### THE WAY OF THE CROSS ......a pastor's epistle

Last year St. Cecilia's received the gift of a set of prints of contemporary representations of the Stations of the Cross. The original images from which these prints were reproduced were rendered in pastel by local artist John Ilg, who then made the copies for us. During Lent, we have hung the framed prints along the walls in our church beneath St. Cecilia's existing set of Stations.

The late artist Ade Bethune whose collected work is held at the St. Catherine University Library, created some illustrations featuring the Way of the Cross for the *Catholic Worker* in 1935. She later created an arrangement of texts to accompany these images in a booklet form of the Way of the Cross which was separately published. We made a worship booklet including those images, beautiful in their simplicity, next to the more abstract ones created by John Ilg. Also, next to his framed images in church, we've displayed the texts as arranged by Ade Bethune. We hope these simple texts and the song verses from a setting of the "*Stabat Mater*" at each station might be a springboard for personal meditation for any who may want to walk the stations while visiting the church during the Lenten season. We also have another collection of booklets available with a lengthier format for any who might want to either use individually or as a gathered group.

The Way of the Cross is a traditional prayer of devotion commemorating the last day of Jesus' life. These devotions find their roots in the experiences of the earliest pilgrims to Jerusalem, who would walk the "Via Dolorosa" as it had been reconstructed there. At the time of the Crusades, however, it became impossible for pilgrims to make this journey. The custom arose of replicating the pilgrim's journey in congregational and individual settings. Often images or markers were placed on the walls or set in the floors of churches to commemorate the traditional stations (or stops) on the Way of the Cross.

The stations varied in format and number from as few as 7 to 12 or more. In the 18<sup>th</sup> century, the 14 stations familiar to many of us became the standard. These represent 9 scenes found in the gospels and 5 that arose from popular tradition. The "falls" of Christ (stations 3,7,9) while not scriptural could well have occurred in light of the all-night interrogation, scourging, and loss of blood which the gospels describe. Jesus' encounter with Mary (station 4) expands on the encounter at the crucifixion as recorded in John's gospel. The woman wiping Jesus' face (station 6) derives from a veil with Christ's image (i.e., "vera icon," or "true image" hence the name Veronica) which has been kept in the Vatican since the 8th century. Without debating the veil's authenticity, the station reminds us that the true image of Christ is imprinted in every loving gesture of a disciple.

We increasingly share with other Christian denominations this devotional practice as a common heritage of reverence for the mystery of the Cross of Jesus. John Hofstede




### The Council That Changed the Church: Vatican II
