When Can we Worship God Together?

Safety is the reason we are staying apart. No one wants to share a virus that we may not even know we are passing on. We may try meeting outdoors or in the sanctuary with special precautions in the coming weeks. Be aware that there will be guidelines: masks should be worn, distance must be kept, and fans cannot be run. This rule will be difficult in the summer heat. Printed bulletins will be used in place of hymnals and solos in place of hymn sings with a shorter worship time. Individual communion cups with a seal over the cup and wafer have been ordered. 
I especially thank Kent Anders, Linda Gall and Vicar Michelle Knight for all their help in pulling me from the pit of despair.

The church is alive in you! The church goes on always! God makes house calls to everyone all the time! Until we can gather.....God bless you and keep you well, Pastor Terrie




Congratulations Polo High School Graduates!

Council Highlights from the May Church Council Meeting

Treasurer's Report: A copy of the April financials were provided. Renee provided an overview of the Payroll Protection Grant in which she applied for on behalf of the church through the First State Shannon-Polo Bank. The grant is for \$12,317 to be used for payroll, healthcare, and benefit costs. We did receive the money and it will show up in the May balance sheet as a loan. As long as we continue to pay our employees, this loan will be forgiven through the Small Business Association after paperwork is filed.

Pastor's Report: Pastor continues to email home worship information Saturday night. In addition, Pastor has attempted an online service via Facebook. The first Facebook live had 311 views with 47 worshipping at one time for communion. Many people have commented with great appreciation and positivity. The second worship failed due to home computer issues. Kent has helped to develop a way to post worship on Facebook. Pastor continues to await for scientific and medical advice, as well as the governor's plan before gathering in person. Feedback from the synod continues with regular updates. When gathering is allowed in the future, pastor is planning to have two services, individual communion packs, and no passing of peace or social time for a while. In person worship will roll out slowly while observing physical distancing. Pastor has been making a lot of phone calls and writing notes to shut-ins. The synod has provided many opportunities for learning and check-in opportunities via Zoom.

Worship & Hospitality: The Hospitality and Mission teams have made intermittent phone calls with congregation members to connect with the church family. They have collected new phone numbers and address information. We continue emailing newsletters and mailing count is up.

Education: Pastor plans to set up Zoom confirmation classes when school is out for the summer. Sunday school plans are on hold at this time.

Local and Global Mission: Collected food was taken to the Lifeline Food Pantry. \$350 was sent from Neighbors in Need fund to the Polo Lifeline Food Pantry. Pastor is requesting any ideas on meeting any community help that is needed.

Fellowship: The ice cream social has been cancelled at this time. The shelter has been cancelled as well. **Property**: Pastor requested volunteers for each month to check on the property, toilets, moving the chair lift, and watering plants. Sara volunteered for June, Lisa for July, and Amanda for August.

Memorial Report: Our new sign has been installed and looks great! Special thanks to Merla and the Memorial Team for providing the mulch and bricks for the sign. The bronze cornerstone is ordered and expected to be installed in June. The estate of Terry Pontnak gifted the church \$2,900.

150th Celebration: The celebration is on hold at this time. Ordered shirts, hats, and totes are at the church. Please pick up at church and pay.

POLO COMMUNITY COUNCIL OF CHURCHES MINUTES FOR MAY 26, 2020--ZOOM MEETING

Treasurer Report/Tom Cline: General Fund balance is \$4610.77 which includes \$1052 of community garden grant money. Pine Creek Christian Church paid \$300 for dues/donations for 2020 since our last meeting. Patricia Stauffer was paid \$250 for Bible School and New Village Inn was paid \$54.79 for an overnight guest of the city.

The hungry neighbor fund checking acct. has a balance of \$1092.56 after \$200 was paid in February and March to Dollar General and the Food Pantry.

Second Hand Rose: Present Balance is \$659.00. Due to the Covid 19 Pandemic, having no income has put the store in jeopardy. It was approved by all present, to start the process of applying for a City of Polo grant/loan to help with bills and utilities. David Poole will work with Sharon Miller and finalize paperwork for the application.

Summer Bible School: Patricia Stauffer, COB, has a plan in place for VBS for late June or July if possible. Her plan using a Parable from the "Book of Matthew" is a puppet program with a hand built stage. Three days a week for 1 hour and 30 minutes, with separation of age groups of children, is in the works. This worthwhile mission will be provided for children depending on which Phase our community and State are in during the summer.

Community Garden: Jonathan Stauffer reports 70% of the garden is planted. Volunteers are needed to weed, water and harvest the garden. Contact Jonathan at 815-973-0247 to sign-up for a week or longer. COB hopes to utilize the VBS children and use it as a lesson from Matthew 13; Mark 4 and Luke 8, "The Parable of the Sower". The produce is an important tool used in keeping families healthy, both physically and spiritually. **Kidz Cafe**: Marla reported that an alternative program for feeding children and their families will occur this summer. Starting in June, on Wednesday's and Friday's, Grab and Go food is available at Faith United Methodist Church. The outside shelter will be used and children and families may drive or walk by and Grab food to go.

Monetary donations are needed and welcome this year. Most of the pre-packaged food is being purchased and is more costly than preparing/cooking meals.

Due to the Covid 19 Pandemic, PCCC will monitor and decide when Community meals, Vesper services, etc. will reopen. Let's pray for the world during these difficult times.

Next meeting: July 28 Currently, Open Bible is slated to host.

William Barclay (1907-1978) Scottish author, radio and television presenter, Church of Scotland minister, and Professor of Divinity at the University of Glasgow.

Men dream of world government in the political sense of the term. The only place in which world government comes anywhere near to realization is the Church. It is not the possession of a nation or a country or a colour; the Church is as wide as the World, and even the tiniest congregation in the smallest village or hamlet in the most remote place is part of something which has gone out to the ends of the earth.

Secondly, we must think of the history of the Church. It is the simple truth that the Church existed before most of the nations which exist today.

When we sit at the Communion Table it is well to remember that we are sharing in the only ceremony in the world which has been observed somewhere every single day for something like the last nineteen hundred and thirty years. There is no continuity in the world like that. Nowhere are se so much in touch with history as we are in the Church.

And we do well to remember that in the Church we are more than in touch with the whole wide world; we are more than in touch with almost twenty centuries of history; we are in touch with eternity. In it we are always compassed about with the great cloud of witnesses. In it we are surrounded not simply by the greatness of time, but also by the infinity of eternity.

It may be that our whole conception of the Church is far too small and far too local, and far too parochial. John Oxenham wrote of the world-wide Church (ELW Hymn #650):

In Christ there is no East or West, In Him no South or North, But one great Fellowship of love Throughout the whole wide earth.

In Him shall true hearts everywhere Their high communion find. His service is the golden cord Close-binding all mankind.

Join hands then, Brothers of the Faith, Whate'er your race may be-Who serves my Father as a son Is surely kin to me.
