Influence of Mothers' Prayers

Hannah prayed for Samuel, and he became a prophet and a mighty man in Israel.

Moncia prayed for her wayward, paganized and ambitious child, and that child after years of dissipation, became a Christian; was made a bishop of the early church, and is known to the reverence of after ages as Saint Augustine.

The mother of John Newton, the hymn writer, prayed for him, and it must have been before he was seven years of age, for he lost her by death at that early period of life. But he himself tells us that he never forgot those prayers. He grew up to be a wicked man; a blasphemer and a "man stealer"—a kidnapper of slaves from Africa. In a terrible storm at sea, when every man was required to work the ship, he was missed from deck. A sailor was sent below to find him, and he found him on his knees, and heard him say: "O thou God of my dead mother, have mercy on my soul!" And God did show mercy.

The last hours of the venerable Dr. Nott were peculiarly impressive and affecting. Visions of his childhood home floated continually before him and the name of his mother was continually upon his lips; and the last words he uttered were the last words of prayer his mother taught him when a child—"Now I lay me down to sleep."

Says Mr. Spurgeon, "I cannot tell how much I owe to the solemn words and prayers of my good mother. It was the custom of Sunday evenings while we were children for her to stay at home with us. We sat around the table and read verse by verse, while she explained the Scripture to us. After that was done then came the time of pleading with God. And some of the words of our mother's prayers we shall never forget, even when our heads are grey. I remember her once praying (Continued on page six)

THE PRECIOUS THINGS OF GOD

Precious; what a remarkable word! It has so much meaning; defined as having great price, costly, valuable in a material and spiritual sense.

Isa. 28: 16. I Pet. 2: 6-7.

The most precious gift to man is Jesus; He is our life, our hope, in Him me live and move and have our being. Acts 17: 28. He is the lively stone rejected by the builders, (Acts 4: 11), yet he is head of all, king of all and Lord of all. To them that come to Jesus, there is no fear, for that stone some day shall fill the earth. Dan. 2: 44-45. When He comes we shall be gathered together with Him. Matt. 24: 28. The precious Lamb of God shed His blood, most precious blood, I Pet. 1: 19. That we might be completely redeemed in spirit, and soul, and body. I Thess. 5: 23-24. A life of sin, a vain conversation, and traditions of the fathers all go and christ becomes the center of our worship. We do not stand by our own power; he is our strength, and the great and precious promises of God gives us hope of being like him -having a Divine Nature, that seeks those things which are above. II Pet. 1: 4. I John 3: 1-2. Col. 3: 1.

Another of the precious things is the word of God. Samuel was known as a mighty prophet because he gave forth all the word that God gave him. I Sam. 3: 1-19. God wants us to honor His word; believe it, receive it, and live by it. Mark 1: 15. His words are our life and most precious. Matt. 4: 4. The word of God is precious seed, and those that sow the same, shall some day come rejoicing, rewarded for faithfulness. Psa. 126: 6.

The soul of man is precious. Psa. 49: 8. Often thrown carelessly away; willingly destroyed by the hand of sin, and spent without thought, yet it is precious in God's sight, in so much that when none could give to God a ransom for the soul, God sent his Son, Jesus, to save. John 3: 16. The soul is not to be gambled away in a wasteful manner, but to be invested in Christ, whose preserving power will keep that which is committed unto Him. II Tim. 1: 12. The future reward and glory cannot be compared to the small sufferings that we bear for his sake now. Rom. 8: 18.

Some men's thoughts are evil continually.

They were evil in the beginning, Gen. 6: 5, and are so now. Matt. 24:37-38. But David writes that the thoughts that we have of God are precious. Psa. 139: 17. Think of God; His redemption for us, the value of our souls, and the heaven that we have to gain. Perfect peace is promised to the man who thinks these thoughts. Isa. 26: 3.

Those that come to God, must have faith. Heb. 11: 6. And that faith is precious. We that know Him are in a rich, overcoming faith. II Pet. 1: 1. This is a life of victory ordained of God. I John 5: 4. There may be times when this faith is tried, but that, too, is precious. I Pet. 1: 7. A tried and tested faith; a full proof of our love for God and His cause shall certainly be remembered forever.

For the natural things of life, there is a beautiful scripture, Deut. 33: 13-18. Jacob blessed Joseph and asked of the Lord; the precious things of heaven, the blessings of the sun and moon, which would give bountiful crops. The precious stones of gold and silver, wealth to them that hold them. All of these things may come to us, for the willing shall eat the good of the Land. Isa. 1: 19.

Even in death there is victory if we know Christ. Psa. 116: 15. For the death of the saints is precious in the sight of God. His ways and thoughts are above ours. Isa. 55: 8-9. He knows that they rest from their labors and whether we live or whether we die we are the Lord's. Rom. 14: 8.

With so many precious words and promises from the Father above, it is easy to give glory to Him, and conclude that the best of life is to live for him, for this is the whole duty of man. Ecc. 12: 13. From a wise and holy God comes this precious way of living.

METHODIST MINISTER GIVES UP HIS FAITH

Topeka Pastor Says Church Denies Essential Doctrines or Hushes Them Up

Independence, Kans., March 11-A Methodist minister from Topeka in letters to other clergymen at the Kansas Methodist conference, declared today his intention of leaving the faith because he was expected to be unfaithful to his ordination vows.

The letter was signed by the Rev. W. H. Werner of Topeka and received by all ministers of the conference attending sessions here.

It asserted "it is common practice today, in the Methodist church, either to deny outright the most essential doctrines of the Bible or to hush them up so that they drop into oblivion."

As examples, the protesting minister cited the virgin birth, resurrection of the body and the second coming of the Lord.

"Instead of preaching regeneration, I am admonished to teach the devil's doctrine that all men are brothers," the letters said.

"I would be happier with another denomination or group. This is a plain invitation to get out. I am heeding this last request of the church my father served as minister and to which I gladly gave nearly 18 years of my life as minister. May God help the Methodist church."
