COPPER LADY'S VITTLES

Venison Roast

Remove all the fat and hair from a leg or loin roast. Rub down with a clean cloth soaked in vinegar or lemon juice. If you hanker to, you can set the meat overnight in a bit of elderberry wine, water, maple syrup, lemon and bay leaves.

Heat your Dutch oven and drop in a spoonful of suet or oil. Slice up an onion and let it heat till you can near look through it. Push the onion aside, and sear the meat. It'll sputter a bit, so use a long handle fork or knife to turn it.

Pour in half a cup of water, a can of tomato soup (if you let the meat set overnight in juice, you might use that juice), and any spices you want. Cover and simmer for a couple of hours or until done. Use the pan juices for gravy.

You could set a couple of white potatoes to cook in the coals while you roast the meat. Goes well with the gravy. If you want, wrap the potatoes in foil. Poke them with your knife after a time to see if they're done.

Dutch Cabbage

A nice compliment to the wild game roast would be cabbage prepared according to *The Book of Buck Skinning III.* This is a tart and satisfying vegetable that goes well with pork, chicken or turkey.

Shred 1 large head of red cabbage and soak in salt water for ten minutes. Drain well.

Melt 6 Tbsp. bacon fat in a Dutch Oven, add cabbage and toss with a wooden spoon. When wilted, add 1 Cup red wine and salt and pepper to taste. While it simmers for about five minutes, add 2 apples (cored, diced but not peeled), 2 Tbsp. brown sugar and ¼ Cup vinegar.

Mix, cover and simmer for about 40 minutes – until cabbage and apples are tender.

John Coulter, Commemorate Shoot, Meeteeste, WY

On January 9, 2008 a muzzleloader shoot was held in Meeteetse to commemorate 200 years ago this year of John Colter exploring our area, more or less, on his own. The shoot was reported in the Billings Gazette by Ruffin Prevost, who wrote a great news story and I will quote a bit of it with his permission. "A month long celebration to mark the bicentennial of explorer John Colter's travels to area got off with a bang – lots of loud bangs- Saturday in Metteetse as about 20 mountain men participated in a black powder shooting contest. The prototypical mountain man, John Colter was one of the youngest members of the Lewis and Clark Corps of Discovery. After completing his travels with that group in 1806, he explored the Yellowstone region during the winter of 1807-08." Donnie Collins and Big Ted were each interviewed and I was very proud of their thoughts. I feel from everyone's comments after the shoot that they had a good time. I would like to thank each person, who came to the shoot. We also especially need to thank the following people for their time and tremendous effort in putting on this shoot: Ned Dunn – Mitch Mitchell – Larry Jones – Jerry Ward – Dave Owens – Steve Crane – Dan and the City of Meeteetse – Allen Burns, a member of the Bicentennial Committee. Members of the Deer Creek Muzzle Loaders enjoy this weekend of shooting, camping, and camaraderie as much as all of the shooters who travel from out of town that have joined us annually on President's Weekend for twenty one years! The shoot was born of cabin fever in these parts and is still a good fix for that common Wyoming winter malady.

Every year, the DCML President wracks his brain and with the help of a crystal ball and a little luck perhaps, puts together five guys and three gals and hopes they will be on top of their game for the weekend. It usually doesn't happen. There always seems to be one or two shooters on the number two or three teams that make a real stretch and shoot the lights out of the ten targets.

However, DCML returned to the top spot last year with its team #1 and when the smoke and snow cleared this year, we had done it again! The next closest team was breathing down our necks though and was certainly capable of taking the gold medallions and bragging rights away, but not this year.

Club members set up the canvas club palace along with Delbert's warm up tent on Thursday before the shoot, shoveling eight inches of the white stuff to get to dry ground. 

The Lakota Calendar

The annual calendar used by the Lakota was based on the thirteen lunar cycles, so there were thirteen months. Names for months were based on natural events, though different Lakota groups often used different names for the same months. The Middle Moon was so named because it had six months preceding it and six months following it. Because of the twenty-seven- and twenty-eight-day lunar cycle, the Lakota months did not coincide exactly with the modern calendar; in fact, they overlapped, so comparisons are approximate.
