

A Point in Time

Time is a puzzlement. Not the magazine – the phenomenon. Scientists and philosophers are in agreement that there really is no such thing as time. It is an arbitrary construct – something that we humans impose on our reality. And nothing is more arbitrary than the various benchmarks and milestones that we celebrate. Like birthdays. A person who is seventeen years old and 360 days is really not all that different from a person who is eighteen years old and one day – except

that the latter can vote. Or new years (and we Jews celebrate at least two of those each time the earth completes its circuit around the sun). How different really is January 1 from December 31. And yet we put great stock in these arbitrary constructs of ours. We stand in 2020 and wonder how different 2021 will be. How arbitrary.... Except for a year like this one.

The fact is that this January really is an inflection point – actually two of them. And so, this new years really does deserve to be celebrated. Sometime in the new year vaccines will be available to the world to allow us to conquer the terrible plague that has ravaged our planet and taken so many lives. Here we cannot subscribe to Winston Churchill's words in November 1942 when he rallied his citizens with the assurance that while this was not the beginning of the end; it was the end of the beginning. For us, this really is the beginning of the end of this pandemic. It is an amazing achievement that these vaccines have been developed so rapidly – and with such international collaboration. In 2021 our lives have the promise of being so different from what we have lived through in 2020. A suggestion: when we get our vaccinations it is completely appropriate to recite the shehechianu, thanking G-d for giving us life, sustaining us, and enabling us to reach this moment of liberation.

And this January the country marks the transfer of authority. We welcome a new government and a new governing philosophy. The president who promised us that the virus would magically disappear by last April will not disappear. But he will not maintain his hold on the levers of power. And that, in itself, holds out immense promise. The country will be freed to respond to its many problems and challenges in new ways and freed to move in new, more constructive, directions. And after four long years that, too, deserves a shehechianu. We pray for the wellbeing of what an earlier Reform prayerbook referred to as, "those whom the people have set in authority: the president, his counselors and advisers, the judges, law-givers, and executives and all who have been entrusted with our safety and with the guardianship of our rights and our liberties". May they lead us wisely and well and enable our nation to achieve a new time of justice and tranquility.

Not every new year's day means all that much or carries particularly momentous implications. This one does. This one is unique. As we enter on this new month and this new year, we can pray with sincere thanksgiving that it holds the promise of being a year of life, well-being and goodness. The Cantor and I join with you in praying for a year of peace, health, and wholeness for you and all our "fellow travelers on the earth together".

How do you see the Shir Chadash of the future?


What can YOU do to help us reach these goals?

Cook's Corner

WINNING LATKE-FEST RECIPES!

Latke-tasting Judges have spoken!

First Place Winner for Traditional Latkes went to Rebecca Meshulam and her mom and Runnerup went to Sara Rothman for Sweet Potato Latkes—CONGRATULATIONS!

Rebecca's Potato Latke Recipe

makes 12 small latkes, but depends on the size of potatoes and onion

- *note: only make one batch at a time as potatoes will brown
- 2 large potatoes (Russet or Yukon Gold)
- 1 medium yellow onion
- 2 Tablespoons matzo meal
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 large egg beaten
- 1/4 cup canola oil (needs a lot of oil to fry for each batch)
- 1 cheesecloth or strainer (for straining liquid)

Serve with applesauce and sour cream

Cook's Corner

Rebecca's Potato Latke Recipe (Cont'd)

- 1. Chop potatoes and onion into large chunks. Add 1/2 to 3/4 of the potatoes and onions into the food processor with the chopping blade. Blend until the mixture is a mushy consistency. This consistency will help bind the final mixture.
- 2. Use a cheesecloth or strainer to drain the extra liquid into a bowl. Squeeze or press the liquid out of vegetables. Place the drained vegetables in another mixing bowl. Pour off the liquid from the first bowl, except the thicker liquid that settled. Save the thicker liquid that settles, sticks, to the bottom of the bowl and add to the bowl with the drained vegetables. This is the potato starch that helps bind and thicken mixture.
- 3. Add the rest of the chopped vegetables to the food processor, this time with a shredding blade. Use the cheesecloth or strainer again to drain the extra liquid. Repeat prior procedure in Step 2, saving the potato starch. Add the shredded vegetables and potato starch to the mixing bowl with the mushy vegetables.
- 4. Add the remaining ingredients to the bowl of vegetables and potato starch, EXCEPT FOR THE OIL. Mix well.
- 5. Heat the oil in a fry pan. The pan needs to be very hot (about 375-400 degrees) before adding the mixture. Once the oil is hot, add the latke mixture in spoonfuls (or as big or small as you would like them) and flatten each latke with a spatula. Once browned, flip each latke and brown the other side.
- 6. Cool the latkes on a cooling rack. Use paper towels to remove excess oil from latkes.
- 7. Can make ahead. Freeze in a single layer on a cookie sheet. Once frozen, put in a ziploc bag and freeze. When ready to serve, preheat the oven on high (425 degrees). Place latkes in a single layer on a cookie sheet, and place in the oven. Only takes 5-10 minutes to reheat latkes. Heats up fast, so make sure not to burn, just cook to a sizzling point. Use paper towels to remove excess oil from latkes.
- 8. Serve with applesauce and/or sour cream.

Sara's No-recipe Recipe for Sweet Potato Latkes

Sweet potatoes, shredded

1 large egg

Matzoh meal or flour

Dates finely chopped

Salt

Cinnamon and nutmeg to taste

Combine shredded sweet potatoes, egg and some matzoh meal or flour or another kind of binder.

Add a bit of salt, finely chopped dates, and cinnamon and nutmeg to taste.

Fry one, taste it and adjust.

Notes: Use Just enough egg and binder so that they hold together. Use potato starch and gluten free flour for gluten free latkes
