"Who is My Neighbor?"

Script

READER 1: On a certain occasion, READER 2: an expert in The Law, READER 1: put Jesus to the test. READER 2: The lawyers READER 1: wanted to trick Jesus to see if he knew Reader2: and understood Scripture.

LAWYER 1: What must I do LAWYER 2: to receive eternal life?

READER 1: What is written in the Law?

READER 2: What does Moses say?

READER 1: What does Scripture say you must do?

LAWYER 1: Love the Lord God

LAWYER 2: with all your heart,

LAWYER 1: and with all your soul,

LAWYER 2: and with all your strength

LAWYER 1: and with your entire mind,

LAWYER 1, 2: and love your neighbor as yourself.

READER 1: You are correct in your answer.

ALL LAWYERS: Then?

READER 2: Then do this...and you will live.

READER 1: The question from the lawyer,

READER 2: "What must I do to acquire eternal life?

READER 1: was answered by the lawyer himself

READER 2: when he just answered Jesus' question,

READER 1: What does Scripture say?" READER 2: and READER 1: What do you read in Moses?

READER 4: Here is what you read in Moses. READER 3: If you want eternal life READER 4: you must love God, READER 3: and love your neighbor! READER 1: Seems simple enough. READER 2: A straight forward question! READER 3: A straight forward answer!

READER 1: One would think that, READER 2: but the lawyer asked,

LAWYER 1: Who is my neighbor?

(LAWYERS each face a READER.)

READER 3: Who is your neighbor! READER 4: You don't know?

(READERS 3 & 4 drop heads.)

READER 2: To answer the question, READER 1: Who is my neighbor? READER 2: Jesus told a story.

READER 1: In that story READER 2: the lawyer and the entire world READER 1: would discover the answer READER 2: and how to have eternal life.

(READERS take a step forward.)

READER 1: A man walking from Jerusalem to Jericho READER 2: was attacked by robbers. READER 1: They tore off his clothes. READER 2: They beat him up. READER 1: They stole his money. READER 2: They left him for dead. READER 1: They went away.

(READERS 3 & 4 lift their heads and look at one another as they say the following lines.)

READER 3: Robbed, READER 4: clothes torn, READER 3: beaten up, READER 4: left for dead! READERS 3 & 4 TOGETHER: What a terrible thing to happen on the Jericho road.

READER 1: There were people READER 2: traveling on the road, READER 1: a priest, READER 2: a Levite, READER 1: and a Samaritan.

READER 1: The priest, READER 2: upon seeing the beaten man READER 1: said to himself, READER 2: There is a man who has been attacked by robbers, beaten, robbed, and left for dead. READER 1: But he walked as far as possible READER 2: from the man on the road. READER 1: He didn't stop.

(READERS 3 & 4 look at one another as they say the following lines.)

READER 3: Why? READER 4: The man needs help! READER 3: If a priest wont' help the injured man, READER 4: who will help him? (READERS 3 & 4 take full front position.)

ALL READERS: on the Jericho road?

(READERS 3 & 4 drop heads.)

READER 2: After a time a Levite READER 1: traveling on the same road as the priest, READER 2: came upon the beaten man.

READER 1: Upon seeing the beaten man, he said to himself, READER 2: There is a man who has been attacked by robbers, READER 1: beaten up, robbed, READER 2: and left for dead.

READER 1: But he walked as far as possible READER 2: from the man on the road.

(READERS 3 & 4 left their heads and look at one another as they say the following lines.)

READER 3: He didn't stop READER 4: Why didn't the Levite stop? READER 3: He is paid from the tithe! READER 4: The man needs help. READER 3: If a Levite won't help the injured man, READER 4: who will help him?

ALL READERS: (*Take full front position.*) **on the Jericho road** (*READERS 3 & 4 drop heads*)

READER 2: After a time a Samaritan READER 1: Traveling on the same road as the priest, READER 2: came upon the beaten man.

READER 1: Upon seeing the beaten man, said to himself, READER 2: There is a man who has been attacked by robbers, beaten up, robbed and left for dead.

