

400-POUND GORILLA OR RUNAWAY LOCOMOTIVE? By Rev. Mark

Things that are considered big and influential are often referred to as the 400-pound gorilla. I'm sure you've heard the old joke- "where does a 400-pound gorilla sit? Anywhere it wants!" I've mentioned several times that the Aledo United Methodist Church has grown in average worship attendance and is seeing attendance numbers around 250/week this fall. According to United Methodist standards, that no longer qualifies us to be considered a "small church" but a medium-sized church"! Pretty amazing, when you think about it!

So are we, then, a 400-pound gorilla-, able to "throw our weight around" and flex our spiritual muscles at will? No, if anyone is that, it would be God Himself. What we are is a train which has had more fuel stoked into the engine. We've been going for a long time, doing good work, pulling our load, moving steadily. But now, as that increase in fuel happens, we pick up steam, and the pace quickens. That enables us to go faster, further, reaching more stops, picking up more passengers along the way. We've even had to add more "cars" to accommodate the increase in passengers.

Change is inevitable- the very nature of life itself is built around the concept of change. (Our skin replaces itself in as little as 35 days.) The question isn't, "Will we as individuals, as a church, change?" The question is, "How will we change, and how will we respond to that change?" God calls us to get out of our comfort zone, to stretch and grow, try new things, explore new possibilities. It's often not easy, but it is always rewarding. God wants to bless you and your family. God wants to bless your church. And the BEST way those things happen is when we immerse ourselves in God's work. When we focus on ministering to others in the name of Jesus Christ, we stop focusing so much on ourselves and our own wants and desires. And when that happens, there is an amazing byproduct- God rewards our behavior with blessings we can't possibly imagine. And I see those things happening here...and I can't WAIT to see what else God has in store for us! This fall, let's continue be the little...er, medium-sized...engine that could, pushing forward down the track to reach new destinations. God is good, all the time.

CURRENT AND NEW SERMON SERIES(ES)!

On Sunday, September 7, we began not one but TWO new sermon series! One is featured at both 8AM and 10:15AM while the other is featured at the NEW 6PM Sunday evening service- The Point!

On Sunday morning, we are venturing into uncharted waters as we navigate <u>Terra Incognita</u>. In 150AD, Ptolemy, a Greco-Egyptian writer of Alexandria, wrote a book called Geography. It was a compilation of what was known about the world's geography in the 2nd century. In it, he coined this phrase to describe that which was beyond the boundary of what had yet been discovered. Latin for "unknown land", Terra Incognita refers to the great unknown- that which is beyond our current understanding. Each week, we are looking at another aspect of the "uncharted waters" into which we as a church are currently sailing. And along the way, we are experiencing both the beauty and wonder of the "undiscovered country"! The remaining weeks of the series look like this:

Sunday, October 5- Step 5: Stay Focused and Inspired (Hebrews 13:5-6)

You have to make sure that the main thing remains the main thing. Sunday, October 12- <u>Step 6: Be Flexible</u> (Philippians 4:11-13)

Curves and potholes will come- you have to be able to adjust.

Sunday, October 19- Step 7: Enjoy the Ride (Ecclesiastes 5:18-20)

On Sunday evening, we are turning up the "squirm" factor a bit as we look at <u>The Wussification of the</u> <u>Church</u>. Based on the writings of theologian Leonard Sweet, this series challenges what you think about "church". Facts don't lie, and the facts say that the Church…capital "C"…has been in decline for decades with no real signs of slowing down or rebounding. Wussification- what does that even mean? According to the Urban Dictionary, "wussification" is "the trend of becoming an increasingly wimpy society". Every week of this series, we ask a question…a HARD question…designed to make us think a bit longer and a bit harder about the Church…and our involvement in it. Come prepared to be challenged AND respond! The remaining weeks of this series look like this:

Sunday, October 5, 2014- <u>The Sacrifice Question: Will YOU Lay Down YOUR Life</u>? (John 13:31-38) Jesus asks us to set aside the things that keep us from Him.

Sunday, October 12, 2014- <u>The Cross Question: Will YOU Drink the Cup</u>? (Matthew 26:36-46) We are called to share our life with Jesus, to follow Him no matter what.

Sunday, October 19, 2014- The Empty Tomb Question: Why Are YOU Crying? (John 20:1-18)

The Good News brings joy, not sorrow.

