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

Intergenerational: Blessed by the rich heritage of Good Shepherd for more than 60 years, we would like to continue to develop intergenerational relationship among the members and friends. Honoring each generation, Silent, GI, Boomers, X, Millennials, we include all generations for their faithful discipleship and leadership to all the aspects of mission and ministry of worship, study, service and sharing.

Technology: Good Shepherd would like to take advantage of the cutting-edged technology to bring the Gospel of Christ for all, to enhance faithful connections of the members and friends of the church, and to bring forth God's Kingdom in our midst. This includes traditional methods of communication for the heavily dependants on papyrus, paper, audio and wired media.



To Green Pastures and Quiet Waters ...





Casting Vision: Toward the Year of Multiplication

For our journey - praising, experiencing, serving and sharing God during the season after Epiphany shall focus on helping others know that we are truly God's people—"a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation a people belonging to God! We shall declare the praises of him who called us out of darkness into his wonderful light." (1 Peter 1:9).

January-February 2019

Now is good time to cast vision to build a church that multiplies, not simply adding. In fact, many churches are declining in membership. Their discipleship and mission capacity are dwindle. Many churches do not struggle with the problems. By its own nature, the church is supposed to grow. The church without growth may be like a person with diseases or with something overwhelmed circumstances. The church Jesus established is not merely to add its members, rather to multiply. One personal brings two to faith. Two inspire four. Four make a difference of multiple family. The sixteen believers can save a small community of 256.

Good Shepherd gathers 100-125 each Sunday. If we committed little more to the observance of Sunday worship, we will easily

If this gathering of 300 would be like Gideon's 300 warriors, our parish—the greater Silver Spring area will get closer to the realization of God's kingdom.

Toward the Year of Multiplication, I would like to challenge each one of worshipers that include members and regular attendees.

First, give a complete Sunday morning to the glory of God through your own act of worship, discipleship, fellowship, and service. This observance may include your own preparation for the day, your study of the scripture, your own service on the day of the Lord in the area or worship, study or mission. You may spend some time to help your friends to come to church. You may teach in Sunday school. You may sing in choir. You may welcome worshipers at the door. You may visit the hospitalized on your way home. Committing only a singly hour won't help you to bear much fruits. It will make you to maintain your own faith. Give time to the Lord and to His people!

Secondly, give your treasures. Honor God with first fruits, not after thoughts. Good Shepherd truly appreciate your monetary giving. Giving the first fruits will deepen your faith. You will appreciate your being as faithful

children of God. Can each one of us bring two other disciplers to faith?

First, give a complete Sunday morning to the glory of God through your own act of worship, discipleship, fellowship, and service.

Next "Lunch with the Pastor" February 23, 2020

Last November 24, during Leadership Team meeting, we joyously approved \$350,620 as the missional budget for 2020. We will make disciples of Jesus Christ through the ministerial programs and mission (\$28,1000) The vibrant ministry will be led by Pastor and Staff (\$57,872 for Clergy Support; \$76,163 for 3 other part -time staff). Our mission share of \$38,485 will be given to United Methodist Connectional Ministries. For the sacred space (Building Maintenance and Utilities and insurances) we will need \$150,000 including \$30,000 mortgage.

Last year we have 12 new professing members joined. 8 youth will complete their confirmation class and join as the professing members at Easter. During Thanks in Giving Sunday, Nathan Block, one of "cheerful giver" share his testimony on giving of time, talents and treasures. Goodwill Okoji, spoke about joy of giving. Giving as an act of worship. During Advent, Carol Penne on behalf of Mission Team, share what God is doing through our giving for needy families. We hope God provides all we need more than enough for His own ministry. [LN]

Social Principles—2020

The 2020 General Conference (GC) will review and consider the proposed revised Social Principles of the UMC. The church has always been dedicated to social justice since our founder, John Wesley's time. He recognized that the gospel of Jesus was both personal and social. In 1908, the original Principles, in the form of a Social Creed, was declared at a time when society was experiencing "rural displacement, mass migration, and industrial urbanization" (Social Principles 2013-2016 p.6)

