# SRCA Report by Michael Huerkamp

Things have been relatively quiet of late with SRCA. Over Memorial Day weekend, the association planted a commemorative Kousa dogwood at the home of the Bruce family in some small measure to provide comfort to them in light of the invasion of their home and slaying of their beloved dog, Toby. Understandably, the Bruce family has elected to leave Smoke Rise, but will take the dogwood with them in enduring memory of our gesture of kindness and solace.

On June 30, there was a City District 1 Parks Sip and Stroll fundraiser hosted in the gardens of Pat Soltys. The SRCA board has been con-

tinuously engaged with the plans and developments with our three parks, as well as the city's Path Initiative.

The community garden has been roaring along, but there has also been some pilfering to the dismay of our gardeners. The SRCA has expanded landscaping management to the Deer Ridge stacks and we are evaluating whether to take on even more with the seasonal plantings this autumn. Lastly, we bid farewell to board member Moira Waldron who moved to Kansas City.

# City Council Wrap Up by Matt Holmes

Tucker's Mayor and City Council met June 26 to close out their business for the month of June. The meeting was highlighted by a unanimous vote to approve the City's millage rate at 0.9 mils, revenue that will be used for maintenance and improvements in Parks and Recreation. Since its incorporation, Tucker has maintained a zero-millage rate, but this millage actually represents a tax decrease from the 1.458 mil rate imposed by DeKalb County.

The meeting began with a presentation by the PATH Foundation on recommendations for the first project stemming from Tucker's Trail Master Plan. The recommendation was for the first phase of a two-phase project through Kelley Cofer Park. The proposal, which saw no formal action by the Council, would come with a \$1.21 million price tag. The adopted Trail Master Plan calls for a citywide network of trails spanning 32 miles.

Council also heard discussion on a pair of issues impacting transportation in the City. First, was an update from consultants working with DeKalb County on the County's Transit Master Plan. The presentation focused on innovative transportation solutions, like Bus Rapid Transit, that could be funded through additional tax revenue. The second issue dealt with proposed moratoriums on electronic scooters. Council voted 6-1 to approve the moratorium, which will last for 120 days. Council and City staff will use that time to research and formulate a best practices policy. Because of the same concerns, they also passed a 120-day moratorium on electronic scooters with seats.

Council also okayed amendments to the City's zoning code and official zoning map. The changes were brought about by the Overlay Rewrite project overseen by consultants from TSW.

The lone land use case of the evening was a special land use permit (SLUP) petition to allow for a tattoo establishment at 2316 Main Street, on the back side of the building that houses Local 7. This was a first read and public hearing, meaning there was no vote. A second read and anticipated vote are set for July 22.

As part of the continuing improvements to Tucker's parks, Council voted unanimously to approve a \$19,353 expenditure for replacement of a retaining wall in a parking lot at Kelley Cofer Park. The contract for construction will be awarded to contractor F.H. Paschen. Council also voted unanimously to accept a final draft of a Historic Resource Report. The Report is the result of the City in 2018 hiring consultant New South Associates, and it will help to inform Tucker's development and land use decisions in the years ahead.

# Tucker Adopts Millage Rate for Parks

# Millage Rate Yields Property Tax Reduction

At the June 26 City Council meeting, Tucker leaders voted unanimously to approve the City's first millage rate. While some may be quick to call out a tax increase in the fiscally responsible new city, the reality is property owners are going to see their tax rate go down.

"We are taking over taxing authority for the parks from DeKalb County and we're doing it for less than DeKalb County was charging for," Mayor Frank Auman explained.

Tucker's millage rate will be 0.9 mils, with that money going to fund Parks and Recreation in the City. For 2019, DeKalb County will be taxing at a rate of 1.458 mils. That figure will now go to zero on Tucker tax bills.

"It's a big step for us in the development of the City," Auman said. "Up to now, the City's had no property tax, no ad valorem tax, no taxes of its own. That was true and that was part of the plan. This step takes us into a place where we're collecting our own taxes to, in this case, fund our park operations."

