The Burren National Park covers a small part of the Burren and is the smallest of the six National Parks in Ireland, while the adjacent territory, including the Cliffs of Moher, is included in the Burren and Cliffs of Moher Geopark.]

The Irish Book Club

If you are on Facebook, just type The Irish Book Club into the search bar (or click on https://www.facebook.com/groups/2022642747761043/) and you'll find us. Our book for November was *Two Souls* by Henry McDonald; we read *Yeats is Dead* by Joseph O'Connor (et al) for December; and in January we'll be discussing *Close to Home* by Michael Magee.

Two Souls by Henry McDonald

Amazon's description: "Robbie McManus is tortured. His psychopathic comrade 'Padre Pio' McCann is never far from wreaking havoc, his punk cousin 'Rex Mundi' has arrived from England and is getting in the way, his father is imploring him to finish his A-levels and get the hell out of Belfast—and then there's Sabine, the mysterious loner in The Pound who shimmers, trancelike, on the dancefloor to the opening track of David Bowie's *Low*. Her hair dyed jet black in a Cleopatra cut, she is a moving hieroglyphic that Robbie is desperate to decipher. From the summer of 1978 to a frenzied Irish Cup Final day nine months later, and, through a series of smuggled 'prison comms,' to the paramilitary-stalked Belfast streets of the late '80s, all threads collide in a tense, thrilling denouement. At turns shocking and heart-breaking, *Two Souls* is a

deeply affecting novel that crackles and enthralls, tragically exposing human nature's futile efforts to make the right decisions and to choose a life worth living."

Irish Book Club members were divided on this one. Ellen wrote, "I will admit that I almost quit reading *Two Souls* at about 50% already read (on my Kindle). The scene where Padre Pio (a punk IRA teenager in Belfast) takes a large dump in the stands at an Irish football game (as a protest against the Brits of course) was bad enough; then a few pages later, we find our hero ("Ruin," AKA Robbie), in a flat where a 10 or 11-year-old boy lies on the floor drawing pictures beneath a large screen TV showing a porno movie, while the adults in the room make comments about the size of the male porno actor's immense 'instrument.' Yuk. Still, I persevered, but don't really like thinking about the book or the characters very much." IAS and Book Club member Bill Nevins somewhat disagreed, writing "I am stunned. For me, it is not just a novel but a revisiting of some very disturbing history. I was in Belfast and Derry in 1987 at the time of the horrible internecine feud inside the splintered Irish Republican socialist movement, which is described here. . . . This novel is disturbing and just too close to reality for comfort. McDonald is a brilliant writer, but sadly, he died last February, at the age of 57. Alas. He did leave us some valuable testimony in his writings. Whew! What a ride *Two Souls* is!"


The Chieftains' Music in Movies

My son had to read Robert Louis Stevenson's *Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* for his English class. I told him that RLS wrote other classics as well, but rather than having him read another book (oh, the horror!), I decided to get the movie *Treasure Island*. We watched the 1990 Charlton Heston adaptation that his son, Fraser Heston, wrote and directed. It also starred a young Christian Bale as Jim Hawkins, Christopher Lee as Blind Pew, and a host of other fine actors. As the movie began, my other son asked if this was an Irish movie because of the Irish music (those dance lessons paid off!). I looked it up and sure enough, The Chieftains did the entire music score for this version of *Treasure Island*. So, it got me wondering, what other movies did The Chieftains provide music for? I will answer that after I add a little more about the score for *Treasure Island*.


On the DVD (and Blu-ray), there is director commentary in the special features section by Fraser Heston. This is well worth listening to for the details of the screenplay, actors, and music score, which Paddy Moloney composed entirely for the movie and performed with his band, The Chieftains. Mr. Fraser said that Paddy Moloney could not write music, so he wrote the entire score in Tonic Sul-fa (which I will not explain here) and he would write "diddly dum diddley dee" on a legal pad. Along with the uilleann pipes, tin whistle, fiddle, etc., Paddy Moloney incorporated the didgeridoo, an Australian aboriginal wind instrument, during the more dangerous, wilder scenes of the movie. Heston goes on to say that Paddy Moloney even brought in a Galician piper (I'm going to go out on a limb here, but Carlos Núñez comes to mind). This adaptation of Treasure Island is well worth watching for the top-notch acting, beautiful scenery, and of course the most excellent musical score.

Before *Treasure Island*, The Chieftains did the entire musical score for another movie, a 1985 documentary from National Geographic, *Ballad of the Irish Horse*. From the description by National Geographic, the movie "Focuses on the horses of Ireland and their role in history, tradition, and business of the Irish people who ride, tame, train, and breed these horses, for pleasure as well as for work. Accompanied by Irish folk tunes." The documentary can be watched in its entirety at https://m.youtube.com/watch?v=sKSoQA3u1j0, and if you love horses, I highly recommend it. There is also a CD released by The Chieftains with the same title available to borrow on Hoopla.




Barry Lyndon is a historical drama written and directed by Stanley Kubrick, adapted from the book *The Luck of Barry Lyndon* by William Makepeace Thackeray. It stars [the late] Ryan O'Neal as Barry Lyndon. In 2020, film critic contributors to *The Irish Times*, Donald Clarke and Tara Brady, rated *Barry Lyndon* #1 out of the 50 best Irish films ever made. The film really grew on me because of the final duel scene and of course, the music. The Chieftains provide the traditional Irish music for the first half of the movie, including the Grammy winning song, *Women of Ireland*. The Oscar-winning soundtrack is epic with works also by Handel, Schubert, Vivaldi, Bach, and more.

