

Month of May — Guest Speaker from Texas: John Kottlowski



John Kottlowski is a former U.S. Army Captain and veteran of the war in Afghanistan. In 2010 he began his eight year Army career by commissioning as a Second Lieutenant in the Armor branch. At Fort Knox, KY, John completed one year of maneuver warfare training, including the Armor Basic Officer Leadership Course and the Army Reconnaissance Course. In 2011 John graduated from Ranger School at Fort Benning, GA and was subsequently assigned to 8th Squadron, 1st Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division at Fort Lewis, WA.

John was selected to lead a 24-man platoon in Afghanistan from March 2012 to January 2013. During this time, he led over 120 dismounted and mounted combat patrols, trained Afghan National Security Forces, and conducted counter-insurgency operations in partnership with village leaders. Anticipating

a career in Military Intelligence, John assumed new responsibilities as an Operations Officer in a Human Intelligence Company from March 2013 to March 2014. As a junior Captain, John attended the Military Intelligence Captains Career Course at Fort Huachuca, AZ, where he developed skills in data analytics, predictive analysis, and counter insurgency and conventional warfare planning.

As an Intelligence Officer in the 3D Infantry Regiment, **The Old Guard**, John coordinated security measures between intelligence and law enforcement professionals, managed personnel security for over 600 soldiers, and planned intelligence training scenarios for his Battalion for two years. In 2017 John commanded Headquarters Company, 4th Infantry Battalion, 3D Infantry Regiment, which includes the **Tomb of the Unknown Soldier** platoon at Arlington National Cemetery. Here he oversaw the daily operations of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier mission. As his final assignment as a senior Captain, John served as a military assistant to the Secretary of Defense, James Mattis.

John is a 2010 graduate of the United States Military Academy, West Point, where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Management, with a minor in Systems Engineering. During his time at West Point, John was a member of the Army Sailing Team. Following his time in the Army, John earned an MBA at Rice University in Houston, his hometown. He is currently an investment advisor at Goldman Sachs in Dallas, where he lives with his wife Laura, sons George and Peter, and daughter Elizabeth.

WW II TRIVIA FOR MAY 2021

- In 1939 the Nobel Prize Committee in Stockholm decided not to award a peace prize for that year.
- In Nazi Germany women were awarded medals for the number of children they had; a bronze medal for 4 children, silver for 6, gold for 8.
- On March 6, 1942 the US government prohibited the sale of new, used or

rebuilt typewriters to the general public. They could only be sold to the government. It took a lot of paper work to run a war.

- August 15, 2015 was the 70th anniversary of the end of WW II. On that date dozens of young men dressed as sailors and young women dresses as nurses gathered in Times Square New York and reenacted the famous victory kiss photographed in 1945 by the photographer Alfred Eisenstaedt.
- The B-29 bombers designed to carry the atomic bombs had to be modified because of the size and weight of the atomic bombs. To reduce weight, all gun turrets and armor plating were removed. When the planes delivered the bombs over Japan they were virtually defenseless against enemy air attacks.
- On December 8, 1941, the day after the Pearl Harbor attack, the US Army contacted the Walt Disney Studio in Hollywood with a request to use some of their animated characters in propaganda films and printed material related to the war. The Disney Studio agreed and with this Mickey Mouse and Donald Duck joined the Army.
- When President Roosevelt learned of the production of the movie 'Mrs. Miniver,' the story of a British family during the Blitz of London, he sent a request to the movie studio to release the film as soon as possible. The studio complied and released the film as soon as they could.
- Immediately after the dropping of the second atomic bomb on Nagasaki, the USAAF dropped leaflets over many places in Japan telling the people that there would be more such attacks unless the Japanese government surrendered. When the Japanese government finally agreed to surrender more leaflets were dropped telling the Japanese people of the terms of the surrender and instructed them to accept the terms peacefully.


