#### PAUL BUNYAN RENDEZVOUS 2021

It sure felt good seeing old friends again at the Paul Bunyan Plainsmen Rendezvous this Memorial Day weekend. The weather was glorious and the good times abundant. The Plainsmen were honored to host this much needed and much anticipated event. It sure was Shining Times!

The crowd was a little smaller this year, at just under a hundred registered guests of which 58 were shooters. The format remained the same, with trail guides leading groups out to the rifle, pistol, and knife and hawk trails for the main aggregate event. Mark Curtis came all the way down from his new home in Sequim to Booshway the event.

Will "Bugler" Ulry had his candy cannon going everyday at noon for the kids, and Jack Knight led the kids in crafts and games. Jim Haeckel had a new twist on the self-guided archery trail with the addition of some 3-D animal targets. Tim Klima knocked it out of the park again this year with his now world-famous stew pot, and Rich Pogue almost completely re-vamped the knife and hawk trail. Mark Curtis held the trade gun shoot on Monday morning.

The only rainy day occurred on Thursday, when most of the traders set up their shops. The rain would start and stop, and the wind made setting up tents a challenge. But a little rain won't stop a hearty Pacific Northwesterner, and Trader's Row came together. There were plenty of blanket traders as well. We can't thank the traders enough for what they bring to the event, the true spirit of the rendezvous.

We lost Dan Smith this past year, a long-time Plainsmen and the man responsible for our Pee Wee Shoot. Dan's family committed to continuing his legacy and hosted what we now call the Dan Smith Memorial Pee Wee Shoot. This year's winner took home a muzzleloading rifle that had been worked on by Dave Rase and Doug Kitchens. It was donated by Mark Curtis, and was his very first muzzleloader.

The novelty shoots this year consisted of the team Stake/Steak shoot and a Split the Ball shoot, both led by Bill Sick. Apparently bad welds get worse with age and the axe heads proved no match for the shooters, which broke the axe heads instead of the clay pigeons they should have. Special thanks to Greg Romanczak who re-welded both axe head targets and the competition continued the next day after everyone's favorite, the Chicken Shoot.

A relatively new event this rendezvous was the "Fur Trade Follies", a self-guided scavenger hunt dreamt up by Mike Moran. The participant takes a card with 13 tasks on it, such as start a fire with flint and steel, have a meal or drink in someone's camp, or set a beaver trap. Once 10 of the tasks have been completed, the card is turned in for a chance to

win a prize. This year, Steve "Stitch" Hohnstein took home an American Flag display made by a local veteran.

Sunday night everyone gathered for the Council Fire and Apple Pie contest, with the leftovers available for sampling. A little apple pie goes a long way to lubricating the lips, and soon there was laughter, singing, and some music being played. It was a great wrap up to the events of the weekend.

To help raise a little money, the plainsmen raffled off some extra special prizes. This year we had a set of Steve Skillman powder horns, a painting donated by Mark Curtis, and a black powder rifle built by Tim Sliffe, a former Paul Bunyan R&S Club member. Tim built this gun back in 1976 for the U.S. Bi-centennial celebration and his sister donated it back to the club on behalf of Tim's estate. She hoped it would honor his memory in supporting youth marksmanship. It was won by one of our Juniors, Jazzy Rieves.

Booshway Mark started the awards ceremony with a recognition of the military veterans in the audience and a remembrance of the fallen service members for Memorial Day. The prize table was chock full of great plunder thanks to Karla and Jim Hillberg. Mark recognized the many dedicated volunteers who helped make the event possible, with Chip Kormas and Helen Sick in registration, the many trail guides and helpers from other clubs, and Mike Moran, Dakota Nash, Eric Burkhead and others with set up and tear down.

As the tents came down and the people cleared out, only the smoldering ashes remained. Re-kindled friendships and new memories will hold us over until next year, when we can all gather again for rendezvous.









