Appreciating Our Complicated Lives

I used to be a chaplain in the U.S. Army Reserves. I received my training at the Chaplain Officer's Basic School in Columbia, South Carolina at Fort Jackson. My training class consisted of men and women from various Christian denominations and a few other religions. Our mission as Chaplains in the Army is to provide for the spiritual care of soldiers and their families. Over a period of eight weeks I trained at being a field chaplain on and off the battlefield to include memorizing army regulations, learning the vast networks of logistics and tactics and working within battlefield scenarios which were based on actual events.

The battlefield scenarios were the most strenuous of our training exercises. Cadre would give us a story scenario which involved a chaplain having to make a choice under battlefield conditions while weighing out spiritual beliefs, army regulations and soldier's needs. One scenario involved a chaplain during the Vietnam War who was assisting in a forward medical aid camp which became overrun by the Viet Cong. According to the Geneva Convention (basis for determining war crimes), chaplains were considered unarmed noncombatants who were to be treated as prisoners of war. Therefore, chaplains are not allowed to carry firearms in combat and instead have chaplain aides who guard them. In the scenario, the chaplain aid was already dead, and there was a strong possibility that all wounded soldiers would be shot while other soldiers might be captured. However, the Viet Cong were known to take no prisoners as well. As the chaplain, would you pick up a weapon and defend the wounded, or take your chances and hope that they capture you and take you prisoner with others in order to care for the prisoner's needs. If you picked up a weapon, then you might defend the wounded but you could still be court marshaled for breaking the convention rule. The class was usually divided in such scenarios and most of us admitted that the unique situation would most likely dictate the response from us regardless of our denomination's guidelines or desired intentions.

I think about these exercises often when faced with discussions about many issues like immigration, racism, gender bias, and economics. Life is more complicated than my single little brain can comprehend. I believe that we should listen to other's stories and experiences, ask questions and debate the rough edges where our stories intersect, or collide. Paul tells his church communities to speak the truth in

love which means we should listen in love as well. May God open our ears, eyes and hearts to one another's stories in love and with respect, so that we might appreciate and learn in Jesus' name. Amen.

The ROCK group recently participated in a week of service (June 25th – July 1st) where we visited a few local community organizations and donated our time to help those in need. Our focus for the week was homelessness and poverty. We started the week with a 30 hour fast, which lasted from 1pm Sunday, June 24th until 7pm Monday, June 25th. On Sunday night, we had a movie/game night. Then we met at the church on Monday for some activities to pass our fasting time. Each of us took on the challenge of buying a meal for a family of four with a budget of only \$10 at Fareway. We ended up preparing one of these meals to break our fast on Monday night and donated the rest of the meals to Central Iowa Shelter Services' (CISS) food pantry. World Vision, an international humanitarian organization, provides some educational videos about famine and poverty so we watched some of their videos, discussed the perception of those that are homeless, made tshirt handbags to donate to CISS, and had some worship and quiet time on Monday evening before breaking our fast.

On Wednesday, a few of us went to CISS to serve lunch to their clients. They offer housing, education, and health care to the homeless in Des Moines. After we served lunch, we got a tour of the facility, including their garden and greenhouse, food pantry, and clothing pantry. They said that they are in need of socks and disposable razors year round, so we may have a sock/razor drive in the near future.

We had planned to visit Joppa on Thursday, but will be rescheduling for a day in July when more youth will be able to attend. On Friday, we packaged meals at Meals from the Heartland, and we spent Saturday morning gardening at the Blackmer's Gardening for Good Farm. We planted

cucumbers and squash that will be harvested later this year for the Food Bank of Iowa.

because we have faith, and we're good people. But we all have times in our lives that we simply have to pass through, whether they're health issues, money issues, issues of loss, or difficult circumstances.

The books below are memoirs by people who've faced things head-on, as Christians, and made it through to the other side.

No Place to Hide: A Brain Surgeon's Long Journey Home from the Iraq War, by W. Lee Warren

This memoir chronicles Dr. Warren's assignment with the Air Force National Guard in Balad, Iraq in 2004. Dr. Warren's expertise as neurosurgeon and as a Christian were challenged during his time in a tent hospital, serving both U.S. military men and women, and also Iraqi soldiers and civilians. His ability to serve as many wounded as possible, the questioning of his faith and wondering what life would be like once he returned home, are dealt with openly and honestly in this book.

