Black Bears
Scott Mitchell, Texas Parks and Wildlife

Scott Mitchell, a Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPWD) Biologist from Sanderson, will discuss the results of his M.S. Thesis on black bears (Ursus americanus). Black bears were once common in the mountain ranges of western Texas. A combination of many factors led to the extirpation of bears from west Texas by the mid 1900s. Anecdotal information supplies researchers, federal agencies, and state agencies with some of the most useful historical data concerning black bear habitation in western Texas. In 1977 TPWD initiated "voluntary reporting" of black bear activity in the state. Of the 3700+ sightings received since 1977 the majority come from west Texas and more exclusively from Big Bend National Park (BBNP). The National Park Service initiated a cooperative study in 1998 to learn more about resident bears in BBNP. During Scott's 2-year study he monitored 10 radio-collared bears, observed winter ranges, recorded reproductive rates, collected den data, and conducted a food habit study. Scott will also discuss the statewide recovery plan requested in 2001 by the TPWD commission.

Alberto Macias-Duarte

Alberto Macias-Duarte a student at the Universidad Autonoma Chihuahua has spent the last two years researching the breeding behavior and habitat use of Aplomado Falcons in northern Mexico. His presentation will focus on connections between vegetation structure, grassland bird populations, and the reproductive success of these endangered falcons. He will also give a brief discussion on the introduction efforts of west Texas.

Raptor Watch @ the Wyler Tramway

This is a great opportunity to learn about raptor migration & raptor identification. Observation periods vary to a certain degree but are typically from ~ 9am-12pm, or 12pm-4pm (varies due to scheduling, prevailing winds, etc.).

The areas of open water are shrinking, but blackbird roosting habitat is definitely on the increase.

Looking for a brilliant display of fall color in El Paso? Check out Feather Lake in November. The cottonwoods are a sight to see. Word has it they'll be at their peak Saturday, November 23, coincidentally the date of our next workday. Our work session starts at 2 p.m. We'll work a few hours then enjoy the late afternoon light on the cottonwoods.

Mexican Grey Wolves: Current Status in the Wild & in Captivity

John Kiseda just returned from the Mexican Grey Wolf Species Survival Plan (SSP) Annual Meeting & Reunion Binacional sobre el Lobo Mexicano, in San Diego, CA. [John is a member of the American Zoo and Aquarium Association's Mexican Grey Wolf SSP Management Team].

The meeting was attended by various people and entities involved in the restoration of the Mexican Grey Wolf in the wild, in the U.S. and in Mexico. Representatives of the U.S. and Mexican federal wildlife departments, Mexican and U.S. zoo's, and other facilities involved in the recovery process, met in a multi-day meeting to make plans and set goals for the coming year.

There are approximately 250 Mexican Grey wolves in captivity. 14 Mexican facilities hold ~ 110 wolves, and 3 of these facilities are considered pre-release facilities where wolves are maintained in a manner that makes them suitable for eventual release into the wild. 28 U.S. facilities maintain ~ 140 wolves, and 3 of these facilities are considered pre-release facilities where wolves are maintained in a manner that makes them suitable for eventual release into the wild. There were over 60 captive surviving births during the past pupping season.

"Wild in the U.S. Wolves" have done extremely well in the past year. There have been few "losses" of these wolves and few negative interactions with people and their property. There are ~ 40 wolves in the wild [and possibly even more] in the Blue Range area of the southwest. It is thought that 7 of the 8 existing packs [6 packs in AZ & 2 packs in NM], have pups.

Another very positive event of the past year, was the agreement reached with the White Mountain Apache Tribe, that will allow wolves to disperse onto their vast tribal lands.

AOU CHECKLIST CHANGES

The American Ornithologists' Union recently published the 43rd supplement to its Checklist of North American Birds. It summarizes decisions made by the AOU's Committee on Classification and Nomenclature 2000 and 2001. Among the changes:

The genus name for Roseate Spoonbill is changed from Ajaia to Platalea.

The Common Snipe is split into 2 species: Wilson's Snipe (Gallinago delicata), found in North America, and Common Snipe (Gallinago gallinago), an Old World species.

The scientific name for Red Phalarope is changed from Phalaropus fulicaria to P. fulicarius

The Eared Trogon is now known as the Eared Ouetzal.

The Tufted Titmouse is again split into two species, the Tufted Titmouse (Baeolophus bicolor) and the Black-crested Titmouse (Baeolophus atricristatus). The Black-crested occurs in Trans-Pecos Texas, though not as far west as El Paso.

The genus name for Blue Grosbeak is changed from Guiraca to Passerina. The grosbeak is now in the same genus as the buntings.

But one of the best birds was a Black-crowned Night Heron in the North pond. The top of the list, a pair of **GOLDEN EAGLES** sitting along Stan Roberts Sr. Ave.

The trip from the crossroads ponding area to the Sod Farm had 22 species enjoyed by 4 happy birders. A stop at the end of Sunset Drive, along the canal turned up 4 different Warbler specie. The best of the trip came at the Sod Farm where a WHIMBREL walked around within 100 feet of the cars.
