### **UPCOMING PROGRAM**

- Please note the important change of date! Thank you to those who joined our large audience at the November 22nd dinner and program and who also agreed to the recommendation to change our December 27th dinner to an earlier date in the month.
- ♦ This is really not a watershed "change". When the WW2 Round Table was founded in 1987, it was largely composed of WW2 veterans—for whom remembering Pearl Harbor was a sacred moment. Thus, the Round Table's tradition was to schedule the December dinner close to this date. It was decided also that the rest of the dinner meetings would be on the 4th Monday of each month, and if necessary, the May date was adjusted to accommodate Memorial Day. Your board proposes we align once again with this plan.
- ♦ The board is most appreciative that the Northside Social Club is able to accommodate us on the earlier date—and that our members support this change.

# Inviting Members & Guests to Share Their Story: "Remembering Pearl Harbor" or "A Christmas or Hanukkah Memory"


Our December program will consist of 8-10 vetted brief stories. Each speaker has a 4-5 minute time limit. Possible suggestions:

- ♦ Where were you on December 7, 1941? What do you remember about this date? Or, what tales were handed down in your family from those who served in WW2?
- Where you were during Christmas when you were in the military, or part of a military family? Were you in some exotic locale or a foxhole, perhaps—in Korea, Vietnam, Iraq or Afghanistan? Or, present a story about a relative's service at this time.
- Do you have a letter to share written by a veteran commenting on either of these events?
- Do you have memories of special Hanukkahs or of family members who celebrated this holiday during WW2?



Please send Karl Kleinbub your request to be a part of the program <u>by December 3rd if possible</u>, including your topic. You will receive a confirmation and possible order in which you will present on the 6th. The early bird is more likely to be included! We'll try to post some of the best stories from that evening (as well as some that could not be included due to our time limit) in the January edition of the newsletter.

# **WW II TRIVIA FOR DECEMBER 2021**

- In February 1945 Columbus, OH had a water shortage that threatened to affect operations at their huge Curtiss-Wright factory, so the city government asked the city residents to conserve water by flushing their toilets only once a day per person.
- In February 1943 the British learned that Goebbels was scheduled to give an important address from Berlin over the radio at a given time.

The British therefore scheduled an air raid to hit the city 45 minutes before Goebbels began his speech.

- Soon after the Battle of the Bismarck Sea in March 1943 in which the Japanese lost several transports filled with Japanese soldiers, Radio Tokyo announced that Japanese soldiers would now be taught how to swim.
- In November 1943 the Germans offered the Russian people a generous reward for the head of a notorious guerilla leader, Mikhail Romashkin. The reward was 32 acres of land, a house, 15,000 rubles, 2 cows and 1 horse.
- In the Japanese military honorable suicide as atonement for failure was so engrained that family members usually supported this concept and, at times, encouraged it. Also in some cases wives would commit suicide along with their husbands.
- On VJ Day, August 15, 1945, former Premier Hiedeki Tojo's son-in law, Hidehasa Koga, committed suicide with a pistol. Tojo acquired the pistol and used it on himself on September 11 in an attempt to commit suicide. Tojo's suicide attempt failed, he recovered, was tried and convicted of war crimes and hanged.
- On February 14, 1942 the British surrendered Singapore to the Japanese. The surrender ceremony took place in the Ford Motor Company's factory on the outskirts of the city.
- In November 1943 when President Roosevelt went to Tehran to meet with Stalin and Churchill he took with him his 6 cooks who normally served aboard his Presidential yacht.
- ◆ US General Jonathon Wainwright was a prisoner of the Japanese for over 3 years. When he was liberated in August 1945 he weighed 130 pounds. He was 6′ 3″ tall. He later stated that he had played 8632 game of solitaire and had taken on the task of sharpening razors for the other POWs. . . . . MORE TRIVIA NEXT MONTH



Perhaps we'll invite them back for the "rest of their story"!




