U.S. Mail Department. Following are
resolutions adopted.

Monhegan Feb. 24th 1913
To the Second Asst. Postmaster General
Washington D. C.

Dear Sir

At a special meeting called
by the Assessors of Monhegan Plantation ~~Mr.~~
on Tuesday Feb. 18th 1913 for the purpose of
submitting to the Post Office Dept. a protest
relative to carrying the U.S. Mail between
Monhegan ~~Mr.~~ and Boothbay Harbor ~~Mr.~~ the
following resolutions were voted upon and
adopted by the citizens of this Plantation
Whereas, the present contractor carrying the
Mail between said points during the whole
period of his incumbency for the period
of the past four years, during eight months
in each and every year has openly and
most flagranty violated the rules and
regulations of the Post Office Dept. as we
construct them. It is therefore resolved that
we the legal voters of said plantation do
heresby officially make a most stren-
uous protest against the present del-
inquent, grossly negligent, and
dilatory method of carrying the Mail
in the route aforesaid. That we are far
at sea off the Maine coast. That Mail
matters to us is of the most vital
importance. That we depend about

wholly on the mail for supplies to this point
 ordered through the P.O. Office Dept. That we
 have suffered with patience in hopes an im-
 proved service would be given us by the pres-
 ent contractor. That we have waited and petitioned
 in vain and that we hereby take these steps
 to draw to the attention of the Postal authorities
 that we have suffered the limit, and that we
 urgently request that the P.O. Dept. imme-
 diately take action in the matter. It is
 further resolved that it has usually been the
 custom of the P.O. Dept. to send inspectors
 who consult the local Postmaster at each end
 of the said route in every case of com-
 plaint. While we recognize that this is
 the right of the P.O. Dept. it is hereby re-
 quested that the P.O. Dept. instruct their
 officials to consult with a committee app-
 pointed at this meeting for the purpose of
 verifying the foregoing facts. It is further
 resolved that we consider that the boats
 used by this contractor during the said
 season are "improperly equipped" for
 this service, that they are makeshifts
 of the worst order and that owing to so
 many breakdowns too numerous to men-
 tion that we feel that it is a disgrace
 to both this Plantation and the P.O. Dept.
 to permit it to continue. It is further
 resolved that the P.O. Dept. instruct carry-
 ers to always return the Mail Bag to the
 local officers at each end of said route
 should they be detained by stress of
 weather or other causes in the vicini-
 ty of said offices and to have any
 remaining or new mail matter
 in said offices put in Mail Bag.
 That this is not done, and that for
 the purpose of improving this service
 it should be done. It is further resolved
 that such a service as we are entitled
 to be given us immediately, or the

Contractor in question be removed
 It is further resolved that a request be
 That the P.O. Dept. make it necessary
 That the equipment in boats in said
 route be kept in a standard condition
 and should a breakdown occur that
 a substitute boat be put on imme-
 diately. That at present this is not
 done it being the custom usually to
 take boat off the route until she is
 repaired and this delays the Mail in
 consequence. It is further resolved
 That copies of these resolutions be
 forwarded to Washington D. C. to the
 P.O. Dept. and also to our representatives
 to Congress with a request that he
 urge that immediate action in
 this matter be taken. It is further
 resolved that a committee of
 three legal voters be appointed to
 consist of one Assessor who will
 act as Chairman and two legal
 voters to meet said P.O. Official and
 to frame these resolutions in proper
 form and forward them as men-
 tioned.
