GOVERNOR'S HOME TOWN AWARD

The village has been involved in a lot of big projects this past year that will continue for the next year and a half. We count them as our successes. These include the upgrading of the Park Lift Station. A big "THANK YOU" to Tom Newell and Blake Pree for all their hard work on that project as well as work at the lagoon.

Another great thing that happened was receiving \$318,000 from the State of Illinois OSLAD grant. This is a matching grant so the village must kick in \$318,000 too. We are about half-way there in funding this project. We are working with Utz & Associates and Milano & Grunloh in the design process. Big changes will take place in the park in 2023-2024.

As many of you know the Village is working with Stewardson-Strasburg District 5-A in a sewer line from the school to the village lagoon. New funding is available through the EPA for the Village to take advantage of. More details on this project will be coming later in the year.

Hats off to the fundraising efforts and success of the 150th Committee. Sue and Jodie and other committee members have thought outside the box and have offered some wonderful events for our community these past few months. I hope you were able to attend some of them.

Foundation letters have gone out. If you are considering making a donation, both the Park project and the 150th anniversary can use your help. The Park project will benefit all members of our community for years to come. We want the Park to be a place where families want to go, and we want it to be safe. We want to carry on and improve what our parents and grandparents accomplished before us. What better way to celebrate their and our hopes for the future than a celebration in 2024.

Ron Thomas has officially become our Village maintenance employee. Todd Apke continues to help when we need an extra hand. They deserve a big Thank you for the wonderful job they did in decorating the park for Christmas. Let them know you appreciate their efforts. Strasburg History excerpt #3: The following was taken from "Strasburg, Illinois Hundartjahrfest 1874-1974," How It All Began

So ends the story of our territory before Strasburg was. On to the town itself. It's recorded that Charles Ostermeier put up a store building where Renshaw's (*currently the Marathon Station) now stands. He opened a general store and supplied the nucleus of the future town. In 1874 when the railroad was completed through Richland Township, Ostermeier laid out 40 acres of land surrounding his store for the site of the town. He named it Strasburg for his native Strasburg in Germany. The streets he named after those in St. Louis. From an early plat book, we quote, "Strasburg has 150 souls and was platted March 7, 1874, by Charles Ostermeier." The original plat of Strasburg was east of the "slab" (*currently Rt 32). The land west of the road was prairie and was farmed for a number of years.

The first money crop around Strasburg was wheat. At one time special trains were run to town during harvest. As time went on most of the marsh land was reclaimed and made tillable by tiling. Around Strasburg it's not uncommon to find a farm with as much as two or three miles of tile. Ostermeier's store and Strasburg itself prospered.

The first building to be put up after Strasburg was laid out was Allen's Hotel, run by R. H. and A. F. Allen and located where Max Weber now lives (*currently where Chris & Sue Bowers live). Frank Beck was first postmaster. W. D. Fink was first blacksmith, and William Telgmann moved his brick yard in from a few miles out of town and established himself as first in the brick making business. Other first businessmen were: druggist-J. H. Wiandt; general merchant-Martin Hamm, Storm, Henry Faster Sr.; wagon shop-R. Rolbiger; sawmill-W. Bowen; grain dealer-J. D. Endicott; doctor-Dr. Amos York; shoemaker-Wm. Winkler; saloon-M. J. Laughlin; hotel and saloon-A. F. VanRheeden.

The town of Strasburg was incorporated in 1882, and Beulah Gordon records that story:

After the Lutheran Church was built at its present site about a quarter of a mile south of Strasburg, some citizens began to agitate for moving the business houses there. Lawrence Zurr, then postmaster, took his post office to that section, and a store, drug store, saloon, and grain buying office soon were established in "South Burg." This rivalry of the original town was just over the line in Prairie Township. Citizens of "North Burg" sensing the danger that threatened, decided to incorporate the town and exclude the upstart "South Burg" from its limits. Secret meetings were held in the garret over the blacksmith shop, and ways and means were plotted and discussed. Here it was brought to light that thirty votes were needed to carry the measure, and that "North Burg" had only twentyeight citizens to support it, while "South Burg" had thirty citizens who would vote it down. After some thought, Ostermeier and his followers schemed a scheme, and cautiously set about to execute it. Three young fellows from the country were induced to bring their washings to "North Burg," spend their Sundays in that place, and thus establish a legal residence there. When the specified time had elapsed and the three were bonified citizens of the village, and North Burgers demanded a vote on the matter of incorporation, and strange to say, triumphantly won the election by a majority of one ballot. (In the town board records of November 4, 1878, \$20.00 was paid to Mouser and Kelley "for their services in assisting to incorporate the village of Strasburg.")

Larry was born the son of Erwin and Joy Rincker Lenz, and the grandson of William and Caroline Diepholz Lenz and David and Anna Pfeiffer Rincker. He graduated from Stewardson-Strasburg High School with the Class of 1956, where he was active in FFA and 4-H. He married Patsy Gervaise Kessler on July 30, 1961 at First Methodist Church in Stewardson, IL.

Larry was a lifetime farmer and rancher, raising Angus Cattle. He volunteered much of his time to better his church and community. He was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Strasburg, where he served as elder, Sunday school teacher, and treasurer of the cemetery board. He was a longtime member

of the Farm Bureau and also served on the Shelby County Hospital Board, the Interstate Livestock Board, and the Shelby County Board for 35 years. Larry was a Richland Township Trustee and a former member of the Strasburg Lions Club, where he served as president.

Left to cherish his memories are his wife of 61 years, Patsy Kessler Lenz; two children, Trena (Wayne) Hatcher of Williamsburg, VA, and Timothy (Delreen) Lenz of Strasburg, IL; his three grandsons, Caleb (Amy), Seth, and Ethan Hatcher of Virginia; three sisters, Margaret Swank, Arlene (Ferd) McCormick, and Cathy (David) Allen.