Since assuming responsibility for its parks from DeKalb County in 2018, Tucker's Parks and Recreation Department has been quick to repair and upgrade parks amenities that needed attention. This is evident in new playgrounds at Henderson, Kelley Cofer and Montreal Parks, as well as at the Tucker Recreation Center. They have also worked to make significant cosmetic and infrastructure improvements to the aging Rec Center including new HVAC units, fresh coats of paint and security cameras. Kelley Cofer pool has seen upgrades, including a new splash pad installed this year through a partnership with DeKalb County.

In the coming months, more improvements are on the way including lights on the tennis courts at Henderson Park, repairing and expanding the dock at Lake Erin, renovating the kitchen and bathrooms at the Rec Center and installing parking spaces at Smoke Rise Park.

# Hops at the History Center: Druid Hills Book Discussion

Originally built up by the wealth and influence of businessmen, Druid Hills, one of Atlanta's beloved historic neighborhoods, has quite the story to tell. Designed by famed landscape architect Frederick Law Olmstead Sr., Druid Hills was conceived as Atlanta's first suburbs. With plenty of shady trees and a park at the center of the neighborhood, Olmstead had a vision of the perfect escape from city life and his ideas can be seen in action today.

Businessmen Joel Hurt and Asa Griggs Candler are also credited with the upbringing of Druid Hills. Joel Hurt, an entrepreneur responsible for developing Inman Park, purchased the land that is now Druid Hills and sold it to the Druid Hills Corporation headed up by Asa Griggs Candler, owner of the Coca-Cola Corporation.

# **Business Boom**

Lawrenceville Highway is a major regional thoroughfare. It's also one of the business corridors that drives Tucker's economy. From the eastern end of Lawrenceville Highway at the Perimeter to the Hugh Howell intersection, the City of Tucker is witnessing several exciting redevelopment projects.

At Lakeside Center, which hosts a range of Class A office space, a new tenant is on the move. PREP Atlanta, providing dedicated commercial kitchens to expanding restaurants, food producers, and food trucks, is moving into the former Le Cordon Bleu building. Doug Marranci, the COO of PREP Atlanta, says there were a number of reasons that he was interested in expanding into Tucker.

"We found an ideal space for us with a building that was made to order," Marranci explains. "The access to I-285 and US 78 is great, plus we're bullish on Tucker. We have seen the teamwork and dedication that was put in by everyone to assist new businesses and that is just so important when choosing a site."

Heading further east on Lawrenceville Highway, in what was previously the home to El Tapatio Mexican restaurant, there will be a new take on this popular cuisine with Bell Street Burritos. Owner Matt Hinton told the Atlanta Business Chronicle, "We are moving the operation to a new location - our first shop outside the Perimeter - in Tucker. If you have been paying attention, you know that Tucker, Georgia is killing it right now and Bell Street is very happy to begin a new thing there." Hinton said the new shop located at 4053 Lawrenceville Highway will have a soft opening shortly and eventually a grand

Over at the intersection of Lawrenceville Highway and Hugh Howell Road, the former Jack's Package Store is being redeveloped into an 8,600-square-foot multi-level space. The owners of the property, which sat vacant for seven years, are set to welcome Peachtree Immediate Care as the first tenant in the newly constructed retail building. "Peachtree Immediate Care was attracted to the property due to the great demographics for patients seeking quality medical care in the surrounding Tucker community," says broker Brian Chambers. "This new project will be just one of many upgrades to Tucker Plaza as the owners look to complete additional upgrades and refreshes of the existing shopping center which currently includes Staples, Dollar General, and Camp Woof among many others." Tim Knight, a commercial real estate developer who built the adjacent Tucker Village Shopping Center – which includes Chipotle, Wingstop and AT&T – is also sold on Tucker. "Tucker is undergoing a renaissance," Knight says. "This location was an A-plus site to develop, lease and, ultimately, sell."

All of these developments entail significant capital investment and they speak to the fact that property owners, as well as large and small business owners, know that Tucker is a great location that supports its business community.

