## From the Pastor...

I can't believe October is almost over. This has been one very busy month.

Special thanks to all who worked so hard for the life of faith during this month. It began as September ended with food drives and attention to the needs of the hungry. This is always a special emphasis for us, but we have done very well with over 1000 lbs. of food collected for Urban Ministries and lots of food collected during Oktoberfest.

The Yard sale was a grand success and we will be able to provide a tractor trailer full of mulch for Camp Agape, a new convection oven for our kitchen, support for several of the NC Synod ministries and of course our Cub Scouts.

The results of the Pumpkin Patch are not in yet, but we are praying for this sale which supports many unfunded activities here at St. Paul's. Most of these relate to our children, youth and young adults.

One other joy that began at the end of September was the beginning of the Hispanic/Latino Lutheran Mission start in Durham. Many of our members began working with a team from the Synod, led by Synod staff member John Mocko, sometime last year. Our hope was that we would be able to begin reaching the Hispanic/Latino community with the message of hope and grace that is the message of the ELCA. The good news is that with the help of the people of St. Paul's, this ministry has begun. German and Clara Santana have moved to Durham and begun the congregation of: Arbol da Vida or Tree of Life. The faithful of that congregation will gather at Our Savior Lutheran Church on Duke Street. Our congregation is the financial agent for this effort, handling the payroll for German. Thanks to all who participated in this effort and we will keep you informed of the progress of this ministry. Currently, German is teaching English as a second language and teaching a weekly Bible study in Spanish at Our Savior.

You may have noticed some changes in the hallway, atrium, and foyer during the past few weeks. This is our living room, and welcoming space. The old welcome station has now become the place for fruit, vegetables and eggs. Supplies are stored behind it on the shelves and the bounty of our members will be on display when available. A new cabinet has been secured with memorial funds and is permanently under the tv. We have moved bulletin boards around and community information is now in the hall leading to the elevator. Sign-up sheets and information related to congregational activities is on the board outside the reception office. In the coming days a new reception

desk will arrive (an approved extra budget purchase). This will be placed where the small table and phone currently sits outside the hall to the staff offices. It will offer increased security and allow us to better help visitors.

Also, you may have noticed a change in altar flowers. Our member, Warren Pusak has offered to supply our flowers. His firm is: Creative Flowers and Interiors. They are providing the flowers at the same cost as our previous florist but are able to provide us with a significant difference in quality and quantity for the same price. Thank you Warren and Creative Flowers and Interiors.

We are able to do all this because of the generosity of this community.

In the coming days we will be collecting water and money for hurricane relief in Eastern North Carolina.

We look forward to a future of service and joy as we approach Advent.

*When you give of yourself to the Church, it's not works, but rather it's a passion to want to give, and it's giving in hopes that other people find what I have found here.*

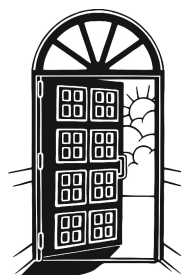
You will hear and see more during November. What can you do? Would you please ...

## Home Sweet Home



It is hard to believe that it is November already and I have been here for almost three months. I remember walking through the doors on the first day and feeling like a stranger. Now though, after only three short months, I walk through those doors and I feel at home. This feeling of being at home crept up on me slowly and without me really realizing it until one day, I just did.

Frederick Buechner, in a sermon called, "The Longing for Home," wrote, "The word *home* summons up a place ... where you feel ... at *home*, which is to say where you feel you belong and that in some sense belongs to you, a place where you feel that all is somehow ultimately well even if things aren't going all that well at any moment." Looking back on my first three months here, I think the ways Buechner uses the word "belong" expresses my experience of my growing sense of home. On one hand, he describes belonging to the community: there is a warm welcome that opens up a space of acceptance so you can enter as yourself and have a place in the community where your presence can impact and enrich the life of the community. On the other hand, he talks about the community belonging to you: there is a sense that as your community, the community will be there to support you and walk with you. Here at St. Paul's over the last three months, I have experienced both, being welcomed and having my gifts received as well as a tremendous outpouring of love and support. It's feeling like home.

I think our new welcome statement extends an invitation to all people to find such a home at St. Paul's. The new statement appears on our website and is printed in our bulletins and it reads,

"In celebrating the beauty and strength created through diversity, we welcome, value, and include all of God's children regardless of race, culture, gender, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, ability, appearance, or citizenship." "Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ." 1 Corinthians 12:12"

The words *welcome*, *value* and *include* seem to me to capture the fullness of the idea of *home*; a place where you belong and that belongs to you. I think the concept of *home* can be very useful as we continue to explore what it means to live in community and also as we welcome new folks. I encourage you to

take a few minutes sometime this week to reflect on what the concept of *home* means to you and how you think it might apply to our life together.

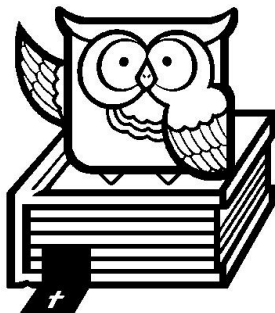
*"... for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me in..."*

## Young In Spirit

**Historic Russell School**

**2001 Saint Mary Road, Hillsborough**

**Wednesday, Nov 9 at 11:00 am**

Come join us for viewing a vital part of Durham's history – historic Russell School. During the time of segregation in the rural south, black children were denied access to formal education. To bring education to these children, countless individuals worked together to build Rosenwald Schools, named for Julius Rosenwald, philanthropist and president of Sears and Roebuck. Grants were given to build schools throughout the south. Russell School was named for one of the major neighborhood supporters, Thomas Russell. The school was built in 1926 and continued educating children until its closure in 1945. Hundreds of children were educated, bringing to fruition the vision and dedication of those who believed that high-quality education should be available to everyone.
