

In Memory of

William Ervin, Co-Founder and Vice-President The Ernie Pyle Roundtable



It is with great sadness that the Board of Directors shares the news of the sudden passing of co-founder and Vice-President of our Roundtable, William Irvin, on December 15, 2023. A memorial service will be held on Saturday, January 13, 2024 at 11:00 a.m. at the Cornerstone Lutheran Church, 4850 E Main St, Carmel, IN.

Bill was the consummate historian. He, along with his friend, Dr. Bob Palmer, who had served in the WW2 Air Corps, were instrumental in the founding of our Roundtable in 1984. Their mission initially was to preserve eyewitness accounts of WW2, and later provide WW2-related programs of

interest to veterans and families. It was a no-brainer for the founders to name the Roundtable after the famous Hoosier from Dana, Indiana, WW2 reporter Ernie Pyle.

"Bill was always an active participant at our board meetings. He brought fresh ideas to the table and generated food for thought. In fact, he offered financial support to pay for highly valued speakers to attend our programs. . . . As a founding member of the organization, he "had access to a wealth of information. One of his recent missions was to preserve *The World War II Times*, an Indianapolis published newspaper during the 1990s which he brought to our group.*

He was always thinking ahead and had a vision. . . . In addition, Bill was a good resource in remembering past events and could also cross reference with his long-time involvement with the Aero Club. Bill was charismatic in his own way, had a positive attitude and was always willing to pursue a lead for a possible speaker. Overall, Bill was simply a nice human being and was a pleasure to know."—Marlene Mendonsa




WW 2 Trivia for January & February 2024

Inspired by Ozzie's earlier trivia reports . . .


Eighty Years ago! . . . in January & February 1944 . . .


- January 3, 1944—Top US flying ace Major "Pappy" Boyington shot down in his Corsair by Japanese Captain Masajiro Kawato flying a Zero (survives as POW)
- ◆ January 4, Operation CARPETBAGGER begins (aerial dropping of supplies and weapons to resistance fighters in Europe) Earl Zimmerman (a member of our Roundtable) flew missions over Ploesti, Romania, was shot down and interned in Turkey, a neutral country. After he escaped, he trekked across North Africa and returned to the UK where he participated in Operation CARPETBAGGER missions over Norway
- January 16, General Eisenhower takes command of Allied Invasion
 Force in London
- January 22, Allied forces begin landing at Anzio on the Italian mainland
- February 3, World War II: United States troops capture the Marshall Islands.
- February 7, Germans launch counteroffensive at Anzio, Italy
- February 15, Allies begin attack on Axis held Monte Cassino monastery, Italy
- ♦ February 17-23, Battle of Eniwetok in the Pacific
- February 22, World War II: US Army Air Forces accidentally bomb
 Dutch town of Nijmegen, around 800 civilians die
- February 28 Arrests of the ten-Boom family in Nazi occupied Netherlands (Haarlem) through a Dutch collaborator on charges of hiding Jews
