## RESTORING ONE ANOTHER

Many questions arise as we contemplate our Christian responsibility to exhort, admonish, confront, warn, instruct, and restore one another.

Matt.5:23-24 1 Cor. 5-6
Matt.7:1-5; 16-20 Gal.6:1-5
Matt. 18:15-22 2 Thes.3:6.14

We don't want to "judge" unrighteously, but we must judge with "righteous judgment" as Jesus said (John 7:24).

Therefore what is the difference between judging and "discerning"? (See Gothard's study) Who, what, when, where, how, and why are we to "get involved"? These answers are outlined in 4 words:

MOMENT

MOTIVE

MANNER

**METHOD** 

- 1. THE MOMENT When do you "restore"? When do you get involved? According to 1 Cor. 5-6, it was time when someone is clearly and scripturally in sin. Also when the situation is:
  - publically known
  - potentially destructive
  - affecting other people
  - damaging their reputation/testimony
  - damaging the churches reputation/testimony
  - brings a reproach to Christ and His people
  - continual and constant
    - unrepented of and not being dealt with scripturally
- 2. THE MOTIVE Why are you going to the person?
  - NOT TO throw people out, embarrass them or hurt them
  - NOT TO be self righteous, nit pick, or play God
  - NOT TO gossip, or slander, violate privacy ("CIA" "FBI") or run their life
  - NOT TO be prideful, or have a "better than you holier than thou" attitude
  - NOT TO be legalistic in exercising authority in some unbiblical issue
  - NOT TO be legalistic in exercising authority in some unbiblical manner
  - NOT TO expose others and remain indifferent to or avoid you own sin
  - BUT TO be obedient to Scripture (Lev.19:17; Matt.18:15; Gal.6:1; James 5:19-20; Phil.4:2-3)
    - TO make peace and strive for unity (See "Peacemaker" study) (Eph.4:3; Rom.14:19; 12:18; 1 Thes.5:13)
    - TO bring people back into a pure, harmonious relationship with the church family (as well as fellowhip with the Lord)

3. THE MANNER - How do you go to them?