Join me every Sunday morning as we chart a new course! Join me every Sunday evening as we ask the hard questions!

Then, on October 26th, we begin two NEW series! First, for Sunday mornings, we begin **Growing Spiritual Redwoods**. This series, based on a book by Bill Easum and Tom Bandy, looks at the two types of churches that exist today--those that are withering and those that are flourishing. We start from the premise that "the way we've always done it" keeps churches from ministering to its members. Putting aside decision -makers for disciple-makers is one of the facets of change that can alter the leadership, worship, and methodology of any church, lending itself to further growth, evangelism, and outreach. This series will help us answer the kinds of questions that confront Christians in this era of rapid and uncertain change. Questions like: are you committed to Jesus Christ...or to a particular doctrine? Do you speak of faith as an experience of Christ...or as a heritage to protect at all costs? Do you believe that the purpose of ministry is to make members...or disciples? Deep spiritual vitality and an openness to the "new thing" that God is doing characterize the "spiritual redwoods" that can emerge from this time of change. The weeks of the series look like this:

Sunday, October 26- <u>Vista One: Living on the Edge of Tomorrow</u> (2Corinthians 4:13-18) A body of true believers will sacrifice anything and everything for the sake of Jesus and the Gospel. (Genesis 1:1-5, 1Corinthians 13:13) (continued on page 3)

Sunday, November 2- Vista Two: Beneath, Behind, Beyond (Luke 10:25-28)

Passion for the transforming experience of Jesus and the mystery of life brings hope, harmony and joy. (Deuteronomy 3:4-6, John 13:34-35)

Sunday, November 9- Vista Three: The Fluid That Flows (Matthew 4:8-11)

Worship feeds new life in multiple ways and is indigenous to the cultural forest surrounding the Spiritual Redwood. (Psalm 95:6-7a, Romans 12:1-2)

Sunday, November 16- Vista Four: Birthing the Fruits of Life (2Corinthians 5:14-18)

Spiritual leadership helps others give birth to the potential which God has created in every person. (Ezekiel 11:19-20, 1John 1:7-9)

Sunday, November 23- Vista Five: The Tree of Life (Revelation 22:1-6)

The best vision of growth is seen from the tallest of trees. (Proverbs 29:18, Acts 18:9-11)

Also on October 26, we will begin out next Sunday EVENING sermon series- **Burning Heart: The Unmistak-able Fire**. In 2006, heart disease caused 26% of ALL deaths in the United States. It is the leading cause of death for both men and women. In 2009, heart disease cost the United States \$304.6 billion, including the cost of health care services, medications, and lost productivity. Our heart is an incredibly vital organ. And it's NOT just vital from a physical standpoint- it is also central to our spiritual growth. As we walk through the Old Testament book of Deuteronomy, we will experience the journey the heart takes as it moves from being lost to being on fire for God. Where will you find YOURSELF on the journey? The weeks of this series look like this:

- Sunday, October 26- <u>The Lost Heart</u> (Deuteronomy 1:21-28) What do you do when you've allowed others to drag you down?
- Sunday, November 2- <u>The Turned Heart</u> (Deuteronomy 29:16-18) Are YOU responsible when a fellow Christian turns away from God?
- Sunday, November 9- <u>The Disciplined Heart</u> (Deuteronomy 8:1-5) How does God provide for you?
- Sunday, November 16- <u>The Giving Heart</u> (Deuteronomy 15:7-11) Why does God want you to help others?
- Sunday, November 23- <u>The Burning Heart</u> (Deuteronomy 6:3-6) Do you love God with all your heart?

God's Word has the capacity to change people no matter what the human motivation or program might be. Come to worship each Sunday- expecting God to show up and grow you into a spiritual redwood AND to see what He can do...and wants to do...with your heart!

PARKING

On the other hand, if you are able/comfortable to park across the street and walk over, then please save the other spots for folks who need them! 

THE TACTIC

Finally, all of you, live in harmony with one another; be sympathetic, love as brothers, be compassionate and humble. 1 Peter 3:8, NIV

THERE ONCE WAS a little boy whose name was Tommy. One day in school Tommy's teacher asked him to come to the chalkboard to do a math problem: 2 + 2 =. Tommy strode to the board, picked up a piece of chalk, and wrote the number "5" in the space. When his teacher informed him that his answer was wrong, Tommy thrust out his chest and said, "It may be wrong for you, but not for me. I say two plus two equals five."

