12th Sunday Ordinary Year B Mark 4:35-41

On that day, as evening drew on, Jesus said to his disciples: "Let us cross to the other side." Leaving the crowd, they took Jesus with them in the boat just as he was. And other boats were with him. A violent squall came up and waves were breaking over the boat, so that it was already filling up. Jesus was in the stern, asleep on a cushion. They woke him and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" He woke up, rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Quiet! Be still!" The wind ceased and there was great calm. Then he asked them, "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" They were filled with great awe and said to one another, "Who then is this whom even wind and sea obey?"

Jesus set the seas in order! We know the actual words Jesus used to calm the wind and waves. He said, "Quiet-Be Still!", and the wind subsided and waves calmed in the gospel today (Mark 4:35-41). Earth's most powerful elements heard Jesus! On what decibel level does God's speech operate to break through and reach the wind and sea? I am told that a humpback whale can emit sound in the sea that carries from 1,000-3,000 miles, because it is uttered at such a low frequency and due to water being an ideal medium to carry sound. But what language does the wind and water speak? Do you remember the 70's groove band 'Earth Wind and Fire'? They had a good sound for the era with their hit 'Shining Star'! But 'geographic earth' has a language that maybe only God knows (He created it- He knows its rhythm). But we certainly see Jesus' authority over natural elements today when He commands them to settle down, and they comply. In Mark 4:41, we hear that the apostles' reaction was that 'They were filled with great 'awe' witnessing Jesus control the sea and wind. Before Jesus performed that miracle, they thought the wind and waves were scary. Afterward, Jesus had impressed upon them what we call good old 'Fear of the Lord'. It is one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. I'd say it is the first gift since scripture tells us that "the beginning of wisdom is fear of the Lord." Scripture uses that exact formula for how wisdom is attained through 'Fear of the Lord' in Psalm 111:10 and Proverbs 9:10 (also Prov 1:7 & 4:7). 'Fear of the Lord' is defined as our humble and healthy respect and reverence owed to God. It will get us far in life and bring us peace. The apostles knew they were in the awesome presence of God when Jesus performed this miracle. Knowing they witnessed such marvelous actions of Jesus, we can easily question how they ever doubted Jesus or slipped in their belief. But to keep ourselves humble we also have to ask, "What makes us think we would believe more faithfully and act stronger than they did?" We also need to keep in mind, too, that John recorded in his gospel Jesus's words commending most highly those who do not need 'dramatic proofs' to believe, when he wrote that Jesus said, "Blessed are they who have not seen and have believed" (John 20:29). How are we doing with belief?

Miracles are nice, but not necessary for genuine faith. I like when St Paul mentions in 2 Corinthians 12 that three times he prayed to God for an intervention and removal of his 'thorn in his flesh' and nothing happened. Also, Paul adds that this refusal happened after he had received an 'abundance of the revelations' (2 Corinthians 12:7). Paul had experienced divine interventions and miraculous revelations. But not this time! Yet God did respond telling Paul, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness" (2Cor 12:9). (If I could I'd advise Paul, "At least you got a response!") But, I hear God saying that what is more important than impressive displays of God's power, is the simple faithfulness of God being with us. God's grace, His presence, is sufficient (This is what we express, when we say in a trial, 'God you don't have to make it all go away, just stay with me through it!') We can see that the three temptations of Jesus in the desert were the Devil's way of taunting him to perform miracles 'on demand'. Jesus had even said in Matthew 12:39 "An evil and unfaithful generation seeks a sign, but no sign will be given it..." Again, a miracle is nice, but not necessary. Faith is a loving trust without demanding displays of proof.

As a brief course in Jesus miracles, we do find many different types of them in scripture. For example, He performs some nature miracles involving earth's elements as when He transforms water to wine (john 2:1-11), multiplying fish and loaves (Matt 14:13-21), overwhelming fish-catches from previously barren seas (Luke 5:1-11) and waking on water (Mark 6:45-50). He also performs miracles of life when he resurrected Lazarus (John 11), Jairus' daughter (Matt 9:18-26) and the widow's son at Nain (Luke 7:11-17) and Himself! He also performs many miracles of bodily healing such as the blind (Mark 10:46-52), lepers (Luke 17:11-19), the deaf/mute (Mark 7:31-37), paralytics (Matthew 9:1-8) and many demon-plagued people (Mark 5:1-20). Yet, Jesus also performed many miracles of the heart (psychological wholeness and lasting peace) for He always offered the right word to affirm, comfort, disarm, embrace or challenge, break through hardness with insight or awaken to truth. For example, He calmed angry mobs (John 8:1-11 & Luke 4:30), pacified some Pharisees (Luke 20:40), softened Zacchaeus' bitterness (Luke 19:1-10), pierced Pilate's posturing (John 19:8) and even touched convincingly the solders arresting Him (John 18:6). And how many more psychological ailments of people he met, did He heal? But again, more important than any display of dramatic cures by Jesus is the simple and saving fact of just being in relationship to Him. Jesus says this much in Luke 10:20 "Do not rejoice because the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice because your names are written in heaven.' People of faith do not have to see any miraculous revelation, we just have to stay in relationship to the master! His mere presence with us is sufficient!

# Memo from Bishop's Medley's Office

Bishop Medley Reinstates Mass Obligation:

"The general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (including the Saturday/Vigil Mass) is now reinstated (CIC, can. 1247). This takes effect in the Owensboro Diocese the weekend of June 12-13, 2021. This date was chosen because as of June 11, there will be no statemandated restrictions, including capacity restrictions on gatherings. As has always been the case, those who have a serious reason are exempt from attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2181). This includes those who are ill, have significant health risk factors or care for someone who is immuno-compromised or ill, as well as those who have significant fear or anxiety of contracting the coronavirus in a large group of persons. Nevertheless, these persons should observe the Lord's Day (CIC, can. 1247) and are encouraged to spend time in prayer on Sunday, meditating on the Lord's Passion, Death and Resurrection. Kindly consult your pastor with any specific questions regarding the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation."


