Sunday Reflection: The Baptism of the Lord

Why did Jesus, the Sinless One, submit himself to John's baptism? In this humble submission we see a foreshadowing of the "baptism" of his bloody death upon the cross. Jesus' baptism is the acceptance and the beginning of his mission as God's suffering Servant. He allowed himself to be numbered among sinners. Jesus submitted himself entirely to his Father's will. Out of love he consented to

this baptism of death for the remission of our sins. The Father proclaimed his entire delight in his Son and spoke audibly for all to hear. The Holy Spirit, too, was present as he anointed Jesus for his ministry which began that day as he rose from the waters of the Jordan River. Jesus will be the source of the Spirit for all who come to believe in him. At his baptism the heavens were opened and the waters were sanctified by the descent of the Holy Spirit, signifying the beginning of a new creation.

How can we enter into the mystery of Jesus' humble self-abasement and baptism? Gregory of Nazianzus (329-389 AD), an early church father, tells us: "Let us be buried with Christ by Baptism to rise with him; let us go down with him to be raised with him; and let us rise with him to be glorified with him." Do we want to see our life transformed in the likeness of Christ? And do we want to become a more effective instrument of the Gospel? Examine Jesus' humility and ask the Holy Spirit to forge this same attitude in our heart. Jesus is ever ready to renew and refashion us in his likeness through the gift and working of the Holy Spirit. Ask the Lord Jesus to fill us with his Holy Spirit that we may radiate the joy of the Gospel to those around us.



Saint of the Week: St. Hilary of Poitiers

A staunch defender of the divinity of Christ, St. Hilary was a gentle and courteous man, devoted to writing some of the greatest theology on the trinity. In a very troubled period in the church, his holiness was lived out in both scholarship and controversy.

Born about 310 in Poitiers, France, Hilary was raised a pagan. He converted to Christianity through his broad and deep education which introduced him to the Holy Scripture. He was named Bishop of Poitiers about 350, and soon took up battling what became the scourge of the fourth century - Arianism - which denied the divinity of Christ.



Feast Day: January 13

St. Hilary spent the better part of his adult life studying, writing, speaking, and arguing to ensure that the Nicene Creed was understood and adhered to throughout the Church. He was even sent into exile by the Emperor for not conforming his views to Arian teachings. But he used his time in exile to read and write extensively, eventually becoming such a thorn in the side of the Emperor that he restored St. Hilary to his diocese.

St. Hilary died about 367, and was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church in 1851.

Both weekday and weekend dates are still available throughout this year. Call or email the Parish Office to schedule a Mass.


