25th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 20:1-16



“Jesus told his disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out at dawn to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with them for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. Going out about nine o'clock, the landowner saw others standing idle in the marketplace, and he said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard, and I will give you what is just. So, they went off. And he went out again around noon, and around three o'clock, and did likewise. Going out about five o'clock, the landowner found others standing around, and said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' They answered, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard.' When it was evening the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Summon the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and ending with the first.' When those who had started about five o'clock came, each received the usual daily wage. So, when the first came, they thought that they would receive more, but each of them also got the usual wage. And on receiving it they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last ones worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us, who bore the day's burden and the heat.' He said to one of them in reply, 'My friend, I am not cheating you. Did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what is yours and go. What if I wish to give this last one the same as you? Or am I not free to do as I wish with my own money? Are you envious because I am generous?' Thus, the last will be first, and the first be last."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

24th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A

Matthew 20:1-16

Talking about going to work! Today's parable takes some work to figure out! Somebody recently gave me a book of Bible crossword puzzles, and it has about fifteen puzzles in it. The top corner of the book's pages identifies the difficulty level as 'Easy', 'Medium' and 'Hard'. That is a welcome tip to be aware of before beginning a puzzle! Our tip for today's gospel reading is that we are facing what is one of the most difficult of Jesus' parables to understand as we examine this parable of the 'Vineyard workers and their pay' (Mt 20:1-16). Jesus teaches so often in parables, and the while the lesson of some parables is clearer to understand, others are much more difficult (just like some bible verses are quicker to understand than others). I like what St Augustine taught about interpreting the scriptures, both the hard parts and the easier parts of the bible. He wrote that, "*Magnificent and salutary is the way the Holy Spirit has so adjusted the holy scriptures that they ward off starvation with its clearer passages, while driving away boredom with the obscurer ones*" (De Doctrina Christiana 2.6.8). He is saying that the harder passages stimulate us to grow by keeping us alert and active about seeking out the meaning, while the easier ones keep us fed and maintained as we live our faith. We stay in the game with the easier verses, while we advance to higher levels by struggling with the more difficult ones! So again, today, the parable we confront is high on the 'challenge level' (*up there with the 'Dishonest Manager in Luke 16:1-13' or the "Unprepared Wedding Guest" in Matthew 22:1-14*). We might name today's parable the '*Disgruntled Workers*'. On the face of it, the disparity displayed by such unequal pay calls for protest. Even when the owner reminds the workers of their agreement, the workers may still have wanted to call in a 'union organizer' such as Caesar Chavez or Saul Alinsky! So, what is Jesus trying to say in this parable?

Well, if we only consider the monetary compensation as amounting to 'A day's labor = a day's wage', then the payday seems unjust to those who came on duty in the morning (two hours work is being paid the same as twelve hours work). But if we step back and take out the exact cash component value (dollars and cents), and consider the day's wage in the parable to be symbolic of something priceless like Salvation or Eternal Life (not a day's wage but a lifetime's reward), we see that Jesus is teaching us to labor joyfully in life for salvation (our own and others') and be glad, welcoming others workers along the way regardless of the time they enter the vineyard. Jesus is talking about eternity and the end of time. Jesus is saying that we might be tempted to argue and feel aggrieved if we have experienced salvation early in life and we have 'toed the line' all of our lives as good Christians (well, we should be!), but others have waited until the last hour to repent & turn to Christ, sliding in at the last hour. Jesus doesn't want us feeling envy about someone living a hedonistic life of sin (like Prodigal Son), and then turning to God at the last minute, as if they are 'outsmarting' us or God (*For the truth of the matter is, that Sin is no pleasure really anyway for them, and the 'saved' don't truly miss 'sin' and take the deepest joy from working for God!*). The Pharisees reflect this 'disgruntled' attitude perfectly, as they complain about & resent Jesus when He converts tax collectors, prostitutes and thieves to lives of faith. The Pharisees always self-righteously announce how they have been so faithful to Jewish Law all along from the beginning, and so they miserly wish to limit God's grace by discouraging any late-comers (such as Gentiles, tax collectors, etc). They angrily resent it when latecomers arrive to the Kingdom. It is to them and their self-righteous attitude, I believe, that Jesus addresses the line in Matthew 21:31 "tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you." Or again in Matthew 23:13 when He tells them, "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, you hypocrites. You lock the kingdom of heaven before human beings. **You do not enter yourselves, nor do you allow entrance to those trying to enter.**" So we want to be joyful and glad about extra workers entering the vineyard, and not count the cost or pay – We are serving God to begin with, so what is 'pay' anyway. Like people say about serving in ministry: "The Benefits are Out of this World" (Out, as in 'After' this life!)

So, the owner of the vineyard (God) puts everybody in their place, by saying it is His vineyard and His resources to begin with – He can use/spend his money any way he likes. This is why he mentions his generosity, and suggests that the aggrieved workers are simply envious of others (greedy). If we are working for God, than that is it – It is all up to Him! But also on another level close to us, I think it helps to try understanding what might lead an owner to be so eager about continuing to hire more and more workers all throughout the day. I question if may be more is going on here, like the owner is operating under a tight deadline, and that if he doesn't get the harvest completed on that very day, he may lose the sale of that harvest or future business contracts. In that case, he could have placated the upset workers by saying, "I brought those extras on to lighten your load and get the job done, so that we all could get paid, because otherwise, we weren't going to make deadline and by losing the sale, we all get nothing! The owner may have seen the deadline coming and the work progress was not close at all to meeting it, so like the TV commercial says, "I need (the computer APP) INDEED". (Or here's another thought, "If the first workers were really pulling their weight, then extra workers would not have ben needed!") But also, we might ask what delayed those other workers from being at the marketplace 'pick-up spot' for hire earlier? Maybe they had some disability that prevented them from being at the 'unemployment office' earlier (maybe they had crippled legs or were caregivers to others-taking care of that family business first, then going to public work). But, regardless of such other factors/questions to consider, the owner defends his own actions regarding pay, by saying that he fulfilled the 'agreed upon' day's pay as he had told the workers in the morning. (He did pay them what they signed on for, so maybe the workers were the ones who left money on the table, eagerly jumping into the work?) The owner reminded the workers by his surprise response to their 'upset' reaction, that they signed on freely to work for him. I wonder if the owner doesn't feel a little hurt that the opportunities and benefits that he has offered to all of the workers is not being appreciated. Maybe he had thought the loyal workers enjoyed working on his farm? Maybe our complaints to God about our place in life, our circumstances, our work conditions or pay, may sound that way to Him, too?
