## Service Commission Report, Susan Porter, St. John the Baptist Parishioner

A couple of years ago on one of our road trips to Texas, my husband and I stopped to see some old friends in Holdrege, Nebraska. We attended Mass at the local parish, All Saints, on what happened to be Council Sunday. To mark the occasion, there was a bulletin insert entitled "We are the Women in the Pews" that outlined the various levels of Council and contained the following article written by Kathy Rowell, an All Saints parishioner. At the time, she was also President of the Lincoln Diocese of Council of Catholic Women (LDCCW). I know the article's title will get your attention because the phrase "magic underwear" has another connotation here in Utah. Fortunately, this is not an article poking fun at our LDS neighbors' sacramental garments but a sentimental reminder of how our small acts of service and kindness impact others.



# The Magic Underwear Drawer and the Fuel Fairy

Are you curious? Do you wonder what these phrases have to do with you and me or each other? It may seem strange, but the Magic Underwear Drawer and the Fuel Fairy have a lot in common. Actually, one is dependent upon the other. And they have a lesson for us. Jesus spoke about these concepts but used different words. Let me explain. See if you can think of a similar message in the Bible.

Every time I do laundry, I think of the story of the man who was bragging to his friends about a strange phenomenon that he experiences weekly. He told his buddies that he never worries when his supply of clean underwear is running low. Somehow, the supply is magically replenished and the next time he goes to his underwear drawer, it is full again. He claims to have a Magic Underwear Drawer.

I think we all have at least one magic underwear drawer, but it is such a part of our lives that we do not give it much thought. It might be the gas tank that is always full when we need to go somewhere, the bills that are paid or the fresh full coffeepot when we walk in to work. It could be the decorations at church, the Priest who is always there to say Mass or the clean clothes in the closet. It can be the lights that come on at the flip of a switch or the cleaned streets after a snow. We (I) take a lot for granted. These unseen deeds make our lives more pleasant and less worrisome. But they are not done by magic. Someone is taking care of the little things. Enter the Fuel Fairy.

My husband delivered fuel to farmers' irrigation wells which brought water to the crops during the growing season. As the saying goes, "Failure is not an option". One customer was so grateful he did not have to worry about it that he started telling people he had a "Fuel Fairy" who kept his irrigation going. Your "Fuel Fairy" might plow the snow from your driveway, bring fresh flowers to put on the altar, make the coffee or go out in a storm to fix power lines.

In Matthew 6: 1-4 we hear about doing things quietly and not drawing attention. We are all someone's "Fuel Fairy". We might think of it as doing our job or taking care of something that needs to be done. But it lightens someone else's load. We do not do it for recognition, we do it so the magic underwear drawer is always full. As you go about your day, see if you can spot the "Fuel Fairies" in your life. ~Kathy Rowell