At the time alcoholism was a big issue as were labor laws that did not protect minor children. Cited was a story of a 14-year old Irish girl who worked a 56-hour week in a woolen mill in Lawrence. MA for \$3.50 less \$0.10 for drinking water from a polluted canal. She witnessed older workers being injured by the dangerous mill machinery because they were forced to work too fast. (In our time, workers at chicken processing plants have faced similar problems.) The church, sensitive to the Social Gospel, advocated for a living wage, a stop to sweatshop labor and recognition of human rights across class divisions as a response to unsafe and cruel working conditions, the challenges of assimilating the hordes of European immigrants and loss of communal values in fast-growing cities. The specifics of that initial document and all subsequent ones are in the history included in the 2013-2016 version published by Cokesbury (1-800-672-1798 or www.cokesbury.com)

The 1908 Social Creed was accepted unanimously at GC in Baltimore, and was presented to Pres, Theodore Roosevelt and within two years the Federal Council of Churches – now the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA—would adopt the Methodist Episcopal Social Creed as its own. At the 1972 GC the first edition of the modern Creed and Social Principles was approved. Each GC since have reviewed and/or revised the SC's.







We've been facing new reality with the rapidly increasing number of the Latino neighbors.


We have had the Hispanic and Latino ministry over the last server years without frui-

Pastor Manuel of Agape Seventh Adventist says that now is the time to reach out. The congregation had another revival service during Advent. A few weeks after his trip to El





Salvador for nationwide revival service during Thanksgiving season. Two Pentecostal churches seem to be in competition in their own evangelism works.

Many Christians find rationale for the primary tasks of the church from The Great Commission, (Matthew 28:19-20). "Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I [Jesus of Nazareth] have commanded you [the church]."

The mission of the United Methodist Church hangs on the Commission, "making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world." Our mission is not so different from it, as we declare it each Sunday prior to departure.

The targeted group for an act of evangelism seem obscure if we are not attentive closely to the

Commission. The Commission includes several primary actions to be taken for "making disciples." The church—you and I—shall go, and make disciples. Baptism and teaching or discipleship upon the gospel of Jesus are crucial.

Baptism is not merely a registration or admission process of a believer to the church. It is to demonstrate free grace of God through the redeeming death of Jesus Christ. There shall be no restrictions to reach out in order to save souls.

Making disciples of all nations implies even the very nature of the church goes beyond political and social boundaries. The church should be inclusive.

Who are the ones we reach out? Jesus' public ministry reveals good clues. But here is most powerful clue:

"Jesus said, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick." (Matthew 9:12) Well, every one may need such welfare from God Source of all.

The preferential option of God is for the needy. "Those who do not welcome" the evangelists and their act of evangelism, mentioned in Matthew 10:14, might have their own salvation.

Living in the greater Washington areas for more than two decades, I am acquiring clearer sense for the preferential option for the needy.

I do love all. I am intentional about offering of the gospel to "all the nations." Often I find myself who never meet the needs of certain individuals. I have to "shake the dust off my feet" when I with the gospel of Jesus am not welcome. The moment is very difficult to discern. Most case it turns to a prayerful decision, not to evangelize.

As the pastor here at Good Shepherd United Methodist Church, I've learned about many people who need the Lord. These people live in the community where our church is located. Namely they are among us! They are under the same climate I am affected. They are (my) our contemporaries. What we have seen, what we have heard, and what we have felt shall be what they have seen, heard and felt. So, I am so persuaded by a call to

reach out to the needy. preferentially.

I love the members of the Church as Christ love them "to the end."

Some may claim that they deserve "a better seat" in God's Kingdom. But, I hear what Jesus clearly mentioned in the parable of vineyard (Matthew 20:1-16).

The Kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning ["Go"] to hire men to work in his vineyard ["Make disciples"]. He agrees to pay them a denarius for the day and sent them into his vineyard. Little later, the landowner goes out to others standing in the market place doing nothing. He goes back to see others even at the eleventh hour, especially for those whom no one hired. At the end of the day, all the workers are paid a denarius - daily pay. With the same amount, the early hired complain. But the faithful followers of Jesus figure out what's the wage. Salvation is what each obtains.

This teaching isn't motivating later coming to faith. Earlier you are hired, more blessed in the earthly Kingdom of God. earthly Kingdom.

Good Shepherd UMC is richly blessed by the **gift of diversity.** Some say the homogeneous church brings forth effective ministries. It creates Sunday morning as segregated hours of the week, once Martin Luther King, Jr. spoke.

"It is appalling that the most segregated hour of Christian America is 11 o'clock on Sunday morning."