Later, Tommy was playing at recess. A little girl stood ahead of him in line, waiting to climb the ladder to the giant slide. Tommy pushed her down into the dirt and took her place in line. "Tommy," his teacher said, "you should be more compassionate. Don't you know it's wrong to be so cruel?"

But Tommy stepped onto the ladder and smiled. "Maybe it's wrong for you, but it's not wrong for me. I say cruelty is right and being nice to other people is wrong!"

Tommy said such things many times until the last day of school, when his teacher called him aside. "Tommy," she said, "I wanted to show you your report card." She smiled and handed Tommy the piece of paper, which bore a large red F.

Tommy looked shocked. "An F?" he said. "Why are you giving me an F? That's not right!"

The teacher smiled. "An F may not seem right to you, but it's right for me!"

Obviously, Tommy's tactic backfired, didn't it? That's the problem with saying, "Well, it may be wrong for you, but it's not wrong for me!" We all want to be treated fairly, honestly, sympathetically, lovingly, and compassionately. Those things are right whether or not we say they're right. Those things are right whether or not Tommy says they're right. Those things are right whether or not anyone says they're right. Know why? Because it's not up to any of us to say what's right or what's wrong; that decision belongs to God and God alone. That's a lesson Tommy needed to learn; it's also a lesson we all need to learn.

Celebrating the anniversary of Christopher Columbus's arrival in the Americas (which occurred on October 21, 1492), Columbus Day became a federal holiday in 1970. However, its American roots go much deeper. In 1792, New York City and other eastern U.S. cities celebrated the 300th anniversary of his landing in the New World. In 1892, President Benjamin Harrison called upon the people of the United States to celebrate Columbus Day on the 400th anniversary of the event. Columbus Day was first popularized as a holiday in the United States through the lobbying of Angelo Noce, a first generation Italian living in Denver. Since 1971, the holiday has been commemorated in the U.S. on the second Monday in October- the 13th of October this year.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

Our mission is to connect people to Jesus Christ. What better way to plant the seed of Christ's love than to do so with a child? **Operation Christmas Child** brings joy and hope to children in desperate situations world-wide through simple, gift-filled shoeboxes that show God's love.

Last year, the Aledo United Methodist Church donated 151 shoeboxes to this wonderful Christian mission project. Those were 151 children who may not have received anything to celebrate the birth of our Lord. That is also 151 families who witnessed God's love first-hand. What a wonderful blessing for both the recipient and the giver.

Boxes may be filled with dozens of items. Along with items like school supplies, jump ropes, t-shirts, small stuffed toys, small cars, please consider hygiene items in your box as well. Dr. and Mrs. Gary Olson are donating a toothbrush for each box. There are two sizes available – small and regular sized (adult). Please choose according to the age of your child. Other hygiene items could include toothpaste, bar soap (place in a plastic, zip-lock bag), washcloths, hair combs and brushes. Once again this year, our church is supplying 2 pencils for each shoebox. These items, which we may take for granted, may be the only such items that these children have all year. Can we count on YOU to get on board to help a child in need? If you can help in any way, it will be appreciated greatly by the children!

Each box should be accompanied with \$7.00 to cover the shipping. Your check should be made payable to **Samaritan's Purse** and placed in an envelope **INSIDE** the box. In the case of multiple box donations, <u>only one check</u> is needed to cover the cost of shipping for all. **Just follow the instructions in the brochure to get your box ready to send!** (Cash donations are welcome as well. Extra money will be used for necessary postage and/or extra items for shoeboxes.) You may pick up a "list" of possible items to pack in your box at the shoebox center in the Fellowship Room, October 5th.



So, if you haven't done so already, now is the time to begin finding small items for your shoebox. You may use the official shoeboxes provided, or use regular shoeboxes. The regular shoeboxes may be wrapped in Christmas paper (**lid must be wrapped separately from the bottom**) or plastic totes can be used. You are not limited to one box...you may fill as many as you want and we encourage you to do just that.

If you don't know for sure if you want to participate, please take some time to think about it. Pray about it. Decide for yourself if you and your family are willing to share the blessings God has given you with a child who is less fortunate. Let the world know that "God is Good!"
