

<u>RECIPE CORNER</u>

This recipe was sent in by Janine Lishman-Peat of Thurlstone & Millhouse Green WI

Artichoke, Red Pepper and Olive Loaf

This month's recipe comes from a book I bought a few years ago in a French supermarket. In the introduction the author says that these are recipes for real English cake. As you will see they are nothing of the sort!!!

Makes 8 slices

400g tin artichoke hearts 200g self raising flour (I used wholemeal, but the recipe used white) 3 eggs

2 tbsp oil

50 g sliced green olives

1 chopped red pepper

Salt and pepper

Line a 2lb loaf tin and set the oven to 180 c or gas 4.



P Drain the artichokes and squeeze out any excess water. Cut them in half.

Mix everything else together well. Put half the mix in the tin, put the artichokes on top, put the rest of the mix on top of that and bake for 45 mins. or until a skewer comes away clean.

It doesn't rise very much and has a very knobbly top, but was excellent served warm for lunch with a salad.