# NATIONAL NIGHT OUT – August 6, 2019

National Night Out is a community-police awareness-raising event in the United States, held the first Tuesday of August. The event has been held annually since 1984, and is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch in the United States and Canada. 

# Accomplished Smoke Rise Neighbor

It never ceases to amaze me how many interesting people with remarkable accomplishments live right here in our community. Some are so humble, you may not know of them, but listen carefully, and you may find that within their profession, they are at the top of their field.

One of my neighbors recently mentioned to me that her next-door neighbor, Frans de Waal, had written the book she was reading about - his work



I was impressed to learn that Frans was named one of Time magazine's 100 Most Influential People. The author of Are We Smart Enough to Know How Smart Animals Are? among many other works, he is the C. H. Candler Professor in Emory University's Psychology Department and director of the Living Links Center at the Yerkes National Primate Research Center.

I bought and read several of his books. One that caught my eye because of the title: The Bonobo and the Atheist. I know the use of the word Atheist can raise concerns for some but it's worth seeing beyond that. I can heartily recommend

> the book. And, for a scholarly book, it is entirely readable and enjoyable.

Frans argues that human morality is not imposed "from above" by some revelation from God, but instead comes from within. According to his research, moral behavior does not begin and end with religion but is in fact a product of evolution. But unlike the dogmatic neo-atheist impression of his book's title, de Waal does not scorn religion per se. Instead, he draws on the long tradition of humanism exemplified by the painter Hieronymus Bosch and asks reflective readers to consider these issues from a positive perspective: What role, if any, does religion play for a well-functioning society today? And where can believers and nonbelievers alike find the inspiration to lead a good life? Frankly, I had no idea what a bonobo was, but I learned they are a primate very similar to humans in both body proportions and overall stature. Interestingly, our DNA is also closest to these primates. The book also examines the ethical attitudes and subtle differences in behaviors of chimpanzees compared to bonobos.

One surprise to me in the book is the "inside look" at how primate research has changed in the past 100 years and why many of the early findings were dismissed or simply not allowed in the literature because of the strong feelings about the "implications of evolution" over millions of years. Dr. de Waal's explanations and personal observations over his career offer sobering insights into whether we truly are objective when we examine facts and figures. We all need to learn how to ask better questions when we hear research results.

# **American Women Rule**

Our company is a certified Woman Owned Business. I am married to the woman who inspired its foundation and who leads it today as CEO. So, I fully understand the phrase "women rule." But, up until a few days ago, I had no idea how many unrecognized illustrations we have of this. Our U.S. Women's Soccer Team just won the World Title for the fourth year in a row.

I thought this sort of phenomenon was reserved to recent times. I had no idea that a 17-year old woman pitcher had struck out Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig, the two greatest baseball players of her day. But she did that in an "exhibition game," so some might say it didn't really count.

The woman who did that was Jackie Mitchell, who learned how to play baseball at a young age. As a teenager spotted striking out some of the best male hitters her age, a professional baseball team owner spotted her. That lead to her being invited to pitch in the exhibition game.

In just four pitches, Mitchell was able to strike out Ruth, who many consider to be the greatest baseball player of all time. Ruth wasn't too happy about being struck out by a teenage girl, and then Gehrig struck out right after him on just three pitches. The crowd was going wild of course.

Mitchell was extraordinarily talented at baseball, but her career as a professional wouldn't last long. After a few days, Kennesaw Mountain Landis, the commissioner of Major League Baseball, voided her contract. He claimed that being a professional baseball player would be too strenuous for a woman. Ruth echoed those sentiments saying, "Because they are too delicate, it would kill them to play ball every day." These guys needed to see our US women play soccer.

Even though Mitchell showed the potential to be a Major League Baseball player that day, she never got the chance. In 1952, teams were barred from signing female players. The rule lasted for 40 years, and it wouldn't be until 1993 that a female was drafted.

We're still waiting on our first female MLB player, and it's only a matter of time before someone gets the chance to deliver that history lesson.

Meanwhile, I sit in awe of the largely female-staff at our own company that my wife leads and of the mostly female staff that has delivered this *Smoke Signal* newsletter every single month for more than 50 years. Now, that's some powerful impact worthy of contemplation, appreciation, and praise.

