CHRIST, MAKING ALL THINGS NEW



"Then they travelled through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. After proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia. From there they sailed to Antioch, where they had been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now accomplished and reported what God had done with them and how he had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles" (Acts 14:21-27).

Last Sunday I mentioned that one of the ways we listen to the Scripture should be with our MIND. We explored how to do this - basically imagining the scene and even inserting ourselves into it and being part of it. Well, as I read and listened to the first reading above, I imagined the scene. I imagined an entire region in spiritual darkness, symbolized by actual darkness and the light of Christ, symbolized by the sun, spreading gradually and lighting up everywhere, one mile after another, one city at a time. I imagined excited men, women, and children rejoicing as they gather to celebrate their newfound faith and transformation. I imagined how Paul and Barnabas returned to share the good news with the rest of the community.

Echoing this good news, John responds in the second reading, "Then I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth" (Revelation 21:1-5). One of the scenes that stuck in my mind from The Passion of the Christ was the scene where Mary met Jesus on the way to Calvary. He had just fallen, again, His face bloodied, the thorns visibly piercing His flesh, His eyes barely open, His whole body disfigured and traumatized. And Mary's face showed the agony and the trauma she was going through too. In the middle of all the agony, Jesus tells His mom, "See, Mother, I'm making all things new."

I wonder what Mary thought of what her Son said. Did she wonder and say to herself "How?" Obviously, in that moment and the days and months to follow, Mary and the disciples must have been wondering how Jesus was making all things new.

Now, fast-forward to today's first reading. Imagine what was going on in Mary's mind as she listened to the two apostles. Imagine her joy at what her Son's disciples were accomplishing through the Holy Spirit. Imagine the smile on her face, and pride too. Now, there's no more doubt that her Son was indeed making all things new.

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and tomorrow. His salvific work continues; He continues to make all things new. Since He said those words to His Mother, He never for once stopped making all things new. And like Mary on the way to Calvary, we may sometimes have a hard time seeing HOW our Savior is making all things new in our lives, in our families, in our Church, in our communities, in our city, in our country, and in the world. But we must believe that Jesus never stops creating and renewing and saving.

This Sunday, 24 of our little ones will make their First Holy Communion. I saw the joy and excitement on their faces as they rehearsed on Wednesday. Indeed, He's making all things new. At the Easter Vigil, two of our parish family members received the three sacraments of initiation, through which Christ renewed them and their families and our parish family. Next Sunday, 14 of



our young brothers and sister will receive the Holy Spirit in the Sacrament of Confirmation. They will be renewed too, and so will their families and our faith family.

How I wish that Christ would renew things faster. How I wish that the no tears, no mourning, no pain and no death world that John speaks of will be here sooner. But God does thing differently. And patient, we must learn to be. In the meantime, you and I must continue to do our part in making all things new, just like Paul and Barnabas. While doing so, we must rejoice, celebrate and be encouraged by the successes and never be discouraged or give up in the face of failures, no matter how they come at us. In all, know that the Master is at work and that if we stay with Him, the end will only be one thing - VICTORIOUS!