The Grey Fox is a 1982 Canadian film that won seven Genie Awards (equivalent to the Oscars in Canada), including best musical score. Richard Farnsworth (*Misery*) is perfectly cast as Bill Miner, the infamous stagecoach robber turned train robber after his release from a 33-year sentence in San Quentin prison. (The phrase, "Hands up!" is credited to Bill Miner.) The Chieftains contribute to half the musical score, composed by Paddy Moloney, including the song, *Sea Image*.



Circle of Friends is a 1995 movie based on the novel of the same name from Irish writer, Maeve Binchy. It is directed by Irish filmmaker Pat O'Connor and filmed in Ireland. Set in 1950s Ireland, it is a story about three college-age girlfriends and their Catholic guilt and shame about sex, societal expectations, and betrayal. All heavy topics, but the movie touches them with a light, comedic hand thanks to Maeve Binchy's writing. The score is a variety of rock n' roll, slow dance, and traditional Irish music, provided by The Chieftains, of course. The song, You're the One, co-written by Michael Kamen and [the late] Shane MacGowan is the ending credits song. MacGowan, front man for the Irish punk band, The Pogues, sings the duet with Máire (Moya) Brennan, lead singer for Clannad. It is also heard in the movie as an air played by The Chieftains. Far and Away is a movie directed by Ron Howard and filmed in part in Ireland. Howard co-wrote the story with Bob Dolman about Irish immigrants who come to America to take part in the 1893 Cherokee Strip Land Race in Oklahoma. In the special features section of the DVD, Howard says he became enamored with Ireland after an airport layover on the island as a child. One night he was at The Chieftains concert and they played a tragic song about a couple in love, torn apart when one of them departs to America. After hearing that song, he resolved to make a movie about Irish immigrants. Howard, having some Irish ancestry, learned that three of his great-grandparents took part in the famous race, so he centered the immigration story around that event. The Chieftains play three tracks written by composer John Williams, The Fighting Donellys, Fighting for Dough, and in the end credits.






Lovespell is the tragic Irish love story of Tristan and Isolde. The 1981 movie stars Richard Burton, Kate Mulgrew (Star Trek Voyager), and Nicholas Clay (Excalibur) The title theme was composed and arranged by Paddy Moloney and played by The Chieftains. The song is included in some of their CDs and in their live performances. The movie was filmed entirely in Ireland around Cahir, Co. Tipperary, Corofin, Co. Clare, and Oughterard, Co. Galway. 
Gangs of New York is a historical fiction crime drama direct

Gangs of New York is a historical fiction crime drama directed by Martin Scorsese. The ambitious movie depicts gang life in

the extremely crowded Five Points district of Lower Manhattan before the Civil War, the Draft Riots, and the crooked politician William "Boss" Tweed. The story centers around the rivalry between the immigrant Irish gang, the Dead Rabbits, and the Nativist gang led by Bill "The Butcher" Cutting, played by Daniel Day-Lewis (*My Left Foot*). The storyline is loosely adapted from the non-fiction historical book, *The Gangs of New York*, by Herbert Asbury. Two songs arranged by Paddy Moloney can be heard in the movie: *Paddy's Lamentation*, performed by Mary Black, and *Kerry Slides*, performed by The Chieftains. That other little ole band from Ireland, U2, wrote and performed the main theme for the movie, *The Hands That Built America*. Bono performs the traditional *Báidín Fheidhlimí*.



Rob Roy is a biographical drama about the historical Scottish outlaw and folk hero, Rob Roy MacGregor. Filmed entirely in Scotland, the movie begins in 1713 with a sweeping view of Lock Leven. The song O'Sullivan's March, written by Michael Tubridy and performed by The Chieftains, can be heard two times in the movie. Slightly off topic, but interesting nonetheless, if you are planning a trip to Scotland, there is a 79-mile trail called Rob Roy Way that visits many of the places linked with Rob Roy. The trail even passes Pitlochry, a 3600-year-old stone circle. Visit https://www.robroyway.com/



beautifully sings the traditional Irish songs in Gaelic (thus, the movie name). Traditional Aboriginal songs are also sung in the movie by Billy (Baykali Ganambarr), the Aborigine she meets during her quest for revenge. This movie is violent, and I agree with Larry's assessment of the violence in that it shows an honest depiction of the horrors of colonialism.

The Water Horse: Legend of the Deep is one of the best family movies around. It has a great storyline that all ages will enjoy with lots of humor and just a wee bit of scares for the little ones. My boys have watched this movie over and over again since they were little and it would make a great Celtic movie night. Set in Scotland during WWII, a lonely little boy, Angus MacMorrow (Axel Etel), finds a mysterious egg on the beach and takes it home. When the egg hatches, the magical creature and Angus help each other in ways neither one of them expected. The Chieftains can be heard playing traditional Irish music throughout the movie and in the end credits. The late Irish singer Sinéad O'Connor wrote and sings the theme to the movie, Back Where You Belong.



This listing is by no means exhaustive. The Chieftains have also contributed to various TV mini-series, TV shows and other movies not listed here. I've only included the movies that would be most readily available to view by streaming or borrowing from a public library. This long list proves the magnitude of their influence on the music and movie industry. I have enjoyed watching or in some cases, re-watching these movies and listening for the songs in the movies and I hope you do, too.