# **GFWC Stone Mountain Woman's Club**



# BACK TO SCHOOL SKIN TIPS: ACNE

Most teenagers know what they want to wear to school on the first day of class. New clothes, a modern haircut and healthy looking, clear skin! Unfortunately, most teens miss on one of these areas... especially when it comes to skin! Acne is definitely NOT on their list, but it often shows up

Unfortunately, acne is one of the most common skin diseases. Eightyfive percent of all people will have acne sometime in their life. Most of the time it shows up in the teenage years and early twenties. However, acne has been seen in almost every decade of life... even in people who are in their 50's and 60's.

Several things cause acne. Excess sebum (skin oil) sets the scene by clogging skin pores. This stage is the whitehead or blackhead stage or mild acne. Because oil production is increased with the onset of puberty, most acne begins at this age. Women may also have a worsening of acne with their monthly fluctuation in hormones or during menopause. Normal skin bacteria (called P. acnes) thrive in the dense oil. As the bacteria multiply, the pores become inflamed and begin to look red and swollen. This is the 'pimple' stage of acne or moderate acne. Sometimes, this stage becomes severe, reaching the deeper portions of the skin. This stage of acne is considered severe and is called cystic acne. Most of the time, cysts will result in scarring.

If you have acne, there are several simple things you can do to take care of your skin. First, try to leave your face alone. Do not pick or squeeze the spots. This only makes them more irritated and may cause them to become inflamed. Also, do not rub or touch your face a lot for the same reason. Be careful what hair products and makeup you use. Avoid greasy, oily hair products. Look for the words 'non-comedogenic' on makeup and moisturizers. Do not scrub your skin or use drying agents.

Lastly, diet does not affect acne so don't be worried about chocolate or sweets causing acne.

Over-the-counter products are the first step towards treating acne unless you already have moderate to severe acne. Start with a salicylic acid or benzoyl peroxide wash once a day and follow directions. Follow this with an oil free or 'non-comedogenic' moisturizer. Use an over-thecounter benzoyl peroxide cream at night to all areas affected by the acne, starting with a 2.5% to 5% cream first. Most people have a little irritation with this product, so use a moisturizer along with it. Don't give up! Often times, acne will worsen during the first two weeks of treatment and may take 6-8 weeks to clear. If it doesn't clear, move to a stronger benzoyl peroxide cream (it comes in 2.5%, 5% and 10%) or see a doctor for a prescription medication. There are so many more prescription options now!

In the modern world, virtually every stage of acne, at any age of life can be successfully treated. Most of the time, acne continues to be a problem because it is either ignored and left untreated, or because the treatment regimen is stopped before the acne fully clears. A visit to the doctor for stubborn or severe cases can result in clear, blemish free skin and prevent scarring. Clear skin can be one of the most beautiful things you wear back to school!



# You Can't Always Believe Your Lying Eyes!

Many of us have heard the famous line from the early 1900s that was used in movies and articles, "Who you gonna believe, me or your lying eyes?". Ironically, this was said by someone who was caught lying and, instead of admitting it, says the evidence is wrong, as well as the person who's looking right at it.

There is humor in that clever phrase; however in current times, it can take on a more sinister meaning – especially when referring to "deepfakes." If you haven't heard of this digital contortion yet, you most certainly will. (Think of "JibJab" on steroids!) Deepfake is a technique used to create fake images and videos. The experts call it "human image synthesis" used to combine and superimpose existing images and videos onto source images or videos. It uses a machine learning technique (or artificial intelligence) known as "generative adversarial network." Yvette Clarke, Representative, New York's Ninth Congressional District, wrote on July 11, 2019 in the digital journalism platform, Quartz:

"False information on the internet is becoming increasingly sophisticated with deepfakes – videos that can take a single image and manipulate it into a video sequence using algorithms, i.e. artificial intelligence and machine learning that process huge amounts of data to make it appear as if a person is doing or saying something that they did not actually do."

