**Other accomplishments:** We obtained three estimates for a bocce ball court, sent out a community survey, established a website, and successfully ran our annual BBQ and Holiday Party, as well as a community 25th Anniversary Celebration. We began a monthly movie night, semimonthly Mexican train dominoes game, and a daily exercise class.

**Now onward to 2015**-- We have gathered some additional backflow pipe information to continue our quest for the best outcome for our community. We continue to consider the recommendations that were listed on our Community Survey. Some of the ideas are not costly and hopefully with the establishment of the new Activities Committee we can realize social, cultural and personal experiences that will benefit our Chantarelle community. Our HOA Board is striving to bring the best quality of life to our 122 homeowners. Some community members have passed on and new neighbors have moved into Chantarelle. Changes continue in the cycle of life. The objective to deliver necessary services and keep our monthly fee at \$150 has been accomplished for the time being.

# LANDSCAPE NOTES

Greetings and happiest of Happy New Years to all of you here in Chantarelle! Debbie and Susan here to report for you on the latest happenings in our Chantarelle landscape. **Nature's Irrigation**: As you all know blissfully well, December has been a month of much rain! Our plants and trees are singing in the rain, the ground is soft and damp, the streams are running, and our precious ground water is hopefully on the path to be restored to some semblance of normal levels. Nonetheless, we must still be conscientious about our water usage, as the drought is far from over. And even if it were to be miraculously over, we still need to alter our ways and become more mindful and conservative in our water usage. For that reason, during the entire month of December, the irrigation has been turned off. If the rains continue, you may not hear that familiar sound of the sprinklers going off until well into late spring. That is our hope! But we will be monitoring our usage needs closely as the winter progresses.

**Fallen Leaves**: As our gardens and lawns go into their version of hibernation in this time of winter, the main task of our Waldron Landscape Crew is to remove fallen leaves. We are watching closely to ensure that they do so in a timely manner so that our residents are safe from slipping on wet leaves on the pavement, as well as simply tidying up the neighborhood. **Pruning Elves**: Debbie and I are going to commence with a project in early January of hand-pruning the shrubs that are in the front entry ways of some of your homes. It is our hope that we can preserve some of the plants that do blossom in spring so that they don't get the "shaving" treatment that is the time-efficient but less than attractive pruning method that our Landscape Crew necessarily employs. So if you see the two of us in your front yard any time soon, that's what we are up to.

By the way, if you enjoy a bit of gardening and would like to be in charge of pruning your own front entryway shrubs, please let us know. We can notify the Waldron Crew to leave your shrubs alone so that you can tend them in the manner you prefer.

**Customize your knowledge:** Seek out location-specific training such as the 'Ready, Set, Respond' workshops offered at AAA branches. You'll learn how to help prepare for the disasters most likely to occur locally.

**Don't neglect the basics:** If you haven't already done so, take first-aid and CPR classes; sign up at *redcross.org.* Learn how to use the defibrillators found at many airports, malls, and other public places. In a disaster's aftermath, your participations can be a vital stopgap during the time it takes for emergency responders to arrive.