READER 1: He had pity on the man. READER 2: So he stopped and helped him. (READERS 3 & 4 lift their heads)

READER 4: Finally, finally, READER 3: someone stopped and helped him **ALL READERS: on the Jericho road.** READER 3: But of all people, READER 4: a Samaritan! READER 3: Why didn't the others help?

READER 1: The Samaritan READER 2: cared for the beaten man by pouring medicine on his wounds and bandaged them.

READER 3: I still want to know READER 4: why the priest READER 3: and the Levite READER 4: didn't stop to help ALL READERS: on the Jericho road.

READER 2: But that was only the beginning READER 1: of the Samaritan's help. READER 2: He put the man on his donkey, READER 1: He took him to an inn READER 2: and paid for his room.

READER 3: I though priests and Levites READER 4: were to help people READER 3: They only help people READER 4: Who will help them!

READER 1: To the innkeeper, READER 2: the Samaritan said, READER 1: Look after him, READER 3: Such kindness!

READER 1: When I return... READER 2: ...I will pay you for the added expenses. READER 3: Unlike the priest! READER 4: Unlike the Levite!

READER 3 & 4: Why didn't they help?

READER 1: Jesus told this story READER 2: a simple story READER 1: so the lawyer would know READER 2: what love is, READER 1: and answer the question,

(LAWYERS take full front position)

LAWYER 1-2: Who is my neighbor?

READER 2: Now it was Jesus' turn to ask questions. READER 1: Which of the three... READER 3: (*Takes one* step forward.) the priest, READER 4: (*Takes one step forward.*) or the Levite, READER 3 & 4: (*Takes one step forward.*) or the Samaritan READER 1: ...was a neighbor to the robbed and beaten man?

READER 4: (Takes one step forward.) The answer is easy, READER 3: and obvious. LAWYER 1: The one, the one who, LAWYER 2: The one who helped the robbed man. READER 3: (Looks at one LAWYER.) Just say, READER 4: (Looks at one LAWYER.) just say the Samaritan man!

READER 2: The lawyer READER 1: didn't even say the READER 2: Samaritan's name but only—

LAWYER: 1: The one, the one who, LAWYER 2: the one who helped the robbed man. READER 2: The lawyer hated the Samaritan so much

READER 1: that he didn't

READER 2: want to say the word,

READERS 1-2: Samaritan.

READER 3: Why did he hate the Samaritans?

READER 4: Why does anyone

READER 3: hate another person?

READER 4: Here is one conclusion to the story.

READER 3: Jesus' two questions were answered.

READER 4: What must I do to inherit eternal life?

READER 3: and

READER 4: Who is my neighbor?

READER 3: Now you lawyers, READER 4: go and do likewise. READER 3: Go and do likewise! READER 4: Go, READER 3: and be like the Samaritan. READER 4: I don't think you lawyers READER 3: want to be like the Samaritan! READER 4: Just help others in need!

READER 1: Jesus also answered the question, READER 2: "How do you love God?" READER 1: Now you lawyers, READER 2: go and do likewise

ALL READERS: (Cynically.) Go and do likewise.

READER 4: Go,

READER 3: Be like the Samaritan

READER 4: and just help others in need.

READER 3: I don't think the lawyers

READER 4: will want to be like the Samaritan!

LAWYER 2: How do you love God?

READER 2: By helping those in need.

READER 3: Those in need READER 4: are your neighbors.

READER 1: Your neighbor is anyone in need, READER 2: whoever READER 3: and wherever they are READER 4: on or off the Jericho road.

READER 1: By helping those in need. READER 4: you are loving God, READER 2: and loving your neighbor as yourself. READER 3: just as the Samaritan READER 1: helped the beaten man, READER 3: You need to READERS **1-2: go and do likewise.**

READER 4: (*Pause.*) I wonder if READER 3: I wonder if the lawyers READER 2: ever went READER 1: and did likewise?

(LAWYERS drop their heads.)

ALL READERS: He went away sorrowful

READER 4: and probably never, READER 3: ever READERS 1-2: traveled the Jericho road again!