Representative Clarke suggests deepfakes can be "hugely destructive to our societies," and "are a threat to the truth on which we base our democracy." She has proposed the DEEPFAKES Accountability Act, the first of its kind in the House, to "hold perpetrators accountable and protect victims of deepfake content."

It's believed the term "deepfake" was coined in 2017 from a Reddit user named "deepfake." According to Wikipedia, "... the deepfake phenomenon was first reported in December 2017 in the technical and scientific section of the magazine, Vice, leading to its widespread reporting in other media." In February 2018, deepfakes were banned by Reddit for sharing involuntary pornography, and other websites have followed suit.

Although it's a relatively new phenomenon, it's likely to be around for quite a while. You should know deepfakes are being used to create fake videos of all kinds – especially fabricated celebrity pornographic videos, revenge porn, fake news, fake politics, and just downright malicious hoaxes. A recent, well-published, occurrence targeted House Speaker Nancy Pelosi. A video was edited to make her appear as if she was slurring her words (or drunk) during a news conference. Millions of people saw it on social media.

There are arguably valid uses for this technology, such as academic research, satire, art, etc.; however, we need reliable ways to detect deep fake content. Also, we need to establish legal recourse for victims of deepfakes. This realitively new technology can have a negative impact on many aspects of our daily life, including economic manipulation, fraudulent survelliance videos, and certainly political misinformation. U.S. intelligence officials are issuing a warning about deepfakes ahead of the 2020 presidential election. The long-held belief that a "picture doesn't lie" may not be the full truth anymore. You have now been warned, don't believe everything you encounter on a screen!



I remember in the early 70s hearing the outrage over horror stories of Nestle convincing third world mothers to use baby formula rather than breast feed their newborns. They were told it was better for the baby, and many believed it and tried to do it. Unfortunately, they did not have the means to purchase the formula and dilute it properly. They diluted it too much to extend it and in some cases used contaminated water further worsening the situation.

All the while, nutritionists were finding that breast milk contained antibodies, vitamins, protein, and fat that babies need to grow, all provided in a purified form more easily digested than infant formula.

Once the media picked up on it, the scandal was exposed, but not before many babies died of malnutrition and related causes. Nestle's formula for the dubious scheme was outlined by the New Internationalist as:

- 1. Create a need where none existed.
- 2. Convince consumers the products were indispensable.
- 3. Link products with the most desirable and unattainable concepts—then giving a sample.

Fast forward to a new century and wonder if it's "second verse, same as the first, a little bit larger and a whole lot worse?" Hearing that for the past two years bottled water sales have surpassed sales of carbonated sodas in the U.S. sounds like good news, but think again. Why are we bottling, transporting, refrigerating, and selling water in plastic bottles in the first place? Is it really better than what is purified, treated and piped to our homes and businesses? And are those billions of plastic bottles that are going into landfills really necessary? And there have to be health concerns to be exposed. I have seen pallets of plastic water bottles sitting in the blazing hot sun for days and wondered what happens to the plastic material when it is exposed to bright sun like that and heated to extremes? Are there chemicals breaking down in the plastic and ending up in that purified water we are paying to enjoy?

According to *Beverage Marketing*, bottled water consumption in this country already exceeds tap water. They spin this a being good news that the gradual switch to more water drinking means Americans have cut trillions of calories from their diets that used to come from sugary, carbonated drinks. In 2017, they estimated an individual saved an average of 25,000 calories over the previous year — when bottled water consumption reached an all-time high of 11.7 billion gallons — compared to 2000, when Americans consumed 4.7 billion gallons of bottled water.

Is anyone thinking about what we are doing? Bottling then hauling water from places like Fiji all the way around the world so we can drink water pumped from that island? Really? Let's just think about this. Water is composed of two hydrogen atoms and one oxygen atom to form the molecule H2O. Minerals from the ground may give water a certain flavor or taste, but those can be packaged and inexpensively shipped for addition to your tap water, just like we use Crystal Light to turn water into tea or lemonade. Shipping that water costs in petroleum to power the jets and gasoline to fuel the delivery trucks, then you have to buy it and transport it. Just so we can drink their H2O.

