theresa Margaret Trask. He married twice, first to Harriet M. Quatermass on 16 Jul 1890 and secondly to Lida Starr Hill in 1931. Walter served as the Principal at the Christian Endeavor Academy from 1902 — 1925.

Other accomplishments include: Graduate B. A. Tabor College, 1882

Airplane Used For Business Trip by Montello Lawyer Atty. D. W. McNamara of Montello is some little hustler when he hustles, and one day last week he was in a hurry to get to Milwaukee so he hired an airplane and made the 120 mile trip in one hour and thirteen minutes. The plane passed over Beaver Dam. It sure is the ideal way to travel when you want to "get there."

He's buried in Hillcrest Cemetery in Endeavor.



Camera Obscura was developed as long ago as the 11th century. It was developed in Iraq. It did not record images, though, the camera only projected upside down images through a pin hole onto a wall. The first known permanent camera photograph was taken in 1826 or 27 using a pewter plate coated with

bitumen. In 1837 the Daguerreotype was invented. Frenchman Louis-Jacques-Mande Daguerre was coinventor of the process of exposing a silver iodide coated copper plate to light and then exposing it to mercury vapor and a solution of salt to create a permanent image. Then came emulsion plates which were less expensive and required shorter exposure times. Both ambrotypes and tintypes use the emulsion or wet process. Ambrotypes use a glass plate and tintypes use tin. In 1870 dry gelatine plates were invented that allowed photographers much more freedom in their work and accommodated a mechanical shutter with shorter exposure time. In 1880 George Eastman developed a camera for everyone with flexible film.



Another updated exhibit is of fire departments in Marquette County. Marquette County has volunteer fire departments in

Newton, Oxford, Neshkoro, Harrisville, Springfield, Montello, Endeavor, Briggsville and Westfield.