At times, this book was difficult to read. But....I kept thinking, surely if he could serve, and endure what he shared, I could keep reading. It was worth the effort.

Fly a Little Higher How God Answered a Mom's Small Prayer in a Big Way, by Laura Sobiech

A person never thinks his/her son might be diagnosed with osteosarcoma, an aggressive bone cancer, at the age of 17, and that he would die at 18. This is the reality Laura Sobiech faced.

Her son, Zach, decided <u>not</u> to undergo aggressive surgery that <u>might</u> have saved his life when chemotherapy did not. The surgery would have been a long shot and would have meant losing his leg and hip, meaning he'd not be able to walk.

Zach opted for living life as normally as possible in the time he had left.

At that point, his mom surrendered him to God, and said "Okay, Lord, you can have him. But if he must die, I want it to be something big. I want someone's life to be changed forever."

Zach, who always had a heart for music, went on to write songs, share his story with many, and create a CD of his music, all while being a "normal kid," going to high school in Stillwater, MN, dating, and spending family and friends time.

This book was an act of heroism. Laura Sobiech shares all of her emotions, along with the events of Zach's last year of life, and how that affected the family in many good ways, but also in some difficult ways. She and her family somehow managed to have that normal life – not always easily – that Zach so wanted.

PALESTINE WOMEN OF ELCA Bible study August 6, 2 p.m.

In Summer 2018, Anna Madsen will present a three-part study on prayer.

Session one (June): the paradoxes of prayer (1 Samuel 12:16-23)

Called to pray, but for what purpose? Can we persuade God with prayer? Do we actually encounter God in prayer? Is the practice of prayer intended for the sake of the one praying or for the One to whom we pray? The Bible references all of these scenarios; however, each comes with biblical, theological and practical questions. In this first session on prayer, we'll investigate the paradoxical truths of this spiritual practice.

Session two (July): the practices of prayer (Psalm 19:14)

Jesus taught us how to pray by way of the Lord's Prayer. But both in Scripture and in the Christian tradition, people of faith have developed a wide variety of ways to come before God. In this session, we'll look at different ways to pray, what each might offer and how knowing an array of prayer styles can enrich our devotional life.

Session three (August): the products of prayer (Romans 8:26-28)

It is indeed true that many results of prayer are intangible—and even impossible—to discern. But it is also true that prayer can demonstrably change the brain, reduce stress levels and, some studies say, appear to correlate to otherwise inexplicable healing in those for whom people have prayed. In the final session of this series, we will investigate the effects of prayer personally, communally and on the mission of the church.

Gather's summer Bible studies are available to download for free to try on your own or to study as a group. You can find them on Women of the ELCA website under publications \rightarrow gather \rightarrow Bible study.

SESSION OBJECTIVE for the August study (the practices of prayer) is to explore forms of prayer and deepen other forms of prayer participants have already found to be particularly powerful in their own lives.

The theme for the July/August 2018 *Gather* magazine is **LET US PRAY** Our prayers—our communications with our Creator—affect us as individuals, our communities and the very mission of the Church.

A Loving Bond for Landon

Seven years ago, Ashley was eager to welcome her first child, Landon. While Landon was a perfectly behaved newborn, Ashley began feeling overwhelmed when his behavior changed as he grew. Landon stopped napping. He began throwing tantrums and lashed out when Ashley tried to help him. Ashley was desperate for a relationship with her toddler, but Landon always pushed her away. She turned to LSI's Behavioral Health Intervention Services.

Peggy, Landon's LSI worker, began visiting their home to help Landon develop the coping skills he needed to control his anger and guide him back to being the happy child he once was. Peggy and Landon began taking walks together, visiting the library, and playing games. When the family moved to a new home, Peggy made sure Landon was comfortable in his room and encouraged him to use it as a safe space when he needed to be alone.

Peggy and Landon have been working together for years and Landon, now 7, knows he has a support system to turn to on the rough days.

"We would truly be lost without Peggy," Ashley says. "Now Landon gives hugs, lets me know when he's angry and – the biggest gift of all – I occasionally hear, 'I love you, Mom'."