It's interesting that the beverage companies who have piled on board with the bottled water opportunity would just prefer selling sodas and juices according to *Beverage Marketing*. Apparently they have found that customers are not loyal to a brand of water like they are to their Coke or Pepsi and the margins on water sales are not as high as for their other products. Maybe we can help them get rid of some of that water selling business by becoming wise consumers.

Here are a couple of tips to help you get started:

- Carry a water bottle with you and fill it from a chilled water fountain when you pass one.
- Buy crystals or concentrated drops that flavor your water any way you like. There is about anything you can imagine in the juice isle from the most popular ice tea and lemonade to all sorts of berries and fruits.
- Purchase a filtering water pitcher and keep it handy in the refrigerator or where you most often go for refreshments.

We as consumers may have been duped by clever marketing, but it's not too late to make the healthy, environmentally friendly, energy saving, greener solution: Drink your own water.





# Fried Okra – Georgia Popcorn!

As with grits, some of our northern neighbors don't understand the Southern passion associated with okra. Originating in Africa and reported to have been enjoyed by Cleopatra, this hot weather vegetable has a history of being a staple in every kitchen garden below the Mason Dixon Line. The key to having a bumper crop that will bear until first frost is to cut it every day, as pods grow quickly, and bigger pods will become too tough to eat. Okra plants grow taller as the season extends and you might need a ladder to get to the top by the end of the September. Okra pods and leaves have tiny hairs that can irritate the skin so use gloves for cutting and during preparation. Or, you can purchase fresh okra at the farmer's market. Okra will wilt and begin to turn brown with age. Fresh okra will be firm and uniformly green. It should last in your refrigerator for several days.

Other uses for this nutritional vegetable include gumbo and pickled okra. It can be added to canned tomatoes as a basis for soups or stews. Dried pods from your garden can be used to gather seed for the next year or if you leave them to completely dry, they add unusual texture to dried floral arrangements for fall and last for many years.

Favorite Methods for Cooking Okra: The simplest method is to just cut in circles, bread with cornmeal, and fry in hot oil. I like to use cornmeal mix because it also contains flour which helps the coating to stick. Regardless of the method, most recipes are consistent in using approximately 4-inch length okra pods. Leave okra circles a little moist but not wet, add breading, pan fry in a cast iron skillet to golden brown and add salt after cooking. I have found that methods that use "batter" to coat the okra end up with more batter than okra. As with all methods of cooking your favorites, if your Mamma cooked okra and you loved it, use her recipe!!

# Fried Okra Tempura Appetizer:

Choose 4-inch or smaller pods of okra. Wash and cut off tip and stem end and soak in ice water for approximately 5 minutes. Cut pods lengthwise into sticks. Drain on paper towels. In mixing bowl, mix ½ cup all-purpose flour and ½ cup cornmeal mix. Measure 1 cup of ice water and add beaten egg to water. Add liquid to flour mixture and stir until smooth. Batter will be thin. In deep fryer or stovetop Dutch oven, heat oil for deep frying. Dip okra pieces into batter, drain off excess, and drop into hot oil. Do not crowd – just cook a few at a time because continuing to add the cold okra will cause the oil to cool. Pods will rise to the top. Turn once. Separate and cook until golden brown. Remove from oil and drain. Salt pieces while hot. Serve with favorite horseradish or rémoulade sauce, or along with burgers or steaks as an alternative to French fries.

A lot of patience is required to wait until the first tomatoes of the season begin to take on that beautiful blush and I am certain that fried green tomatoes were discovered by an impatient farmer for just that reason. Aren't we thankful that he did!

# Fried Green Tomatoes:

Hard green tomatoes will have a lot of acid so choose those that are just beginning to change color and are still firm. Cut off each end and cut slices approximately ½ inch thick. Using same method as for okra, coat tomato slices with dry mixture. Pan fry in cast iron skillet until brown. Turn and cook until both sides are golden brown. Note: I am told that the "Texas" method is to sprinkle fresh slices with a small amount of sugar after slicing and before breading.
