10 Years a Saint

Pope Benedict XVI proclaimed Mother Marianne the first American Franciscan Saint in ceremonies at St. Peter's Square on October 21, 2012.

Many devoted to our Saint Marianne Cope gathered at Assumption Church in Syracuse, New York to mark the 10th Anniversary of Saint Marianne's canonization.

The special Mass that Diocese of Syracuse Bishop Douglas J. Lucia celebrated was in the same church where the young woman born Barbara Koob professed her final vows to become Sister Marianne. Among those attending the service was Saint Marianne's great-grand niece, who traveled from Vermont to be part of our celebration. Following the service, we hosted a reception filled with Franciscan joy.









We shared a weekly newsletter leading up to the 10th anniversary. Viewers could see items from the archives; and read testimonials from sisters and people who worked with Marianne in Molokai. Also, we shared a series of answers to the question "What does Marianne Mean to You?" including notes from the museum staff.



St. Joseph St. Patrick parish in Utica, New York celebrated the anniversary with special banners and a lighting ceremony.

At the museum, we are continuously inviting people to talk with Sister Jean. We have witnessed the difference that Sister Jean makes in people's lives.





Empathy in Action

Programs in the Works

What's My Story

A test-run of this program addressed learned bias and asks how can we become aware of the prejudices that we have learned through our upbringing and how can we best overcome those ideas to be more empathetic toward people we are not familiar with.

Franciscan Academy

As part of the Franciscan Academy, developed and presented by Francis House for their staff and volunteers, the group visited the museum to learn the basis for the values they live in service to those at end of life. Understanding the history and values-in-action lived by the first Sisters in central New York and Hawaii through the next 150 years, provides a fitting perspective to inspire those who integrate the Sisters' values into their daily work.



Taking Charge of the Time You Have

In early Spring, Sister Kathy Osbelt and Kristin Barrett-Anderson presented "Take Charge; How to move forward through your journey of care with peace of mind" to a group at the Spiritual Renewal Center in Syracuse. The attendees included people who had received life-changing diagnoses and caregivers. We have found this program to be extremely informative and helpful to those journeying through healthcare and self-care decision-making. Sister Kathy's last wish was to give this program to others and provide resources for emotional, spiritual and physical needs through a medical crisis.

Empathy 101

Our introductory program was adapted for Middle School students and presented inperson and over zoom. We found 4th-6th graders curious and so willing to incorporate empathy practices into their daily lives. There is so much hope to be found in the young people and we are excited to share this as a school program in the future.

On November 10 we hosted 21 4th graders along with parents and staff from Immaculate Conception in Fayetteville. In addition to a tour, we presented the "Empathy 101" program addressing intention, bullying, inclusion and listening skills. The students were so enthusiastic! Between questions and stories, we could have been there for hours. Sister Jean followed up with prayers for our veterans and teachers as the students readied to have lunch and get back to their classroom.

Projects & Programs

Educational Opportunity

The head of the history department for the Syracuse City School District was so inspired by the stories presented at the museum that arrangements are being made to bring teachers of the 6th through 12th grades to an education day in 2023. After the teachers tour the museum, they will choose the historical parts that can be incorporated into their curricula and develop study and lesson guides for their students. As part of the lessons presented to their students, each class will field-trip to the museum.

Not only will our museum benefit from the income brought by the tours but we will also fulfill our mission of sharing Marianne's and the Sisters' story and values with a new audience of young people.

Journal Publication

Kalaupapa's most esteemed historical scholar and author, Anwei Law has been diligently working to piece together the journals of Mother Marianne and Sister Leopoldina Burns. The goal of this publication is to not only share the day to day life of the people on Kalaupapa but to give insight into the lives of the patients. Through her research, archival photos and documents, we are able to give life to residents that has never been shared previously. People will also learn of Mother Marianne's challenges and struggles with isolation and being away from her Sister community. Sister Leopoldina's journals provide glimpses of joy among the sorrowful and constant loss. We are certain of the historical value of the writings and photographs and expect researchers, teachers and families to find hope and inspiration.



Statue Revealed

2022 also started the development of a new Saint Marianne statue. After many years, we found a national statue designer and distributor to take on our challenge.

Our goal has been to fulfill a huge request from our customers and carry our Saint into the future through a standardized and accepted merchandise piece.

Development started with the question, how can we make a statue that identifies Marianne, her Franciscan heritage and her achievements? We hope that this statue, portraying our Saint standing on the rocky shores of Kalaupapa will do just that. The Franciscan Tau on the book she is holding is a shout out to her faith and values and the plumeria flower she holds under her arm reflect the beauty that she incorporated into all of her ministries.

Pre-sales will start in the summer of 2023 and fulfilled in the autumn.


Interview Series

Franciscan Academy

The newest "class" of Francis House staff completed the course with a tour of the museum and practices to incorporate Franciscan values into day-to-day work, management, and volunteerism. As these modules are tested and honed, they will be offered to volunteers and staff at non-profits in the community.
