

REFLECT

rish Television Broadcaster RTE, has a programme that appears regularly called Reeling in the Years. It's a look back at a particular year in Irish history and through music and videos, gives an often informative and reflective account of a specific point in time. On one of their more recent programmes, it showed clips of the great famine in Biafra back in the late 60s. Naturally some of the videos and scenes are still shocking to watch but the striking thing about the images shown, was the number of Irish missionaries and aid workers who made a conscious decision to stay with the people and help them in whatever way they could. Millions of people died of hunger but amidst the devastation, people were also helped. As I write this, aid workers are assisting the people of Gaza, with food and medicine. Medical aid is being delivered to hospitals in Ukraine to help in their struggle. The goodness of others amidst pain and struggle is what gives us hope. To leave everything behind and to love your neighbour is the greatest of treasures according to today's Gospel. It's the message he places before his followers today, encouraging us to become servants of God, sharing his love and compassion.

This journey with Mark's Gospel over the past number of weeks has brought us into contact with many of the worries of the disciples. They become deeply concerned with some of the predictions of Jesus, that he will be persecuted, die on a cross and be raised up.

It won't be until they see first-hand the events leading to Calvary, that they will truly understand what Jesus meant. But the other crucial preoccupation of the disciples in these chapters relates to power and vying for position amongst this diverse group of followers. James and John take centre stage today. They have witnessed the many signs of Jesus and have listened intently to his word. It stands to reason then that they want to be close to him. They want to hold the highest possible position by his side. One could say that their request is bold. After everything they have seen and heard, they must by now realise that Jesus has no concern with positions of power. His consistent request is that whoever wants to be great, must become a slave, a servant. Unlike the rulers of the Gentiles who rule it over everyone, Jesus himself is a servant to all people.
